

Films Available At Library In March

Films available at the Decatur public library for the month of March have been announced by Miss Bertha Heller, Librarian. These 16 mm films, on deposit from the Indiana library film circuit, are available for organizations, clubs, church groups, etc.

During February, there were 48 showings of the films, with a total attendance of 5,066, of which 2,096 saw the film on Indians.

Of special interest this month are "The Life of Christ in Art" and "Man in Space." The films available during March are as follows.

THE AGE OF TURMOIL—20 min. b&w—This film presents incisive and amusing sketches of six teen-age boys and girls, their problems, etc.

ANIMALS UNLIMITED—20 min. color—Features many of the three hundred animals and birds to be found in Kruger National Park, largest wildlife sanctuary in South Africa, showing the struggle for survival of all. The camera catches close-ups of antelopes, giraffes, elephants, zebras, crocodiles, storks and vultures and shows all of the animals of the wild running in terror from a charging lion.

BICYCLE SAFETY—10 min. b&w—Points out that bicycling is fun, but that it entails certain responsibilities on the part of bicyclists to keep their bicycles in good mechanical condition, to observe traffic rules, and to consider the safety of others. Explains the important rules of the road and other safety practices.

DANGEROUS RIVER—16 min. color—A party from the Smithsonian Institute explores the Big Horn River in Wyoming and Montana, to study the wild life, Indian relics, and shooting the rapids.

FOOD AND PEOPLE—25 min. b&w—Draws a contrast between the people who have plenty to eat and those who have but very little, suggesting that world of plenty provides the greater chance for individual security and world peace. Relates the problem to conservation of resources, creation of new food sources and improved agricultural methods.

HOW TO CONDUCT A DISCUSSION—25 min. b&w—A clear explanation of eleven basic principles which discussion leaders can use to insure effective group discussion, tied together by the narration of a seasoned administrator of discussion groups.

LIFE OF CHRIST IN ART—20 min. color—Recounts the major events in the life of Christ through paintings drawn from seven centuries of religious art and through imagery. Accompanied by narrative composed largely of passages from Revised Standard Version of the New Testament.

MAN IN SPACE—35 min. color—Depicts the development of rockets from the ancient Chinese weapons to modern missiles. Shows how man may conquer outer space and establish a manned satellite. Presents the steps by which man will assault the space barrier and comments on the problems of "weightlessness" in outer space.

MIDDLE EAST: CROSSROADS OF THREE CONTINENTS—14 min. b&w—The scarcity of rainfall and water-supply, the significance of being international crossroads, and the importance of rich oil deposits are three key ideas developed in relation to the countries of the Middle East. Their need for water and its effect on their economy are illustrated. A crossroads of peoples, historic cultures, and trade, the Middle East today has developed oil as a major resource. This valuable product has had an important effect on the relations of the Middle East with the rest of the world.

MONARCH: BUTTERFLY STORY—11 min. color—Portrays four stages in the life cycle of a Monarch butterfly.

MONKEY ON THE BACK—30 min. b&w—Documentary drama, based on real life experiences of a drug addict.

OIL FOR ALADDIN'S LAMP—20 min. b&w—This film provides a glimpse into the dramatic achievements of petroleum research scientists by taking the audience into a modern laboratory.

PEOPLE OF THE REINDEER—18 min. b&w—Tells about Nils' adventures in the Lapp Country.

Senator Morse Front Runner In Oregon

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Backers of rival Democratic candidates conceded the front-runner position today to favorite son Sen. Wayne L. Morse in the Oregon Democratic presidential primary.

But unless he becomes a more serious candidate than he is now regarded, a Morse victory in the May 20 Oregon vote would minimize the importance of the prospective five-man contest.

MORSE—20 min. b&w—This film presents incisive and amusing sketches of six teen-age boys and girls, their problems, etc.

STANDARD—20 min. b&w—Appling also entered Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson and Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.), two undeclared candidates, along with Sens. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) and Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.).

Symington declined to comment except to say that he would not withdraw his name. Johnson also indicated he would leave his name on the ballot.

"My current responsibility is on the floor of the Senate," Johnson said. "I have no plans to act in any way on the action in Oregon."

Since neither Johnson nor Symington has any plans for entering other state primaries, the Oregon vote will provide the only pre-convention test of their vote-pulling power.

ENTERS NIXON NAME—For the Republican presidential primary, Appling named Vice-President Richard M. Nixon and Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York. But he said Rockefeller, who decided in December against challenging Nixon, would withdraw.

With the presidential primaries now virtually set, Kennedy-Humphrey contests will come in Wisconsin on April 5 and in West Virginia on May 10 as well as in the five-man Oregon race.

Kennedy faces Morse in Maryland on May 17 and is unopposed in New Hampshire next Tuesday, Indiana on May 3 and Nebraska on May 10. He has a stand-in, Gov. Michael V. DiSalle, running unopposed in Ohio on May 3.

Humphrey is pitted against Morse in the District of Columbia primary on May 3 and is unopposed in South Dakota on June 7.

Von Conrad's Trial Is Near To Jury

LAFAYETTE, Ind. (UPI)—The manslaughter trial of Prentiss Von Conrad was expected to go to a jury of 11 men and one woman late today for a verdict on his guilt or innocence in the gun death of a fellow former Purdue University student.

Judge Paul D. Ewan scheduled closing arguments for this afternoon. The defense rested its case late Wednesday.

Von Conrad, 38, testified in his own defense that he believed the death weapon was unloaded just before it fired, killing James

Strain, 26, Westville, in Von Conrad's off-campus apartment last summer.

Under cross examination by Prosecutor George Hanna, Von Conrad told the court he drank about four bottles of beer, "five at the most," at West Lafayette's only tavern before he and Strain went to his apartment.

He said he had no more than three bottles of beer at the apartment. He said Strain drank faster than he did and probably consumed more beer, but he didn't think Strain was drunk.

"Then you didn't count the beers or the bullets," the prosecutor asserted.

Von Conrad did not reply.

Under Hanna's cross examination, Von Conrad explained that he telephoned a girl friend after the shooting instead of immediately calling police because he

was "scared, excited and not thinking clearly."

A total of seven witnesses appeared for the defense, three of them character witnesses.

Asks Aid In Finding Possibly Rabid Dog

Mrs. John Kneller, of Bluffton, is seeking aid in locating a dog, suspected of being rabid, who bit her 17-year-old daughter, June, two weeks ago. The small brown dog, four months old, was under quarantine for possible rabies when it bit the Bluffton girl.
