The World Council of Churches has a new president—Archbishop Iakovos of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of North and South America.

The Evangelical and Reformed church and the United Presbyterian church in the U.S.A. have launched their first interracial congregations in Philadelphia in pilot programs involving four churches that were once flourishing white congregations.

Alcoholics Anonymous have celebrated their 25th anniversary. A Wall Street broker named Bill W. decided to quit drinking 25 years ago, after a spiritual awakening. This led to the formation of A.A. which now has 250,000 members around the world.

King Hussein of Jordan has expressed his country's thanks for Church World Service aid to impoverished Bedouin tribes and Arab refugees. The youthful monarch noted that gifts of sheep are the thing most needed by the Bedouins, who still suffer from recurrent drought and crop failure.

Nearly 1,000 persons attended the second congress of Swiss Protestant universities held at Zurich under the theme "Christ and peace." Among them were many prominent personalities in various walks of life. Topics included the conflict between ideologies, the use of nuclear weapons, conscientious objection and the Christian responsibility toward undeveloped countries.

A historic manuscript Bible from fourteenth century Hungary will be placed on special exhibition in the Library of Congress opposite the Gutenberg Bible during 1960. The Bible is one of the finest medieval manuscripts in the United States. A number of monastic scribes shared in the writing of the Bible and at least three artists illustrated it. The Library of Congress has owned the Bible since 1937.
