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For Senior Boys

Major General Lewis B. Hershey (from Angola, Ind.), the director of the selective service system of the United States, known to most of us as "the draft," recently conferred with Sen. Vance Hartke, one of Indiana's U. S. Senators, on military training.

A big question always facing a young man on graduation from high school is, should I volunteer for induction, should I go to college, or should I work?

This was exactly the question discussed by Sen. Hartke and Gen. Hershey, as follows:

Sen. Hartke: What would you advise for the young fellow of today in regard to what he should do to take care of his military training necessities?

Gen. Hershey: Well, the first thing the boy ought to realize is that he does have an obligation and not get too far carried away by people who start gambling on whether 3 chances out of 5 he won't have to go, or 3 out of 6, or something else.

Then the next thing depends on the kid. If a youngster knows exactly what he wants to do, I would say, go ahead and do it! If for instance, he's going to be a doctor, he'll probably be serving in the armed forces as a doctor. Or if he's going to get something else, let him go ahead and get it.

Now the youngster who comes out of high school, as many of them do, and has not found himself, I'd be inclined to say, "Go ahead, volunteer for induction, get in service and see if you find yourself.

But the first thing any young man ought to do is find himself.

Sen. Hartke: In other words, find out what he's going to do in life and make himself available to do that?

Gen. Hershey: Right. And if he knows what he's going to do, then there is no problem of getting deferred to go on through school and he'll get a chance to do his duty, probably at a later time, and probably under circumstances that ought to be more favorable to the country because he ought to be able to do more and it ought to be more satisfactory to him because he feels he's doing more in two years than he would if he were doing it with less capacity.

This is an unedited transcription of what Gen. Hershey and Sen. Hartke had to say on the subject, and many of us who served in the Armed Forces can vouch for its sound advice.

Two File Today In Presidential Race

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—A Negro attorney from Indianapolis and a retired pipefitter who lives on a farm near Rockville filed today in Indiana's presidential preference primaries.

The attorney, Frank Beckwith, 55, son of former slaves, filed against Vice President Richard M. Nixon, whose Republican declaration of candidacy was entered last week.

The pipefitter, John Hugh Latham, 64, who borrowed \$500 for his campaign, filed against Sen. John F. Kennedy, whose Democratic declaration was filed personally by the senator Monday.

Beckwith said he will campaign in Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Kentucky, Ohio, New York and Pennsylvania. He said he "will make his first campaign speech Friday at Paducah, Ky., at a meeting sponsored by a local 'Beckwith for president' club."

Beckwith said his candidacy, as a Negro, would help "people who do not know us well to realize we have ambitions like anyone else."

Secretary of State John R. Walsh, a Democrat, shook Beckwith's hand and told him "this is getting to be a little monotonous—you're the fourth candidate to file for president."

"Then this must be a great country," Beckwith replied. "I don't believe there was ever an American boy born who didn't want to be president."

Beckwith has practiced law here since 1931. He said he will not campaign on racial issues. He has been active in Republican politics and in 1956 was an alternate delegate to the GOP national convention.

Latham said he would campaign on a platform of "faith, truth and constitutional government."

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Firebug Hits
Three Times
In One City

INDIO, Calif. (UPI)—This city of 10,000 persons declared a state of emergency and appealed for outside aid today because of a firebug.

The arsonist, officials said, has set three major fires in the last five days, causing about one million dollars damage.

Merchants have started sleeping in their stores. Police patrols have been doubled. The town's 11 paid firemen and 10 volunteers were on special alert.

The city asked the Twenty-Nine Alms Marine Base to supply special military police patrols. Gov. Edmund G. Brown has been asked to support the city's declaration of a state of emergency with one of his own.

Special guards kept an eye on the city's schools.

No hysteria
There have been no signs of hysteria and no wild fear, but a steady uneasy apprehension has given the southern California desert community a grim joke:

"Where are you going tonight?" one man asks.

"To the fire. Where else?" is the answer.

Fire Chief Charles Y. Adams said the three fires definitely were the work of a firebug.

The most recent fire burned down the city's only theater Sunday night.

Fifty persons were in the theater when the fire broke out in a storage room behind the screen. The patrons ran for the doors as smoke and flames suddenly belched over the picture they watched. There were no injuries.

All Inside Fires
A fire burned a date packing shed and warehouse just outside town Friday night.

The first of the fires—described as the largest in Indio's history—destroyed two buildings and damaged a third at a lumber yard.

Police Chief P. H. Cunningham said "there appears to be no reasoning behind the fires. Just malice."

All the fires have been ignited on the inside of buildings," Cunningham said.
