

Explain New Course In Driver Training

High school driver training instructors from Adams county and surrounding counties will be at Purdue extension center in Fort Wayne April 5 to hear an explanation of the new state course of study they will be using next year.

Formulated last summer under the supervision of Indiana University's department of health and safety and the state department of public instruction, the new driver education manual provides a guide in planning driver training programs, and an outline of the Indiana driver education laws.

Directing the institute will be Bernard I. Loft, associate professor of health and safety at Indiana; Merrill Scott, traffic safety education division of the state department of public instruction; Harold Carlton, educational consultant for the American Automobile Association in Washington, D.C.; and

LaVaughn Hawkins, assistant to Scott.

Ten such institutes are being conducted throughout Indiana to acquaint teachers with the new plan.

The Fort Wayne meeting is being underwritten by the Chicago Motor Club.

Early Planning For Conservation Reserve

"It's not too early to make plans and order seed, fertilizer, tree seedlings, or other materials needed to establish the cover on 1960 conservation reserve land," according to James Garboden, chairman of the county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee.

During the past fall, over 5 million additional acres of cropland in the United States have been placed under conservation reserve contracts. The contracts call for all of this cropland to be devoted to a conservation use—trees, grass, water storage, or plantings especially beneficial to wildlife.

The contracts call for the department of agriculture to share the cost for the establishment of the conservation cover on the land. Generally, this cost-share is a one-time assistance and therefore it is to the advantage of those who have contracts to get the cover established the first year. Having everything ready early in the season is one way of insuring a good stand regardless of the kind of conservation cover to be established.

Urges Completion Of Wool Sales Records

With the 1959 wool marketing year coming to a close and the 1960 year beginning, growers were reminded today of the importance of complete records on their sales of wool and unshorn lambs. Producers will be eligible for payments for the 1959 marketing year for wool and unshorn lambs marketed not later than March 31 of this year. Later marketings will be eligible for payments for the 1960 year.

Mary J. Howard, office manager, Adams county agricultural stabilization and conservation office, reminds wool growers that the sales documents must show the true net sales proceeds, including deductions made for freight and other marketing charges. Where false information is filed, both the producer and the wool buyer are subject to penalties. Applications for payment under the 1959 program must be filed at the county ASC office not later than April 30. The average price received by farmers for wool during the entire marketing year can then be calculated and the payment rate announced. Payments to growers will be made during the summer.
