

Decatur Golf Course To Be Officially Opened For 1960 Season Next Saturday

Luke Majorki, pro-manager of the Decatur Golf course, announced today that the course will be officially opened Saturday.

The pro said everything is ready, providing a break in the weather comes this week. If event weather prevents the opening the pro shop will remain open and the course will open as soon as the weather will permit.

The men's city league will open Monday, May 2. Plans are being made to have an eight team league, which will play two seven-week halves. Winners of the first half and second half will hold a playoff to name the league champion. The Decatur Industries team is the defending champion. Plans are also being made to distribute a trophy to the sponsor of the winning team, individual trophies to the players on the winning team, and a trophy to the player with the lowest average, plus additional awards. In addition to the trophies, merchandise will also be awarded.

First Tourney May 7
The first tourney of the new season will be a two-man best ball event Saturday, May 7. This 18-hole tournament is sponsored by the Fort Wayne golf association and attracts the top amateurs from the northeastern part of Indiana and parts of Ohio.

The women's league will open Wednesday, May 25. Tee-off time will be at 1 p. m. each Wednesday. The league will run through to September 14th.

Club Tourney Sept. 10-11
The finals of the men's annual club tourney will be held Saturday, Sept. 10, and Sunday, Sept. 11. The 1960 tourney will operate under a new system. The final 36 holes which will be played Sept. 10-11 will determine the champions of each flight.

This year the players will play 36 holes in the latter part of August, with dates to be announced. These scores will be used only to place the players in their respective flights. All players will start even in their respective flights for the final 36 holes Sept. 10-11. The low total of the final 36 holes in each flight will name the champions.

This tourney is set up for every category of golfer. At the end of the 36 hole qualifying rounds, all players are placed in flights, depending on their scores. In this way, every golfer is competing in his own category. From a par shooter to one who shoots 100 for 18 holes, he has a chance to win a trophy and merchandise in his respective flight.

ABCD Tourney
It is hoped to resume the ABCD tourney in 1960. This 18-hole event is based on a point system, such as one point for a bogey, two points for par, three points for a birdie, and four points an eagle. Points are totaled at the end of the 18 holes, with the highest number of points by a team winning the tourney.

Also, as in the past seasons, the nine-hole mixed Scotch twoosome tourney will be held, with dates to be announced. This event is a draw for partners, with each team consisting of a man and a woman. The team players alternate in hitting the ball from the tee until

the ball is holed out on the green. The lowest score wins the tourney.

Boston Celtics Whip St. Louis In Opener

BOSTON (UPI) — The Boston Celtics geared today for Tuesday night's second game of the National Basketball Association championship playoffs after running down the St. Louis Hawks.

The Celtics, turning in a magnificent team performance in the best of seven opener Sunday, cracked three playoff scoring records by belting the Hawks, 140-122.

A national television audience and 10,002 Garden fans saw Boston run St. Louis ragged with speed, ball handling and brilliant shooting.

Following Tuesday night's game here the action suspends until this weekend, when the Hawks play host Saturday and Sunday. Dates for the remaining games, if needed, have not been announced yet.

Boston never trailed in the opener as it turned in its best performance yet of the playoffs. With all of the starting five hitting in the early minutes, the Celtics opened up a nine-point lead early in the second quarter and then eight straight points. After that, Boston's speed and the inability of big Bob Pettit and Clyde Lovellette to hit regularly swamped the Hawks.

Pettit wound up with 20 points, five less than teammate Cliff Hagan, but was able to drop in only three baskets throughout the entire first half.

Meanwhile the Celtics were scoring 46 points in the second quarter to bring their first-half total to 76, both playoff records. Their 140-point game total also was a new playoff mark.

Red Sox One Of Major Leagues' Unknown Teams

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (UPI) — The Boston Red Sox, deprived of their best long ball hitter when Jackie Jensen retired, face the 1960 season as one of the major leagues' unknown quantities.

"I don't know how we will make out this season," says Manager Bill Jurges who took over the Sox last July 4 and piloted them from the cellar to fifth place. "Maybe Jensen didn't have the batting average of a Willie Mays but he did everything just as well. We'll miss him and I don't know how much the loss will affect us."

Jensen's vacancy in right field may be filled on the platoon basis with Gary Geiger, Marty Keough and rookie La Clinton sharing the job. Or if Ted Williams "regains some of his old form and can get in a good number of games in left field, Bobby Thomson might move over to right. Thomson came to the Red Sox from the Cubs in a winter deal.

Williams Belting Ball
Williams, although he checked into the camp complaining of the same pain in the neck which affected his hitting last year, has been belting the ball in his old style. But Jurges won't say if he expects his prized "thumper" to open the season any earlier than May 11, which is the first time Teddy appeared in the batting order last year.

Sammy White's retirement also has left a big void in the Sox' catching. If the club cannot swing a deal to acquire Russ Nixon from the Indians, they must seek a first-string heavy-duty backstop elsewhere. Either that, or go along with Haywood Sullivan, who has been battling for the job several seasons, Don Gile, Jim Pagliaroni or Ed Sadowski.

Things are more set in the infield which spots steady Frank Malzone at third base, Don Buddin at shortstop, Pete Runnels at second and Ron Jackson or Vic Wertz at first.

Key To Pennant
Jackson and Buddin could be the key in the Red Sox pennant hopes. Jackson, a 6-foot, 7-inch beller, hits right handed and has been lacing the ball hard under the guidance of batting tutor Williams. Left-handed Wertz also has looked at times like the star he was at Detroit and presumably could spell Jackson. So could Runnels.

If Runnels were moved to first, there would be a good second baseman on hand in Jerry Green. "Pumpsie" learned to play the spot at Minneapolis where he hit .320 last year.

Center fielder Gene Stephens; a good hitter whose career was halted for six weeks last year because of a broken wrist, apparently is all set in center field.

Jurges has numerous names to pull out of the hat when he considers a pitching rotation. There are Tom Brewer (10-12), Ike Delock (11-6) Frank Sullivan (9-11), Jerry Casale (13-8) and Bill Monbouquette (7-8). Also on hand is Tom Sturdivant, ex-Yankee hurler who says he "rotted away in the bullpen" last year while posting a 2-6 mark for Kansas City. Sturdivant feels he is ready to come back as a starter.

Need Southpaws
The club is short on left-handed hurlers but may have a good one, Jurges feels, in Tom Borland who was 14-8 at Minneapolis. And Ted Bowsfield, another southpaw, had a 10-5 mark for the same club.

"Brewer and Delock could be 20-game winners," Jurges says. "The boys have it in their arms. But I'm undecided on how the staff will shape up."

Gerry Mallett, former basketball player from Baylor, is among the rookies who might earn an outfield job. Others who have impressed Jurges are infielders Marlan Coughtry and Carl Yastrzemski. But right now, it appears as if the manager will stick with his tested players and let the youngsters bloom a little more on the farms.

Sam Snead Rallies To Win DeSoto Open

BRADENTON, Fla. (UPI) — With a victory under pressure in the \$40,000 DeSoto open golf tournament Sunday, 48-year-old Sam Snead served notice he will be a strong contender to become the first four-time Masters champion April 7-12 at Augusta, Ga.

Snead, winner of more tournaments than any golfer in history, took his 104th victory in his 28-year career when he defeated the Jerry Barber in a duel that wasn't decided until the final hole.

Barber was two strokes ahead of the field at the beginning of Sunday's final round, but Snead shot a three-under-par 68, while Barber was shooting par 71.

Snead carded 69-72-67-68—276 and Barber 69-68-69-71—277. Dow Finsterwald was one behind Barber with 73-67-69-69—278.

Snead won \$3,300 and a new car plus \$200 in appearance money from the sponsors. Barber collected \$3,400 and Finsterwald took \$2,200.

Doug Sanders lost \$325 on a carelessly back-handed six inch putt on the final hole that missed. He finished tied for fifth with Bill Maxwell, Arnold Palmer and Bob Goalby at 284, winning \$1,475 each.

Bill Casper was fourth, five strokes behind Finsterwald. "Palmer, the year's biggest money winner, boosted his earnings this year to \$26,757.

Helms Foundation Names Robertson

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Everybody's All America-Oscar "Big O" Robertson of Cincinnati — is the Helms Athletic Foundation college basketball player of the year. For the second time.

The 6-5 shotmaker who scored a total of 1,011 points over a 30 game schedule this season joined an elite corps by being named the best collegiate ball player twice in a row.

Other two-time Helms winners include George Glamack of North Carolina in 1940-41, George Mikan of DePaul in 1944-45, and Bill Russell of San Francisco in 1955-56.

Forwards Tom Sanders of New York University, and Tom Stith of St. Bonaventure; centers Darrall Inhoff of California and Jerry Lucas of Ohio State; guards Len Wilkens of Providence, James Darrow of Bowling Green, William Kennedy of Temple, and Roger Kaiser of Georgia Tech.

Soupy

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cauliflower lamb soup is a meal in itself. Cook 1 pound of ground lamb over medium heat until browned. Drain excess fat. Combine meat with 3 tablespoons of all-purpose flour, 1 package (1 1/2-ounce) dehydrated onion soup mix, and salt and pepper to taste. Stir in 1 1/2 quarts of water. Cover and cook over medium heat 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add 1 package (10-ounce) frozen cauliflower is tender. Makes 2 quarts.

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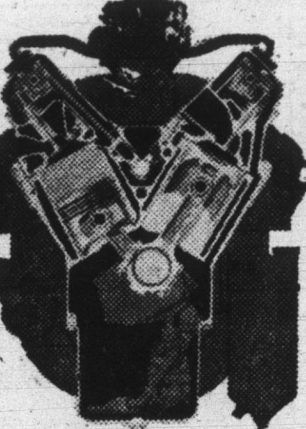
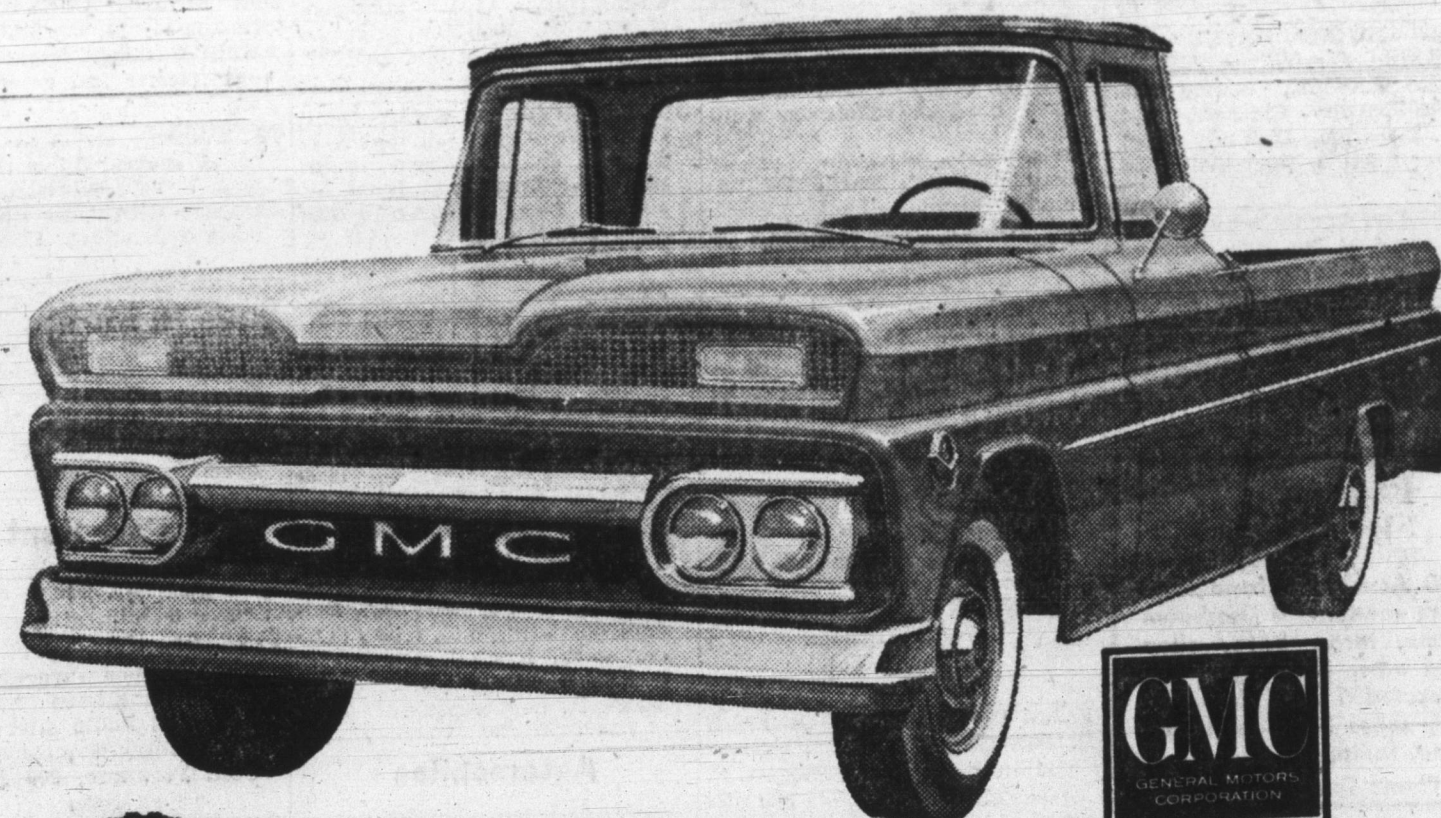
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
