### National Loop Launches 1960 Campaign Today

Two new — but well-weathered — managers, a shiny new ballpark and a new, western style world champion make their debuts today when the 1960 major league baseball season opens in four National League cities.

The managers are Charlie Dressen of the Milwaukee Braves and Charlie Grimm of the Chicago Cubs, both veterans intimately familiar with the baseball wars.

Dressen, one-time Dodger helmsman, will lead his Braves onto Milwaukee's County Stadium where a capacity crowd of 40,000 will watch the opener with the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Grimm, back for his third chore as Cubs pilot, will be in the Chicagoans' dugout as they meet the world champion Los Angeles Dodgers in Los Angeles.

Open New Park  
Sixty thousand fans are expected to be on hand to cheer as the Dodgers raise the first world title flag ever to fly over a West Coast ball park.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon, a native Californian, will be among the 43,000 fans who will watch the San Francisco Giants

dedicate their new, 15-million-dollar Candlestick Park in their opener against the St. Louis Cardinals. A sell-out crowd of 33,000 will watch the fourth opener in Cincinnati, where the Reds inaugurate their 1960 season against the Philadelphia Phillies.

The National League is starting its race a full week earlier than usual this year in order to add a week of travel dates to its transcontinental traveling schedules. The American League "presidential opener" in Washington, D.C., is scheduled for next Monday with six other teams joining the race on April 19.

The Giants, solid favorites to win San Francisco's first pennant this year despite their 1959 closing-week collapse, are sending 21-game winner Sam Jones against Larry Jackson, (14-13) at 4:30 p.m., e.s.t.

The Dodgers, starting their third season in the rectangular-shaped Coliseum, have nominated fireballer Don Drysdale (17-13) to face Bob Anderson (12-13). This game is slated to start at 11 p.m., e.s.t. in clear, cool weather.

Dressen, confident he can bring the Braves their third pennant in four years, has 21-game winner Warren Spahn opposing Bob Friend, a disappointment at 8-19 last season, at 2:30 p.m., e.s.t.

The Pirates, beset by injuries last season, are starting their regular 1959 lineup behind Friend, who was a 22-game winner in 1958 and has given every indication of making a comeback this spring.

Roberts Fitches Opener  
Robin Roberts makes his 11th consecutive opening-day appearance for the Phillies against Jim Brosnan of the Reds, also at 2:30 p.m., e.s.t. Brosnan, a native of Cincinnati, had an 8-3 record with the Reds after being acquired from the Cardinals last season, and has been a spring sensation.

The United Press International's board of 50 experts picked the Giants to win the flag this year, with the Braves second and the Dodgers no better than third. Following in the forecast, were the Reds, Pirates, Cardinals, Cubs and Phillies.

The Boston Red Sox beat the New York Yankees, 3-1, the Washington Senators downed the Chicago White Sox, 7-3, the Cleveland Indians defeated the Detroit Tigers, 5-3, and the Baltimore Orioles topped the Kansas City Athletics Monday as American League teams continued their exhibition schedules which end next Sunday.

### Nine Hoosiers On NBA's Draft List

NEW YORK (UPI)—Nine Indiana-connected college basketball stars, paced by the brilliant Oscar Robertson, figured in Monday's National Basketball Association draft.

The "Big O" from Indianapolis was the first draft choice of the Cincinnati Royals, who also picked Dalen Showalter of Logansport and Tennessee and Dan Ogorek of South Bend and Seattle.

Indiana University's Frank Radovich of Hammond and Bob Wilkinson of LaPorte, along with Ed Smallwood of Evansville and Louisville landed with St. Louis. Boston's NBA playoff champions took a liking to Notre Dame's Mike Graney; Herschel Turner of Indianapolis and Nebraska was picked by Syracuse, and Jerry Schofield of Columbus, Ind., and Utah State by New York.

### 44 Cars Entered In 500-Mile Race

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—The entry list for this year's Memorial Day 500-mile auto race climbed to 44 Monday with the nomination of six additional cars, and Speedway president Tony Hulman said he expects at least 15 more entries by the deadline midnight Friday.

Three of the new entries were owned by persons who already have cars entered, but only one named a driver, and was rookie Bob Cleberg of Tucson, Ariz. Cleberg will drive the second car owned by Braund Plywood, Inc., of Birmingham, Mich.

Others entering their second cars were Racing Associates of Indianapolis and Ken Paul Inc., of Dallas, Tex.

Additional entries came from Jack Ensley, Inc., Indianapolis; a car owned by James Shreve, Robert Perkins and L. K. Grismer of Indianapolis, and H. H. Johnson of Chula Vista, Calif.

Five-year veteran Al Keller was named to drive Johnson's car. Keller, of Boynton Beach, Fla., made his best effort in 1958 when he went the distance to finish 11th. Johnson's entry is the only eight-cylinder machine entered so far this year.

Jack Ensley, who passed his driver's test at the Speedway in 1958 but has never qualified for the race itself, plans to drive his own car.

Bruce Jacobi of Speedway will drive the car owned by Shreve, Perkins and Grismer.

Both Cleberg and Jacobi are graduates of the sprint-car circuit but will be required to take drivers' tests when the track opens for practice May 1.

### Col. Robert Rossow Dies At South Bend

CULVER, Ind. (UPI)—Col. Robert Rossow, 79, former superintendent of the Indiana State Police and former director of the famed Black Horse Troop at Culver Military Academy, died Monday in a South Bend hospital after a two-year illness.

Rossow was appointed police superintendent in 1947 by then Gov. Ralph F. Gates. He served for two years, then returned to Culver as mess hall manager until his retirement in 1958 when health failed.

Rossow joined the Army at the age of 17 and served in the Philippines with the 14th U.S. Cavalry during the insurrection from 1898 to 1906.

He became director of the horse troop at Culver in 1906 and served in that capacity until 1927 when he became commandant of cadets, except for time out for military service in France during World War I as commander of a machine gun battalion.

While director of the horse troop, Rossow developed it into an internationally known organization. It served as escorts to Vice President Thomas R. Marshall and Richard M. Nixon at inaugural ceremonies and by Marshal Foch, President Herbert Hoover and Gen. John J. Pershing.

From 1935 to 1945, when he retired at Culver, Rossow was director of the Culver Summer Schools Woodcraft Camp. Services will be held at Culver's Memorial Chapel Wednesday afternoon.

### Supports Stern Measures Taken In South Africa

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI)—The leader of the opposition United Party endorsed today the stern measures taken by the South African government to break the back of Negro resistance to the white supremacy laws.

Sir De Villiers Graaff told a news conference in Cape Town that he favored the state of emergency and other precautionary measures because there was still lawlessness in African townships and locations.

Graaff, whose party also supports segregation, said he would "strongly resist" any United Nations attempt to intervene in South Africa's internal affairs.

"We must accept South Africa as a multi-racial state," he said, but the Negroes "must be regarded as citizens of bantu (native) states yet to be formed."

Investigate March Riots  
Meantime, Prime Minister Hendrik Verwoerd was reported to have showed "distinct improvement" at the Pretoria Hospital where he is undergoing treatment for two gunshot wounds in the head suffered in an attempted assassination Saturday.

In other developments: A government investigation opened today in the March 21 riots at Sharpsville where police killed 72 Negroes and wounded nearly 200 others demonstrating against Verwoerd's "apartheid" policy, particularly the hated pass laws.

Norman Phillips, foreign editor of the Toronto Star, was released from custody on condition he leave the country. Phillips was detained for "questioning" by police in Durban early Saturday.

Hospital Employee Killed In Crash  
INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—Leon Chamley, 20, an employee of Central State Hospital here, was killed and two co-workers were injured early today when their car went out of control and crashed on a city street.

In serious condition in General Hospital here were Denzil Henson, 23, and William O'Brien, 29.

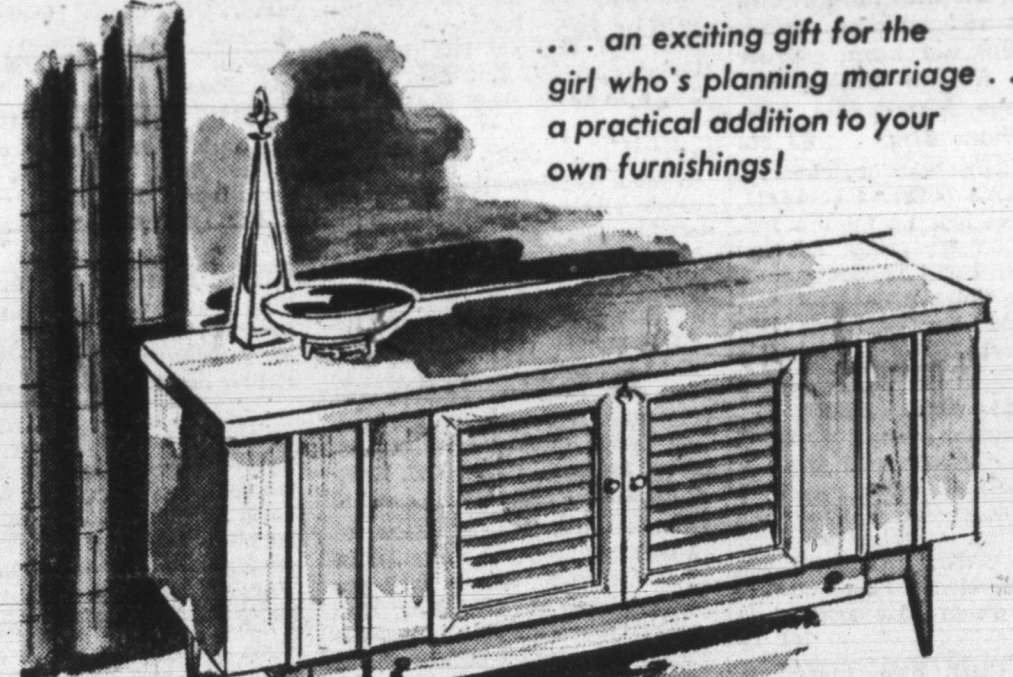

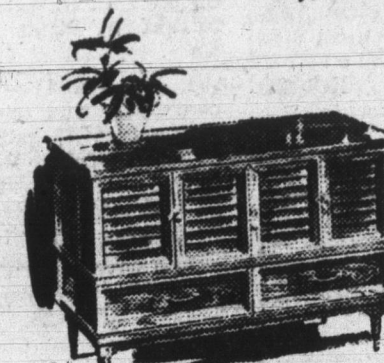

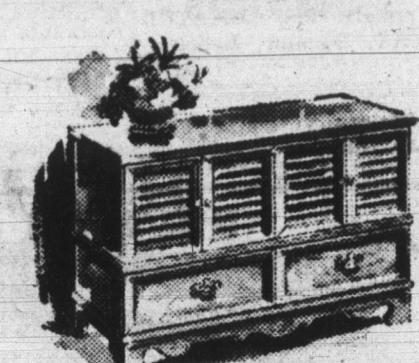
