Decatur Bankers At Credit Clinic

Two Decatur bankers will attend the installment credit clinic in Indianapolis today and Thursday sponsored by the bankers installment credit association of greater Indianapolis in cooperation with the Indiana bankers association. Mercury Reaches 80 In Indiana Tuesday

The mercury hit 80 in Indiana Tuesday in its hottest springtime spurt since a late March warm spell broke the back of a historic cold wave.

It was 80 at Evansville, 70 at Indianapolis and in the upper 60s over the north portions of the state at the peak of the day's readings.

Similar highs were expected today and Thursday, and the outlook called for cooler Friday.

The five-day outlook indicated the cooler trend would linger into next week but there was no hint of chilly weather, for the temperatures are expected to average near normal to 3 degrees above normal highs of 57 to 69 and normal lows of 37 to 48.

Scattered showers and thunderstorms or thunderstorms were expected tonight and Thursday. Those showers plus others expected "about the weekend" will total nearly an inch, the Weather Bureau said.

Highs today will range from 67 to 82, lows tonight from 50 to 63, and highs Thursday from the mid 60s to 80.

Overnight lows today ranged from 49 at Fort Wayne and Indianapolis to 56 at Evansville.

Meanwhile, at Lafayette, state climatologist Lawrence A. Schaal summarized Indiana's weather of the past winter and called it a season "turned inside out."

Army Reserve Unit Holds Field Problem

Root township, usually a quiet farming section of Adams county, echoed the battle sounds of rifles, trucks and moving men for one of the few times since the war of 1812.

Tuesday night, as battery B, 5th Howitzer battalion, the Decatur army reserve unit, staged a field problem in a woods near Saddle Lake.

Henry S. Commager, commanding officer, stated that this was the second and probably the final field exercise of the year.

The nearly 50 men were moved into position by trucks. The unit was split into two parts. Sgt. Ed Thieme commanded the defense of the woods.

The other half was split into two night patrols under Sgt. Jack Lybarger and Cpl. Cleo Landis. The idea was for the patrols to attempt to "take" the southeast corner of the woods. The patrols did not know the defense location.

Officers of the battery acted as umpires for the problem, declaring who was dead, injured, or captured. Blank rounds of .30 caliber ammunition were used. The purpose of the problem was to teach the men the art of self defense in case it is ever necessary for them to defend their artillery positions.

The problem was called a draw. Lt. Commager said, although the defense area was never actually taken by the patrols.

Says Private Plane Use Was Approved

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The chairman of a House investigating subcommittee said today that he approved in advance of the use of a private gas company plane by three federal power commissioners to attend a Louisiana funeral.

Rep. Oren Harris (D-Ark.) said that before accepting the free use of the plane, FPC Chairman Jerome K. Kuykendall discussed the situation with him. Harris said he told Kuykendall it was his "duty" to attend the funeral of John B. Hussey, another FPC member who died March 17.

Kuykendall and Commissioners Arthur Kline and Frederick Stueck flew to Shreveport, La., and back last month in a plane provided by United Gas Pipe Line Co., which is seeking FPC ap-

proval of a multi-million-dollar rate increase.

Kuykendall has admitted using the plane on grounds that he couldn't afford fare on a commercial airliner for the trip.

"Anybody who makes anything out of this is pretty small," Harris told reporters. It would be "far beyond the bounds of reason" to criticize the episode, he said.

Harris added that he would accept similar transportation to attend the funeral of a fellow congressman.

Kuykendall, the father of two children, makes \$20,500 a year. The other two commissioners make \$20,000 each.
