Vote Next Tuesday

Every registered voter in Decatur is urged to go to the polls next Tuesday and cast his or her vote on the question of the sale of Decatur's electric utility.

A low vote on Tuesday, regardless of the outcome, could mean that Decatur would go through the whole business for a fourth time.

But if everyone votes, regardless of the outcome, it will probably be considered final.

The question, argued over and over for two years, is, shall Decatur sell its electric utility to Indiana-Michigan for \$2,099,300?

The answer is yours to decide.

Proponents of the sale point out that both industry and the farmers are very dis-satisfied with their power rates, and with their service; that even many city people get poor service, causing light bulbs and motors to burn out, or excessive rates; that the city has been able to do absolutely nothing to correct the situation.

Opponents of the sale, while most of them now admit that the city cannot continue to operate the steam and diesel plant, want to build a sub-station and purchase power from Indiana-Michigan.

Those favoring the sale point out that even if this were possible, it would be necessary to raise rates to do it, and that poor service and even higher rates for all groups would continue indefinitely until the plan would be completed.

Those favoring a "no" vote reply that they believe it can be done, despite engineering advice to the contrary.

Both sides agree that the argument has already lasted too long, and it is in the best interests of the city and community that it be settled by the vote next Tuesday.

Decatur can only progress when the local business and political situation is stable enough to encourage industry and workers to move here. It can never grow when neither business nor workers are left guessing as to what their electric rates will be, and whether good or indifferent service will be provided.

Why don't you help solve the problem by voting, and by encouraging your friends and relatives to vote next Tuesday, April 26, in the special power election?

Institute Tuesday
On Church Schools

The Associated Churches of Decatur are sponsoring a vacation church school institute for churches in Adams county and surrounding area. The institute will be held at the First Methodist church at Fifth and Monroe streets Tuesday, from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The institute is planned to give practical help to all who plan to supervise, teach or help in the vacation Bible school. Some of the subjects to be covered are: lesson planning, daily program, resource materials, mission projects, games, songs and activities. The following staff will conduct the class sessions: kindergarten, Mrs. James F. Thomas, Wanaiah, a public school and laboratory school instructor; Mrs. Robert Lundy of New Paris, instructor in laboratory school and lesson material writer for the Evangelical and United Brethren denomination. Mrs. Lundy will conduct the primary class sessions. Juniors, Mrs. D. L. Niles of Russellville. The junior high section will be taught by the Rev. Gerald L. Wilson of Indianapolis. Rev. Wilson is director of CROP program for Indiana. These instructors are especially trained in vacation church school work.

This will be the only training institute in this area this spring. Churches of this area are encouraged to send all the teachers and workers. The cost is \$1 per individual, except those coming from the Associated Churches of Decatur, which is sponsoring the institute.

Lutheran Groups Plan
Joint Meeting Sunday

A joint meeting of the Lutheran laymen's league and the Lutheran women's missionary league of circuit "A", Decatur zone, will be held Sunday at 8 p.m. at the Zion Lutheran church, Friedland, route 1, Decatur.

Guest speaker for the evening will be Prof. Werner K. Wadewitz, presently an instructor at the Senior College, Fort Wayne. He will relate his experiences as a Lutheran missionary to Brazil. He was stationed at Porto Alegre, a city of a half million inhabitants. There he spent about ten years in the parish ministry and thence eleven years teaching at the Brazilian Concordia, a school which combines study on the high school, college and seminary level. Following the address, the Lutheran laymen's league and the Lutheran women's missionary league will conduct separate business meetings.

Wheat Program Is
Proposed By Farmer

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A North Dakota farmer today proposed a wheat program he said would eliminate surplus stocks of the grain and still provide enough for a margin of safety.

Russell Duncan of Fargo made the proposal in testimony prepared for delivery before the Senate Agriculture Committee.

His plan included these points:—Substitute bushel allotments for acre allotments for a more precise system of determining production, with any excess over the demand to be stored at government expense on the produc-

ing farm.—Guarantee 100 per cent of parity for the grower, with parity always figured on the past three years.

—Sell surplus wheat "at world prices to hungry nations," or store it on the farm for use at the farmer's discretion.

—Halt all storage and handling payments on wheat in terminals and public warehouses.

Duncan said "It seems imperative to national defense to have the excess wheat stored on the individual farms rather than to have it stored in large concentrations in a few spots where one dozen bombs could destroy that many locations in a matter of minutes, thereby destroying a large percentage of the food supply."
