## Marvin Schroeder Elected By Laymen

Marvin Schroeder was elected president of the Decatur zone of the Lutheran laymen's league at its spring rally held Sunday night at Zion Lutheran church, Friedheim. Clarence Bultemeier is the new vice-president. Paul Wolf was reelected secretary and Justin Bleeke was renamed as treasurer. Ervin Fuelling, retiring president, presided, and the Rev. A. A. Fenster, host pastor, held the opening and closing devotions.

Newly elected members of the athletic committee include Erwin Bueck, Elmer Trier, Wilbur Bleeke, Melvin Reisenbickler, and the Rev. Richard Ludwig as pastoral advisor.

Elbert Fuhrman reported that the group has enrolled 1,197 members to date and that this figure may exceed 1,500 before the May 31 membership deadline.

The Decatur zone will host the Northern Indiana district convention Sunday, Sept. 18. The board meeting will be held Saturday evening at Zion Lutheran church in Decatur. The business session and banquet will be held at St. John's, Bingen. The Rev. Armin C. Olden, of Ft. Wayne, will be the banqueting speaker.

Lawrence Gerken of Holgate, Ohio, the Lutheran Hour representative for this district, told the group that the "Bringing Christ to the Nations" program is now the fourth largest radio broadcast in the world and explained the sponsor plan.

Prof. Werner K. Wadewitz of the Concordia Senior College, former missionary in Porto Alegre, Brazil, told the joint meeting of the Lutheran laymen's league and Lutheran women's missionary league of his experiences in this large South American country. He said there was freedom of religion in Brazil, but that the high illiteracy rate and lack of adequate manpower, made the work difficult.

He was optimistic about the future there and said the 14 stations broadcasting the Lutheran Hour were very helpful.
