Runs Fastest
Mile Race By
U.S. Citizen

It's obvious that summer trip to Rome for the 1960 Olympic Games looks mighty good to Dyrrol Burleson, Bill Nieder and John Thomas.

Of course that jaunt is the target for scores of other Yankee track and field stars, but right now it would be hard to find three better bets for the squad. Burleson, 19, a sophomore at the University of Oregon, produced the fastest mile ever run by a United States citizen Saturday during a dual meet with Stanford. He was timed in 3:58.6, while defeating Ernie Cunliffe of Stanford (4:00.4) by 12 yards at Eugene, Ore.

"I think—I know I can run faster," Burleson said after becoming the first U.S. runner to meet the Olympic qualifying standard for the 1,500-meter race at Rome. A runner must do 1,500 meters in 3:45 or the mile in 4:02 to be able to compete in the Olympic 1,500.

Meets Qualifying Standard
Cunliffe also met the qualifying standard. United States Rome hopefuls also must finish first, second or third in the country's Olympic trials.

Nieder, warming up for his duel with Paddy O'Brien next weekend at the Drake Relays, heaved the shot 63 feet, 10½ inches Saturday at the Kansas Relays in Lawrence, Kan. The 240-pound Nieder produced a 65-foot-7-inch toss April 2 at the Texas Relays and got off a heave of 66 feet, 1¼ inches during a warmup session last Saturday. The latter toss can't be submitted for approval as a record. O'Brien's listed world mark is 65-4.

Thomas, the Boston University youngster who will be the Olympic high jump favorite if he escapes injury, took part in his first outdoor meet since 1958 Saturday at Hanover, N. H. He cleared seven feet, ½ inch, bettering the NCAA mark of seven feet set by Charlie Dumas of Southern California in 1959 and equalling the American record set by Dumas in 1956.

BEATS PARRY O'BRIEN
Dave Davis also got into the shot put act Saturday when he produced a toss of 62 feet, 8½ inches to beat O'Brien during the Mt. San Antonio Relays at Walnut, Calif. O'Brien's best put was 61 feet, 7¼ inches.

At this meet, Rafer Johnson, the nation's top decathlon performer, marked his first competition since recovering from a back injury by winning the javelin throw with a toss of 236 feet, 11½ inches.

Charles Pratt of the Philadelphia Pioneer Club won the decathlon at the Queens-Iona Relays in New York with 6,461 points and Glenn Davis, the 1956 Olympic 400-meter hurdle champion, won that event in 51.8 seconds at the Ohio Relays in Columbus, Ohio.

Pittsburgh And
Detroit Lead
Major Leagues

You can't blame Detroit and Pittsburgh fans for whooping it up—they've waited 20 years for the Tigers and Pirates to make jackrabbit starts.

The Tigers remained unbeaten atop the American League when they whipped the Chicago White Sox, 12-4, for their fifth straight victory Sunday while the Pirates topped over first place in the National League when they beat the Milwaukee Braves, 7-3, for their eighth triumph in 11 games.

The Tigers haven't made such a fast start since they won eight of their first nine games in 1907 and the Pirates are making their best early showing since they won their first seven games in 1938.

In fact, over the years, the Tigers and Pirates have more often than not disappointed their followers with early-season slumps.

Haddix Beats Braves
Casey Wise, the ex-Milwaukee infielder, and catcher Lou Berberet led the Tigers' explosive attack Sunday while Harvey Haddix, who hadn't beaten the Braves since 1957, was the Pirates' hero.

Wise, filling in for second baseman Frank Bolling, drove in five runs with two homers, a triple and a single and Berberet hit a grand slam homer that highlighted a six-run first-inning assault on 22-game winner Early Wynn.

Paul Foytack yielded nine hits to win his first game as the Tigers completed a three-game sweep of the American League champions.

Haddix gave way to Elroy Face after being tagged for 10 hits in 8 1-3 innings and the Pirate reliever ended a Brave rally. Smokey Burgess and Bob Skinner hit homers and Bill Mazeroski had a triple and two singles for the Pirates, who dealt Bob Buhl his first defeat.

The Cleveland Indians finally won their first game when they defeated the Kansas City A's, 7-0, the New York Yankees scored the first runs with nobody out in the first inning and downed the Baltimore Orioles, 15-9, and the Washington Senators beat the Boston Red Sox, 11-10, in other American League games.

Cubs Beat Giants
In the National League, the Chicago Cubs knocked the San Francisco Giants out of first place, 9-4, the St. Louis Cardinals beat the Los Angeles Dodgers, 7-2, and the Cincinnati Reds won, 10-4, after losing the first game of their double-header with the Philadelphia Phillies, 9-5.

The Indians rocked Don Larsen for five runs in the first inning and went on to beat the A's behind Gary Bell's six-hit pitching. Woody Held hit two homers, including a three-run blast in the first inning, and Vic Power and Jim Piersall had three hits each for Cleveland. The Indians had lost their first four games of the season.

The Yankees tied an American League record with their first-inning attack and carried a 12-1 lead into the eighth inning behind the sturdy pitching of Jim Coates. Grand slam homers by Albie Pearson in the eighth and Billy Klaus in the ninth brought the Orioles close until Johnny James retired them in the ninth. Tony Kubek hit two homers and Elston Howard drove in five runs with a homer and two triples for the Yankees.

Hits Two Doubles
Bob Allison's two doubles drove in three key runs for the Senators, who twice overcame four-run Red Sox leads. Bobby Thomson had four hits, including a homer, and Vic Wertz, and Lou Clinton also homered for Boston.

The Cubs scored seven runs with two out in the eighth inning to end a five game losing streak and give relief ace Don Elston his second win. Bob Willis' three-run bloop single, a homer by Tony Taylor and Frank Thomas' double were the big blows of the Cubs' winning rally against Billy Loes, Stu Miller and Bud Byerly.

Stan Musial, hitting .296, hit his second homer and Ken Boyer his fourth and fifth as the Cardinals dealt Johnny Podres his first defeat. Bob Miller went 6 1-3 innings and then Ron Kline and Lindy McDaniel pitched hitless ball over the last 2 2-3 innings. Mally Moon had two of Los Angeles' six hits.

Rookie Jim Coker's grand slam homer in the eighth inning featured a seven-run rally that enabled rookie Chris Short to pick up his first big league victory for the Phillies. The Reds won the nightcap for Don Newcombe with a 15-hit attack that included homers by Roy McMillan, Eddie Kaslo and Frank Robinson.

Dow Finsterwald Is
New Orleans Winner

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — Dow Finsterwald looked like Citation with a 10-length lead as he ran away from the field to card a record 73-hole score of 270 Sunday in the \$27,000 Greater New Orleans Open.

The 30-year-old Tequesta, Fla., pro, always deadly with his short game, seemed to break par at will as he finished six strokes ahead of blond Al Besselink of Grossinger, N.Y.

Finsterwald turned in rounds of 60-66-69 for a 14-under-par performance and the \$3,500 first place money. His 270 obliterated Henry Picard's 276 standard set in 1941.

The prize money boosted his winnings over \$25,000 for 1960—good for second place behind Masters winner Arnold Palmer's \$44,000.

Only three golfers had a chance to catch Finsterwald in the final 18—Doug Sanders of Miami, Johnny Pott of Shreveport, La., and Al Besselink. Sanders was four strokes back and the other two trailed by five.

Four players were bunched for third place behind Besselink: Pott, Sanders, Bob Roseburg of Overland, Kan., and Houston Lachar of Birmingham, Ala., all had 277's.

Jon Gustin of Gladwyne, Pa., was all alone in fourth place with a 278, and Dick Knight of San Diego, Calif., shot a torrid 65 to catapult into fifth place with 279.

The New Haven Bulldogs won the sixth annual New Haven relays Saturday, scoring 48 points, with Fort Wayne Central Catholic finishing second with 37 points. The Decatur Yellow Jackets scored seven points. Other team scoring was Elmhurst, 28; Bluffton, 24; Fort Wayne Concordia, 14; Angila, 5, and Butler, 2.

Dan Poling finished second for the Yellow Jackets in the 220-yard dash, Jim Gay was third in the broad jump, and the Jackets were fourth in the half-mile relay, with Denny Bollenbacher, Jim Reidenbach, Jim Gay and Dan Poling the team members.

Indiana's Top
Stars Of Track
Have Big Day

Indiana's top high school track and field specialists had a field day during the major track meets Saturday, setting four new season records and a multitude of conference and meet marks.

The top winners Saturday were defending state champion Gary Roosevelt, Gary Froebel, Elkhart, New Albany, and Tipton.

Roosevelt showed his class by taking Class "A" honors at the Kokomo Relays, scoring 62 points to 39 for Muncie Central in the top division. Richmond was third with 23½.

Also at Kokomo, Tipton took the Class "B" championship by defeating runnerup Bremen 55-49. Richmond's Spence Givens had the most spectacular achievement when he heaved the shot 55 feet 8½ inches to break the previous meet record by almost eight inches. It was also a state season record for the 280-pound junior.

Larry Satterfield of Richmond, the state's best high-jumper, cleared the bar at 6 feet 3¼ inches for another meet record, and Roosevelt's half-mile relay team was timed at 1:32.2 for a meet mark.

Froebel Wins Easily
At East Chicago, defending champion Gary Froebel overwhelmed all comers to take the West NIHSC track-and-field championship with J.D. Smith setting two season bests in the 100 and 220 yard dashes.

Outstanding individual efforts helped Froebel crush runnerup Gary Tolleston, 57½-54, with East Chicago Washington coming in third with 33½ points.

Smith, probably the best dash man in the state, ran the 100-yard event in 9.9 to tie the mark he set last year. He also won the 220-yard dash in 21.8, slightly under his record of 21.5 but the best so far this season.

Another state season record was set by East Chicago Washington's Don Buckingham who leaped 22 feet 7¼ inches to break the old meet broadjump standard. It also broke Buckingham's previous season best of 22 feet 1 inch.

Columbus Relays
Froebel qualified nine men and both relay teams for the NIHSC finals at Elkhart Saturday, where they will come up against East NIHSC champ Elkhart, which

qualified 14 men and both relay teams.

Elkhart won its conference championship on home ground with an easy victory over runnerup Fort Wayne North, 84½-47½. Mishawaka was third with 25 2-3.

There were no season marks set, but a record conference performance by Charles Umbarger, the best prep miler in the state, added to the Elkhart trophy case. Umbarger was timed in 4:26.3 to snap his previous mark of 4:32.3 set in 1958.

Jack Hallenbeck of Fort Wayne North, Indiana's top hurdles man, won both his specialties.

At Columbus, a well-balanced New Albany squad took the Columbus Relays despite a one-man show by Bob Wells of Jeffersonville.

New Albany scored 81 1-5 points to 70 9-10 for runnerup Ben Davis. Jeffersonville was third with 67 1-5.

Wells set anew meet record when he sailed over the high jump bar at 6 feet 3 inches. He also won the broad jump and the 100-yard dash.
