Housing Measure Is Approved By House

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A House-passed billion-dollar housing bill got a lukewarm reception in the Senate today in advance of what was certain to be a cold greeting if it ever reached the White House.

The Democratic measure, cleared Thursday, 214-163, will come up for consideration at Senate housing subcommittee hearings beginning May 9 along with 17 other housing measures.

President Eisenhower has opposed any major spending for housing this year as unnecessary and a threat to the budget.

Sen. Homer E. Capehart (R-Ind.), ranking GOP subcommittee member, said he did not think that as much federal money as the House voted was needed at present to stimulate housing.

The House bill would provide one billion dollars of federal money to help finance sale of new houses. The money would be used to purchase GI and FHA mortgages costing \$13,800 or less.

Truman To Speak At Marion On Labor Day

MARION, Ind. (UPI)—The co-chairmen of an East Central Indiana Labor Day celebration committee announced Thursday night that former President Harry S. Truman will speak in Marion Sept. 5.

Thomas Biddle and Everett Lawson of Marion said following a planning meeting of area union leaders that Truman had accepted an invitation to address the sixth annual celebration on Labor Day.

The committee is preparing for 100,000 visitors at an all-day celebration including receptions, a long parade, a barbecue and speeches in 4-H Park.

Counties in the area are Blackford, Delaware, Huntington, Grant, Henry, Fayette, Jay, Wabash, Randolph, Wayne and Madison.

Mayor M. Jack Edwards of Marion was scheduled to welcome the visitors. Truman will be introduced by whoever the Indiana Democrats nominate for governor at their June convention.

The parade will be 2 1/2 hours long with 100 floats, bands and marching units among 3,000 persons participating.
