## Poor Man's Candidate

Look around. Along the state highways, on TV, in hundreds of newspaper ads, in your personal mail, everywhere — are paid political advertisements about poor Nixon.

How are these advertisements being paid for? Is it the same infamous committee of 100 (big business groups interested in government influence) that caused the scandal 8 years ago?

For a poor man, Nixon is certainly spending a lot of money. The Republicans are doing everything they can to give Nixon a bigger vote than Kennedy in Indiana. Remember that when you vote Tuesday.



## Social Security Quiz

## Answers Many Queries

(Editor's Note) Do you have any questions about Social Security? We all do, don't we? Send any question you might have to Social Security Quiz, c/o Daily Democrat. You'll find your answer in this column, which is published regularly.)

1. Q—I have been drawing social security retirement for a number of years. Recently a friend of mine told me that my payments would soon be exhausted. Is this true? I am dependent upon my social security payments for my livelihood.

A—No. Your payments do not have a time limit on them nor are they ever exhausted. Your friend just slipped you some misinformation. You need have no worry that your social security payments will run out.

2. Q—I have recently changed my address and have notified the social security office where to send my checks. Must I also notify the post office?

A—It is not necessary, but it is always advisable to notify the post office of any change in your address.

3. Q—I have been receiving social security payments for my minor son who will be 18 years of age this coming October. Since he will still be in high school at that time, will his payments be continued until he graduates in 1960?

A—No, they will not. No payments can be made to children past 18 except disabled children whose disability began before 18. Therefore, the payments will stop when your son attains 18. Actually your son's last payments will be for September, 1960, because benefits end with the month before the month of attaining 18.

4. Q—My husband and I have been drawing benefits at the minimum rate. Now he has died. Will my widow's benefit be only three-fourths of his \$33 monthly rate?

A—No. You will receive \$33 a month. Although a widow's benefit is usually three-fourths of her husband's monthly rate, a widow alone will not be paid less than \$33.

5. Q—My wife and I have been receiving our social security payments in a combined check. However, now that she is in a nursing home, is it possible for us to get separate checks—one sent to me and one sent to my wife at the nursing home?

A—Yes. Separate checks can be issued when you request it, and in all cases where it is bur-

denome or difficult for the payee to promptly negotiate their checks.

6. Q—I have been unemployed for almost 2 years, yet I am only 65 years of age. Some friends have told me I should freeze my social security record, telling me that I will lose out on the amount of my payments if I do not.

A—No. You cannot freeze your earnings record because you are unemployed. Social security earnings can be frozen only when the worker is totally disabled. However, we always drop up to five years of little or no earnings when benefits are figured. In your case, this drop-out covers the years of unemployment. Therefore, you had steady work under social security from 1950 on up to the time you reached age 60, the years since then will not be counted against you.

7. Q—I am receiving old age retirement payments. My wife is 49. We are considering the adoption of our granddaughter, age 11. We are under court order to contribute \$6 a week to her support. Even though he didn't send the money regularly, am I able to draw social security for her? I am married again. Is it the step-father's duty to support her?


A—Under the social security law if a child was living with and supported by a step-father she can-

not receive social security benefits on her natural father's earnings records. To receive social security payments on a natural father's earnings record, the father must be contributing regularly and substantially to the child's support.
