Jet's Landing Gear Fails, 109 Unhurt

NEW YORK (UPI)—One hundred passengers and nine crew members escaped Monday from a Boeing 707 jetliner that skidded nearly half a mile with two engines afire when its landing gear collapsed on landing at Idlewild Airport.

Eight passengers were injured slightly but none was hospitalized. Smoke from the burning engines filled the luxurious passenger compartment of the Trans World Airlines jet as it screeched to a halt about 100 yards from the end of the runway. Stewardesses and other crew members helped passengers out emergency exits and showed them to slide down escape chutes.

"There was no panic, and the plane was emptied within minutes," Boeing 707's were plagued with a series of landing gear malfunctions last year. The Federal Aviation Agency set new maintenance rules aimed at preventing landing gear and hydraulic failures, and the Boeing company modified the landing gears.

No American pure jet airliner has been involved in a fatal passenger crash, but 707's on crew training flights crashed last August near Riverhead, N.Y., killing five crewmen, and last October near Seattle, killing four crewmen.

The plane, TWA Flight 100, had left Los Angeles at 6 a.m. e.d.t. and touched down for what promised to be a normal landing here at 4:48 p.m. e.d.t.

TWA said the nose landing gear apparently collapsed as the graceful jet rolled along the runway. Capt. Harry Campbell, of Los Angeles, the pilot, slammed on the brakes, and the wing landing gear then apparently retracted, TWA said.

The jet pods of the right and left inboard engines struck the runway and sparks apparently set the engines afire. Fire extinguishers built into the engines speewed foam, but firemen said the engines still were burning when they reached the scene.

Studies Aimed At Building Moon Base

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Army Engineers said today they are making studies aimed at building a base on the moon some day.

The chief engineer, Lt. Gen. Emerson C. Itchner, told the House Space Committee that the engineers are studying several concepts of a base for lunar explorers.

He said such work must be carried out simultaneously with the development of space rockets capable of transporting building materials to the moon.

"Within the next decade," Itchner said, "our rocket vehicles will be able to transport exploration teams to the moon.... Construction of the lunar base will have to precede all but preliminary explorations on the lunar surface."

He said one idea would be to send prefabricated units to the moon by means of cargo rockets. The units would be "designed for assembly on the moon with a minimum of labor."

Itchner said the base "must be buried for heat insulation and for protection against radiation and meteorites." Small nuclear reactors would provide electric light, power and heat.

He said an alternative idea would employ inflatable structures instead of prefabricated units.

Paint Stains

For paint stains on clothing, turpentine, kerosene, and cleaning fluid are all good solvents. None of these, however, are reliable if you have allowed the stains to become stale. For stale paint stains, try combining equal parts of turpentine and acetone (or nail-polish remover), so long as the fabric involved is not acetate rayon, and use it as you would ordinary cleaning fluid.

Broaden Probe Into FPC And Pending Cases

WASHINGTON (UPI)—House influence investigators today open what could be an explosive election year investigation of whether members of the Federal Power Commission have been too friendly with the firms they are supposed to regulate.

The stated purpose of the inquiry was to explore off-the-record talks which utility lawyer Thomas G. (Tommy the Cork) Corcoran, New Deal "brain trust," had with FPC members about a pending rate case.

But the hearings appeared to be broadening into a general investigation of the agency and questions ranging from whether members too freely accepted the hospitality of power industry officials to whether FPC rate policies were unfavorable to consumers.

Some Democrats have charged that President Eisenhower has appointed members to the FPC and other regulatory agencies who were more favorable to the industries they were supposed to oversee than to the public.

The witness list included FPC Chairman Jerome K. Kuykendall and three commission members, Corcoran, attorney for Tennessee Gas Transmission Co., and Gardiner Symonds, chairman of the board of the company.

Kuykendall and two commission members who Corcoran talked to about the rate case outside the hearing room have denied that the conversations had any influence on their decision.

Other congressional news: Drugs: Dr. Charles O. Wilson, dean of Oregon State College's School of Pharmacy told Senate investigators the naming of medicines in this country is in a state of confusion and urged that the Food and Drug Administration be given authority to straighten it out. Wilson testified as the Senate anti-trust and monopoly subcommittee turned its investigation of the drug industry to the question of whether patients would save money if doctors prescribed medicines by their generic name rather than their brand name.

Credit: Sen. Paul H. Douglas (D-Ill.) said most American businessmen are honest but tried to hide the price of credit because they are in a "competitive jungle." He said in a speech that his credit labeling bill to require disclosure of all finance charges on loans and installment purchases would eliminate the "unlevel" playing field.

Minimum Wage: The National Assn. of Manufacturers said a hike in the \$1-an-hour minimum wage could hurt the workers it was supposed to help. In a statement filed with a House labor subcommittee considering minimum wage legislation, the NAM said an increase in the wage floor would be inflationary, cause unemployment and restrict domestic manufacturers' ability to compete with foreign producers.
