It means, for one thing that there is a disease — multiple sclerosis — whose effect must be reckoned beyond the victims it strikes directly. MS victims are mainly young adults, often parents of young children and family breadwinners.

Once it comes, MS usually stays. All of this means that when MS hits, it hurts in a very tender spot—the home—and often causes serious family disruption.

This is a situation we must all take to heart. We readily sympathize and are moved to action when we hear of children attacked by a disease. We need to be equally understanding about the way children can suffer when a chronic disease attacks a parent; the hurt this deals the home is at least as far-reaching.

How can this terrible hurt be lessened?

By your help. Your contribution to the MS hope chest of the Adams county chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis society will be used for scientific research which seeks to find the cause and cure of chronic, crippling MS.

The society is the only organization with chapters throughout the country supporting both research and service to patients.

These services aim to bring light into the lives of the hurt, lonely, even sometimes hopeless victims of MS. They mean needed special equipment, patient clubs, MS clinics, and recreational and educational events for MS victims who might otherwise sit at home in a wheel chair, day in, day out.

The county chapters hope chest drive began May 8, mother's day, and will last until June 19, father's day. It deserves the support of all citizens—all who understand that the hurt of MS extends into the home and beyond—into the community.

Money Bill
Is Approved

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Appropriations Committee approved a \$3,841,798,985 public works money bill today and recommended an admission charge to recreational facilities developed as a part of such projects.

The bill reported by the committee included funds for Corps of Engineer civil works projects, the Atomic Energy Commission, the Bureau of Reclamation, the Bonneville Power Administration, the Southeastern and Southwestern Power Administrations, the Tennessee Valley Authority and several study commissions.

The committee cut the President's \$4,001,016,180 budget by \$159,217,195. The amount approved was \$31,929,329 less than Congress voted last year.

In regard to the recreational facilities, the report said:

"Minimum fees for the use of the camping areas, parking and use of boat ramps should not prove to be a serious or objectionable burden to the users of the recreation resources."

"It would seem much more fair that the beneficiaries of these resources should bear the cost of the facilities that make their enjoyment possible than that the cost of these facilities should be spread to all the taxpayers, many of whom never have the opportunity to make use of them."

The committee said the income from such charges should be enough to cover construction and operating costs.

Bidders shall submit complete specifications and information covering their equipment as quoted in the bid, and shall provide for inspection of a vehicle of the model bid on.

All bids shall be accompanied with a certified check in the amount of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00).

All bids shall be filed with the Clerk-Treasurer of the City of Decatur, Indiana on General Bid Form No. 35, prescribed by the State Board of Accounts of the State of Indiana.

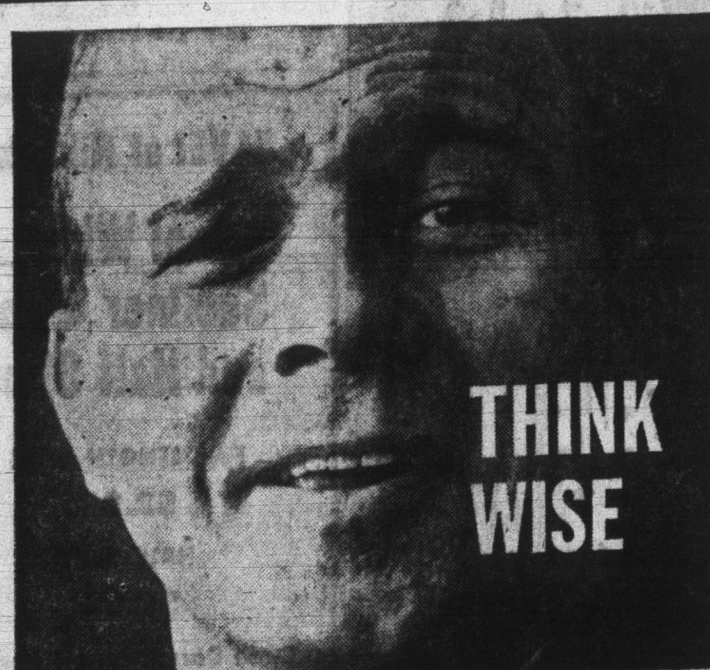
