

## Small Twister Strikes Albany Last Evening

United Press International The Weather Bureau issued an advisory today saying "possibly locally severe" thunderstorms might occur throughout Indiana this afternoon and tonight.

The advisory came a few hours after storms Thursday night touched off a small twister near Albany and a lightning bolt which set off a fire that destroyed an Anderson industrial plant.

The shower activity was expected to end Saturday morning, with slightly cooler temperatures, and Sunday was scheduled to be "sunny and pleasant."

The storms spread rainfall ranging from one-fourth of an inch to an inch or more over most sections of the state.

At Albany, Delaware County town near Muncie, \$5,000 damage was caused when a storm described as a small tornado whirled through the Leo Lowe farm, smashing a garage containing two cars and damaging a chicken house. It dipped again at the Meridith Myers farm half a mile away where a farm building was damaged, and four trees were uprooted on a third farm nearby.

At Anderson, a bolt set fire to the Hoosier Sash and Door Co. plant and destroyed the structure with a loss unofficially estimated at \$100,000 to \$200,000.

Rainfall around the state included .25 of an inch at South Bend, .46 at Fort Wayne, .57 at Evansville, .61 at Indianapolis and .66 at Lafayette.

The atmosphere became quite humid Thursday as temperatures mounted to highs ranging from 68 to 70 at South Bend and Fort Wayne to 82 at Evansville, and a hot 90 at Louisville.

After highs ranging from 75 to 80 today, a cool-off was due tonight with the mercury dropping to a range of 53 to 63 and precipitation activity ending.

Saturday highs will range from 63 to 73. The outlook for Sunday was generally fair with moderating temperatures.

The five-day outlook called for temperatures to average near normal highs of 70 to 80 and normal lows of 50 to 62, and precipitation totaling around an inch in showers and thunderstorms tonight and in the south early Saturday, and showers and thunderstorms again about Monday or Tuesday.

The ambulance driver said the shark's teeth ripped almost the entire length of the girl's leg.

Suzanne was rushed to Dominican Hospital here, where surgeons removed the leg during a four-hour operation. Hospital officials reported she was in fair condition, suffering from shock and loss of blood.
