Hawaii's Governor May Be Keynoter

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Republican National Committee today was reported ready to select Gov. William F. Quinn of Hawaii to be the keynote speaker at the GOP national convention.

A well-informed Republican source said that Quinn's selection for the important convention role was almost certain. The national committee plans to nail down its choices for convention posts at a meeting June 9-11.

Republican National Chairman Thruston B. Morton already has announced that Charles Percy, a Chicago businessman, will be the temporary GOP platform committee chairman and Rep. Melvin Laird (Wis.) will be vice chairman.

Quinn, a native of Rochester, N.Y., is considered a top-notch speaker in Republican circles. He will be 40 years old on July 13, two weeks before the GOP convention opens in Chicago.

The Hawaii governor was mentioned as a possible vice presidential candidate before Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York bowed out as an active candidate for the presidential nomination.

However, Republicans feel Quinn's chances for the vice presidency were virtually eliminated when Rockefeller took himself out of the GOP race. They pointed out that a ticket of Vice President Richard M. Nixon, a Californian, and Quinn would be geographically top-sided in favor of the Far West.

Quinn, a Harvard Law School graduate, practiced law in Honolulu from 1947 through 1957 when he was appointed by President Eisenhower as governor of the territory. He was elected the 50th state's first governor last July.

Temperatures Mount Slowly In Indiana

Temperatures mounted slowly in Indiana today and may hit the 80s all around the state by Thursday—maybe by Wednesday.

Two rainless days were promised, and the dry conditions were expected to help Hoosier farmers catch up a little with their spring planting.

But, thundershowers were seen as possible Thursday in the southern portion of the state.

The mercury was expected to crest today between the 70s and 80, with lows tonight ranging from the low to upper 50s. Wednesday highs will range from the upper 70s to the low 80s, and Thursday may be even warmer.

Forecasters removed the "fair and pleasant" designation from the predictions and said today and Wednesday will be partly cloudy throughout the state.

Despite the absence of rain predictions, a report from Evansville said that a thunderstorm and showers occurred between 7 and 8 a.m. today.
