Symington And Kennedy Score Nixon And Ike

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Sen. John F. Kennedy and Stuart Symington, Democratic presidential hopefuls, borrowed Harry Truman's "give 'em hell" technique Tuesday night and lashed out at Vice President Richard M. Nixon and the Eisenhower administration's U-2 policy.

But a third Democratic front-runner for the nomination, Sen. Lyndon Johnson, declining to mention names or discuss U-2 "mistakes," said Russian Premier Nikita Khrushchev is "sadly mistaken" if he thinks Communist maneuvers can divide the United States.

All three presidential hopefuls agreed, however, they would be in no hurry to hold a summit meeting with Khrushchev if they were elected. Khrushchev made clear after the summit failure that he felt he could achieve better results with a new U.S. president.

"The Communists are trying to divide us from our Allies and among ourselves," said Texan Johnson. "But in this country there is no peace party and no war party."

Johnson, Kennedy and Symington spoke at a \$100-a-plate testimonial dinner for California Gov. Edmund G. Brown attended by 1,200 persons. California holds its primary next Tuesday.

Kennedy, victor in seven consecutive primaries, assailed the administration's U-2 policy, and had sharp words for Nixon because, he said, the Vice President accused him and Adlai Stevenson of being soft on communism when they criticized the government's handling of the incident.

Said Missouri's Symington: "It's funny to hear Nixon defend the Eisenhower policies on the one hand and explain why he is against them on the other."

He added, "If we don't change our policies soon, we are going to be a second class nation."
