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## Thousands Of Pupils Visit White House

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Back stairs at the White House: This is the time of year when the young people of America descend on the White House. Thousands of junior and senior high

school students arrived in the capital daily and the public tour of the White House is at the top of their sight-seeing lists. The kids for the most part are better behaved inside the public rooms of the executive mansion than some of their elders. When someone causes trouble, invariably it is an adult tourist who wants to go back to Willow Falls proudly bearing an object from the White House.

Over a period of years, the White House police have removed virtually everything portable from the range of the tourists, but occasionally some idiot tries to stretch over the velvet ropes guiding the visitors through the house and snatch at an ornament, a piece of curtain or movable part of furniture.

The kids may come in wearing outrageous, candy-striped felt hats. They may be a little noisy at the entrance, but usually when they're walking through the red, the green and the blue rooms and peering in at the calm elegance of the east room, they're well-behaved and not interested in trying to take home a genuine tapestry from a White House curtain.

Former President Truman was about as charitable about White House visitors as any chief executive could be, but he was utterly sickened one day after the renovation of the mansion to discover that some dim-witted visitor had cut away a large hunk of the beautiful silk brocade from the tapestry wall of the red room.

The vandal was never caught, and a good thing, too, because there's no telling what HST might have done to him. "Suppose this served at the time," Truman once said. "Suppose this had happened in a private home? The person who did it, at the very least, would have been thrown out bodily."

## Lawrenceburg Doctor Is Drowning Victim

LAWRENCEBURG, Ind. (UPI) — Two Lawrenceburg physicians were thrown into the Ohio River today in a boating accident, and one of them apparently drowned.

Dr. George Vail, 45, was missing and presumed drowned. Dr. Fred Houston, 40, who clung to the overturned outboard craft until rescuers reached him, said his companion vanished in a heavy fog which shrouded the stream.

## Governor Rockefeller On Campaign Swing

NEW YORK (UPI)—New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller set out today for the Great Plains on a campaign swing that was intended to aid the election of a North Dakota Republican but could serve to stir interest in a presidential "draft" movement for himself.

The 51-year-old governor planned an all-out effort on behalf of Gov. John E. Davis, who seeks election to the U.S. Senate in a special June 28 election.

Rockefeller has scheduled a full day of "folksy" campaigning at Fargo, N.D., with a street tour, visits to shopping centers and two "live" television appearances designed to expose him to as many voters as possible.

The multi-millionaire told New York Republican last week that he would accept the GOP presidential nomination if the July 25th convention offered it to him. This announcement was seen as a means of showing off his "availability" for the top place on the ticket this November, while attempting to steer clear of any challenge to Vice President Richard M. Nixon that could draw resentment.

Rockefeller has recently conceded that the vice president is the "likely" GOP nominee, but has refused to endorse him and thus eliminate any chance of competition for the post.

His reason for this, the governor told Republican politicians, last week at a special meeting in Albany, was to be in a position to lead the national ticket, should some development eliminate the vice president from the race.

In addition, Rockefeller argued, the interest of the general public could be diverted somewhat away from the Democrats by the "threat" of competition within Republican ranks.

## High-Hanging Dummy Attracts Crowd Here

Decatur people were amazed to see a man hanging by the hands of the clock on the east side of the courthouse last night at about 9:30 p.m. After a crowd started gathering to see what the man was doing, someone summoned the police. The police decided that the man was a dummy, and was attached to the chain that raises and lowers the flagpole. Then they lowered the chain and sure enough the "human fly" was a dummy attached by a rope to the chain, obviously the work of a few pranksters.

**The Golden Rule**  
Lesson for June 3, 1960

**WHAT IS THE Bible driving at?** What is the essence of the Bible, what is it that can't be thrown away or left out? Jesus put the answer to this pretty strongly once. He did not quote any verse from the Old Testament (his Bible). He gave a single sentence of his own, and said "This is the Law and the Prophets." He never said as much about any other sentence.

No wonder the Christian church hit on the name "Golden Rule" for this sentence. Dr. Foreman which Jesus boldly identified with the Law and the Prophets. It is indeed golden. But "rules" can be misleading. Most rules are designed to save people the trouble of thinking. Applying rules is a scientific procedure. But this "Golden Rule" is of such a nature that applying it is an art, not a science. So far from saving any one the trouble of thinking, it demands thought. The Golden Rule, in the life of a stupid and selfish person, produces only a mess, and can do great harm.

**Intelligence**  
At least three things are necessary in order to make the Golden Rule work. What is this Golden Rule? "Whatever you wish that men would do to you, do so to them." This is a challenge, first of all, to intelligence. It is really a principle, not a rule. It does not tell you to do any particular act. It does not describe any particular situation. It is open to being misunderstood (as all wise sayings are) by the foolish and the stupid. What could we say of a man who would give his wife a shotgun just because he would like to have one?

**Imagination**  
The Golden Rule calls for imagination as well as intelligence. If the man who gave his wife the shotgun would try to put himself into his wife's place, he would ask, "If I were my wife, what birthday present would I want?" And he might remember that she had said something about wanting new bathroom curtains. Or, if he had an even stronger power of imagination, he could think his way into her mind and guess at something she had never so much as mentioned—an extension telephone, or a trip to her old home. Whatever you would wish people to do to you—if you were in their place—do so to them. That is the real meaning of this rule.

Sometimes it calls for the kind of imagination that can look into the future. Parents and teachers need this greatly. You can perhaps imagine what this child, this student, wants you to do now. He wants you not to punish him. He wants you not to require hard work of him. Now you can let the child do as he pleases without lifting a hand against him, and that will suit his down to the ground. But ten years from now you—and he too—may sorely wish you had spanked him good when spanking would do some good. Likewise the teacher can be easy on the class—with the consequence that they learn nothing. Years later they may fall in competition with those who once studied under harder-driving teachers. Then they will wish the teacher had put on the screws.

**The Christian Heart**  
The Golden Rule calls for something beyond, or rather underlying, intelligence and imagination. Its right use calls for the Christian heart, that is to say, a heart in tune with the heart of Jesus, a heart wherein dwells the Holy Spirit; a heart sensitive not merely to the wants of others but to his needs. Jesus himself gave an illustration of this when the paralyzed man was brought to him by the man's four friends who let him down through the roof. The first thing Jesus said to him was "Your sins are forgiven." Some people would have criticized Jesus for that. Where was any evidence that this man wanted his sins forgiven? Would his friends think a trick had been played on them? A forgiven cripple weighs just as much as an unforgiven cripple, doesn't he? But our Lord knew what the man needed most of all was forgiveness. Only a Christ-like heart can see through want to need.
