Three Little League Games Played Here

The Red Sox, Indians and Senators scored victories in the Decatur Little League Thursday evening.

The Red Sox whipped the Tigers, 10-4, at Stratton Place. The winners pounded out 13 hits, including six doubles, with Cass, Red Sox hurler, leading the attack with three hits, two of them doubles. The Red Sox scored four runs in the first inning, and two in each of the second, fifth and sixth. The Tigers tallied two in the third on J. Loe's home run, and added their other two in the sixth.

Orioles Sweep Entire Series From Yankees

Make room in that hospital bed, Casey Stengel, your Yankees look sicker than you do.

That's the message from Baltimore today after the amazing Orioles completed a three-game sweep of the Yankees with Thursday night's 6-5 victory. The Orioles are flying higher than ever and those Yankees are beginning to look like the bedraggled bunch that folded completely in 1959.

Gene Woodling, an ex-Yankee who never got along too well with Stengel, swung the decisive bat in the Orioles' seventh victory in eight games and 11th in 13 when he hit an eighth-inning homer to snap a 5-3 tie. It was the fifth time this season that the 37-year-old Woodling has knocked in the tying or winning run for the Orioles in the seventh, eighth or ninth innings.

A crowd of 42,755—largest of the year in Baltimore—saw the Orioles retain their 2½-game lead over the Cleveland Indians and hand the Yankees their fourth loss in five games. The Yankees are now only 3-4 under acting manager Ralph Houk who took over May 28 when Stengel was bedeviled with the flu.

The Indians scored their fourth victory in five games and ended the Kansas City Athletics' five-game winning streak, 7-6, the Detroit Tigers shaded the Chicago White Sox, 4-3, and the Washington Senators swept the Boston Red Sox, 4-3 and 8-7, in other American League games.

The St. Louis Cardinals beat the San Francisco Giants, 4-3, and dropped them two games behind the idle first-place Pittsburgh Pirates, the Milwaukee Braves edged out the Philadelphia Phillies, 9-8, and the Chicago Cubs out-slugged the Los Angeles Dodgers, 10-8, in the National League.

Home runs by Tito Francona, Woody Held and Johnny Romano enabled the Indians to build an early 7-2 lead but they didn't clinch the victory until Dick Stigman halted a four-run Kansas City uprising in the ninth.

Maxwell Hits Two

Charley Maxwell hit his second homer of the game in the eighth inning to end the Tigers' five-game losing streak and give Ray Semproch his second win.

Two homers by J. Gardner and one each by Jim Lemon, Bob Allison and Harmon Killebrew paced the Senators to a sweep that dumped the Red Sox back in to the American League cellar.

Vic Wertz homered for all Boston's runs in the opener and Bob Knittle, by Thomson and Frank Malone each knocked in three runs in the nightcap of the six-hour double-header.

Cunningham's first homer of the season broke a 3-3 tie and gave St. Louis' Larry Jackson his sixth win. Ken Boyer, the major league home run leader, hit No. 14 for the Cardinals and Willie McCovey connected for the Giants.

Bob Rush struck out Cal Neeman and Joe Koppe with the tying run on second base in the ninth inning to save Warren Spahn's third victory of the season and the 27th of his career.

Frank Thomas, Ernie Banks and Bob Will homered to lead the Cubs' 16-hit attack on Don Drysdale and four successors while Don Demeter, Charlie Neal and Jim Gilliam homered for the Dodgers.

Griffith, Fernandez Will Fight Tonight

NEW YORK (UPI)—Fast Emile Griffith, New York boxer-puncher, and powerful Jorge Fernandez, Argentine slugger, fight tonight at St. Nicholas Arena for a non-title match next month with the new welterweight champion.

Griffith is favored at 8-5 to beat Fernandez in their nationally televised and broadcast (NBC) 10-rounders.

Matchmaker Teddy Brenner of Madison Square Garden promised that if either wins impressively tonight, he will be signed for champion Benny Kid Paret at the Garden, July 12, in an over-the-weight bout.

Ponds Unsatisfactory For Swimming Use

Parents of Decatur are urged to take an interest in where their children are swimming. City sanitarian Ray Lehman has recently received the results of a check by the state department of health on samples of water from three local ponds, and all were declared as unsatisfactory for swimming.

Based on the bacteria count per cubic centimeter, Lake Stratton, located between the river and Stratton Place, led the three, with a count of 11,000. For swimming, the bacteria count per cubic centimeter should not exceed 500. The overflow pond behind Park View drive was second, with a reading of 4,600, and Krick's pond was the cleanest of the three, with 2,400.

While the possibility of a child contracting typhoid fever, diptheria or dysentery is always a possibility, Lehman also pointed out the dangers of allowing youngsters who may not be expert swimmers to swim in a place where there is no life guard. Due to currents, and varying water depths, particularly in the first two ponds, the bottom is never the same, and creates a very dangerous situation.

Lehman urges all parents, from both the standpoint of health, and personal safety, to be sure they know where their children are swimming.

Urgent Appeal For Emergency Funds

Acting in response to fresh reports of desperate suffering caused by recurring earthquakes and tidal waves in Chile, the Protestant churches of America and other countries of the world are appealing for \$250,000 in emergency relief funds for use in the disaster area.

The emergency funds requested are mainly designed for the purchase of building materials, medicines, and other relief supplies drastically needed in the devastated area, where approximately 2,000,000 persons—sixty-five percent of the population south of Santiago—have been left without shelter in the heart of the bitter Chilean winter.

The \$250,000 appeal, from the World Council of Churches at Geneva, Switzerland, has been addressed to member churches in nations throughout the world.

More than \$90,000 already has been subscribed by national church bodies, with \$22,500 coming from the United States.

Announcement in the United States of the world appeal was made by Dr. E. Norris Wilson, executive director of church world service, overseas relief agency of major American Protestant and Eastern Orthodox churches.

When the quakes first broke out, church world service sent \$5,000 in cash, \$5,000 worth of medicine, clothing, blankets, and food, including multi-vitamin tablets and antibiotics. Many of the supplies have been airlifted.

The death toll in central and southern Chile is estimated at 5,000 and the property damage is believed to be about \$300,000,000.

Fined, Jailed For Drunken Driving

Merrill P. Yaney, Coldwater, Ohio, who was arrested Wednesday after he drove his car into the Wabash river near Geneva, was fined on one count of drunken driving in city court Wednesday. The charge of reckless driving was continued on a plea of not guilty and the charge of driving with an expired operator's license was dropped when Yaney produced a license which couldn't be found the day of the arrest.

For operating a vehicle while under the influence of an intoxicant, Yaney was fined a total of \$68.75 and 10 days in jail. His license was also suspended for one year. Since he was unable to pay the fine and costs he will serve out the fine in the Adams county jail at \$5 per day, plus the 10-day jail term.

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Sues Speedway For Injuries In Stand Fall

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—An Indianapolis housewife has filed a suit for damages on grounds she was injured in the collapse of a homemade grandstand at the 500-mile auto race here last Monday.

Mrs. Mayne Jewell Folks filed a suit in Marion County Superior Court 3 Thursday asking \$100,000 damages of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway Corp. and Wilbur H. Shortridge, Indianapolis.

Shortridge, alleged to be one of three persons who constructed the scaffold, was reported in critical condition in Robert Long Hospital here. He was hurt when the structure fell over, killing two persons and injuring 83.

The scaffolding, of light metal pipe and wooden planks, had been brought into the track area on a truck and erected before the race began.

Persons who used it for a better view of the race said they paid \$5 to \$10 a seat to a man standing beside the truck.

Mrs. Folks charged in her suit that she was standing on the ground near the infield fence about 20 feet in front of the scaffolding and was injured when it fell. She said her injuries caused her to suffer "a partial loss of locomotion in her left leg" and that she "has been rendered incapable of going out of doors, of performing her usual daily habits."

The suit also charges that the make-shift structure was erected "with the consent and approval" of the Speedway and that it was improperly constructed and built in disregard of safety precautions.

Minnesota, Detroit Win First Playoffs

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI)—Minnesota and Detroit, one-sided winners in Thursday night's first-round play, clash today in the NCAA District 4 double-elimination playoffs.

Detroit buried Ohio University, 16-2, under a 14-hit attack and Minnesota crushed Notre Dame's challenge, 15-6, with a barrage of base hits and stolen bases.

Ohio and Notre Dame meet in the first game today. The loser will be automatically knocked out of the running.

Four Pros Share In Memphis Open Lead

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI)—Eagles came easily Thursday to the four pros who fired 65's to the share the first round lead in the \$30,000 Memphis Open golf tournament, but the shadow of Ben Hogan loomed in the background.

Bob Rosburg, the portly PGA champion from Overland Park, Kan., was the only one of the four who failed to collect an eagle. Ken Venturi and young Bob Shave each recorded one, and Howie Johnson posted a pair over the par 34-36-70 Colonial Country Club course.

But their lead was challenged by Hogan, 48-year-old Texas hawk of the links, making one of his rare tournament appearances.

Hogan, playing from tee to green as he did in the years when he virtually cornered the golden glory of tournament golf, came in with a 66.

A misjudged three-foot putt on the 18th green was the main reason Hogan failed to join the leaders. He laid his approaches pin-high on virtually every green and if he had dropped his first putts the story could have been different.

Bunched at 67 were defending champion Don Whit, Jack Fleck, J.C. Goosie, Don January, Gary Player and Bob Brue. Bracketed at 68 were Tommy Jacobs, Buddy Sullivan, Dave Ragan, Dave Marr, Lionel Hebert and Paul Kelly.
