Favor Wage Boost For Railroaders

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A presidential fact-finding board today recommended a 5-cent an hour wage increase and improved health and welfare benefits for about 600,000 non-operating railroad workers.

The fact-finding panel made its report to the President in an effort to avert a threatened strike by the off-train employees. No walkout is legally authorized until July 8.

Eleven unions had asked the nation's railroads for a 25-cent hourly wage increase, longer vacations, two additional holidays and improved insurance programs.

The emergency board, noting what it called the "unsatisfactory" financial condition of the railroads, recommended settlement terms far below those sought by the unions.

It proposed a five-cent hourly pay hike effective July 1 to apply across-the-board. The non-operating workers — including clerks, telegraphers, shop craftsmen and others — now average slightly under \$2.50 an hour.

The board suggested that the railroads and the union negotiate a number of improvements in the health and welfare field in lieu of a further general wage increase in early 1961.

Pleads Not Guilty To Bank Robbery

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (UPI)—Edward Reiley, 38, pleaded innocent in federal court here Tuesday to charges that he robbed a Logansport branch bank of \$19,827 last Jan. 29.

Federal Judge Robert A. Grant then turned down a motion by defense attorney Metro M. Holovachka to have Reiley's bond reduced from \$50,000 and ordered the former Hamlet resident to stand jury trial July 25.

Reiley was arrested at Rockford, Ill., May 24 and accused of robbing the Eastgate Branch of the Farmers and Merchants State Bank at Logansport. He also faces questioning in connection with three other bank robberies in Iowa, Illinois and Indiana.

If convicted, Reiley could receive a maximum 20 year prison term on bank robbery charges and a 25 year sentence on an accompanying charge of assault in connection with the robbery.

The suspect's wife, a Gary beauty parlor owner now living in Hobart, attended the hearing. The couple has four children.

Willkie Pulls Out Of Republican Race

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (UPI)—The Republican race for lieutenant governor was down to three today after Philip H. Willkie of Rushville pulled out Tuesday night right in the middle of a campaign speech.

Willkie, a former state legislator, is the only son of Wendell L. Willkie, 1940 Republican nominee for president.

He was scheduled to speak at a 4th District meeting for GOP candidates sponsored by the Parker for - Governor Committee, Lt. Gov. Crawford Parker, the only candidate for governor at the party's state convention, and Mrs. Dorothy Gardner, who announced Tuesday as a candidate for state auditor, were other speakers.

Willkie told the group that "I am enough of a political realist to know that I cannot win the nomination for lieutenant governor this year. I am therefore withdrawing my name and will return to my affairs at Rushville."

Willkie has been campaigning more like a candidate for state superintendent of public instruction than for lieutenant governor. He also said that he was not seeking nomination for that office. However, he did not close the door to the possibility of a "draft."

Willkie is national chairman of the Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges but is not a professional educator.

In withdrawing, Willkie said he was willing to support any of the three remaining GOP candidates for the lieutenant governorship. They are State Sen. Richard O. Ristine, Crawfordsville; Alvin C. Cast, Kentland, former GOP chairman and now a member of the State Toll Road Commission, and Robert S. Webb, Arcadia, chairman of the Indiana Public Service Commission.

For the fourth time in recent weeks, the American Federation of Musicians, local 607, will make possible an orchestra dance free of charge, as they furnish the music at a teen dance at the Decatur Youth and Community Center Friday.

The funds to pay for these dances come from the union's recording and transcription fund. This fund has also provided free music at the Monmouth senior party, a Geneva alumni association dance, and during the all-night party after the graduation services at Decatur high school.

The local branch of the musician's union has a certain amount available to furnish these dances, and the only requirements are that they be open to the public, require no admission charge, and be sponsored by a worthy organization. Besides local dances, the local provides entertainment at the Veteran's hospital in Fort Wayne at least once a year.

Indianapolis Woman Found Badly Beaten

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—A woman's story that the men who abducted her said "we have killed before and we will kill again," sent police on a new quest today in the slaying of Lydia Fowler.

Mrs. Nellie Crum, 39, Indianapolis, was found badly beaten at Martinsville this morning. She was taken to Indianapolis General Hospital with a possible fracture of the shoulder and other injuries.

Police said three men were arrested on a variety of charges here later in a blood-stained car and questioned in connection with the Crum case. The men were identified as Paul Glover, 24, Donald Vaughn, 27, and Albert Hunter, 21, all of Indianapolis. They were charged with disorderly conduct and assault and battery with intent to rape, and may be charged additionally with robbery, police said.

Police said because of the statement attributed to her abductors by Mrs. Crum, they would question the three in the case of Miss Fowler, 17, New Whiteland, whose body was found beneath a Marion County bridge last November, about a month after she disappeared.

Sister-In-Law Of Decatur Man Dies

Mrs. W. G. Reynolds, 55, of York, Pa., died late Monday night in a hospital at York following a long illness. She is survived by her husband, a native of Bluffton; her mother, Mrs. Kathryn Stevens, also of York; one son, Robert L. 10 Escape Death In Two-Car Collision

LOGANSPORT, Ind. (UPI)—Seven young children and three adults narrowly escaped death in a two-car collision on U. S. 35 near the Logansport city limits Tuesday.

The children, all in one car, had just returned from an afternoon of strawberry-picking southeast of here.

Taken in fair condition to Memorial Hospital were Mrs. Howard Miller, 20; her daughter, Sherry, Lee, 7 months; her son, Michael, 2; Larry Derryberry, 12; his brother, Donald, 15, and Walter Dunn, 52, all of Logansport. Treated and released were Howard Miller, 20; his daughter, Peggy, 3; Dean Derryberry, 15, and his older sister, Mildred.

Sheriff's deputies said the accident occurred when Dunn attempted to make a U-turn on the highway and was struck by the car driven by Howard.
