## Another Civic Leader Passes

For the second time this year Decatur has been saddened by the untimely death of a prominent civic leader in the community.

Glenn Hill, just 57 years old, passed away early Thursday morning at the Adams county memorial hospital. Ill since last October, he had spent the winter in Florida. Medicine was able to keep him from pain, and he died peacefully in the night. Only last week he was still able to converse with friends, and had not been taken back to the hospital until Tuesday.

Mr. Hill was extremely well thought of, not only in Decatur, but throughout the state. He served as district governor of Lions International, and twice served as president of the local club.

He completely reorganized the local club during the 1958-59 year, and spearheaded the drive which secured an athletic field for the Decatur Catholic high school. He himself was a member of the Trinity E.U.B. church.

During the war he headed the ration board, and a section of his office in the Leland Smith Insurance agency was used as ration board headquarters.

He was an original member of the Decatur memorial foundation, which built the community center, and of the civic music association, which brings good music to Decatur in concert form every winter.

An active Mason and Elk, he was a native of Decatur, and a graduate of Ohio State University.

The counsel of Mr. Hill was often heeded by the city's leaders, and many of the most progressive moves made were done at his suggestion. Decatur has lost a real citizen and a good friend in the passing of Glenn V. Hill.

tion and the subject matter of the petition.

5. The city is a municipal corporation located in Adams county, Indiana, and owns and operates the electric utility service to approximately 4000 customers in and adjacent to the city; and petitioner renders electric utility service in the vicinity of the electric property.

6. Petitioner desires to acquire from the city the electric property for the price of \$2,099,100; such purchase and sale is to be pursuant to and in accordance with said written agreement, dated December 21, 1959, between city and petitioner and is in the form set forth in petitioner's exhibit No. 3; the said sale has been authorized by resolutions duly passed by the common council of the City on December 21, 1959 (petitioner's exhibit No. 3); the said sale of the electric property was submitted through a special election held on April 26, 1960 to the qualified voters of the City in accordance with Sections 48-7212 Burns Indiana Statutes, as amended, and more than a majority of the votes cast at said election voted in favor of said sale (petitioner's exhibit No. 5); and the said purchase by petitioner has been duly authorized, ratified and approved by its board of directors on April 28, 1960 (petitioner's exhibit No. 4).

7. The balance sheet of petitioner as of December 31, 1959 actual, and pro forma giving effect to the purchase of the electric property, is as set forth in petitioner's exhibit No. 8; the statement of income of petitioner for the twelve months ended December 31, 1959 actual, and pro forma giving effect to the said purchase of the electric property, are set forth in petitioner's exhibit No. 9.

8. Petitioner's exhibit No. 7 shows the book cost by primary accounts, and accrued depreciation, of the electric property; petitioner's exhibit No. 2 shows the appraised value of the electric property by three appraisers duly appointed by the Adams circuit court in accordance with Section 48-7211, Burns Indiana Statutes, 1933, as amended.

## Price Is Fair

9. The consideration of \$2,099,100 to be paid for the electric property represents a fair and reasonable purchase price for the same; the terms and conditions of the purchase of the electric property are fair and reasonable; the amount of consideration to be paid by petitioner for the electric property is not in excess of five percent (5%) of the book cost to it of all property, plants and business now owned by it at the time of the filing of this petition on May 2, 1960 in this cause.

10. Petitioner proposes upon acquiring the electric property to enter and show the purchase of the electric property on its journal or other books of account as proposed by petitioner and shown on petitioner's exhibit No. 12 introduced in evidence in this cause, all in conformity with the applicable uniform system of accounts as established by the commission, and further thereafter, upon approval by the commission to dispose of the utility plant acquisition adjustment account (No. 100.5) shown in petitioner's exhibit No. 12 by a credit to reserve for depreciation of utility plant account (No. 250).

11. The city under said written agreement of December 21, 1959 (petitioner's exhibit No. 3) has obligated itself to grant to petitioner a franchise having the effect of an indeterminate permit for the operation of the electric property in the city.

## To Expend \$1,533,500

12. Petitioner proposes upon acquiring the electric property to rehabilitate the same promptly so as to give more adequate, efficient and dependable service and assure the continuance of such quality of service, and in carrying out such rehabilitation program will expend approximately \$1,533,500; and no other public utility renders electric utility service in the city and no municipality other than the city is affected by the subject matter of said petition.

erty herein authorized and approved, petitioner shall, pursuant to and within the period specified by the uniform classification of accounts for electric utilities prescribed by the commission, present to the commission, and make in such petitioner's balance sheet accounts, such accounting entries (i) as are proper under said uniform classification of accounts for electric utilities in order to record the said purchase of the electric property, and such entries shall, subject to any further order of the commission, be recorded substantially in the manner shown by petitioner's exhibit No. 12; and (ii) as shall dispose of the amount in the utility plant acquisition adjustment account (No. 100.5) by a credit to reserve for depreciation of utility plant account (No. 250).

VII. Petitioner shall pay into the treasury of the state of Indiana through the secretary of this commission the sum of \$37.44, itemized as follows:

VIII. This order shall be and become effective immediately upon the entry hereof.

## Local Man Hurt In 1 Of 3 Wrecks

The Adams county sheriff's department investigated three wrecks Thursday night and this morning, including one personal injury wreck involving a Decatur man, sheriff Merle Affolder reported this noon.

Thursday night at 10:18 p. m. a car driven by Charles Francis Hagen, 32, 114 S. 13th street, left the southbound lane of U. S. 27, 2 miles north of Decatur, veering over into the east ditch, cutting a telephone pole in half and damaging trees and hedges. Hagen apparently fell asleep at the wheel and lost control of his car.

He was taken to the hospital with a severe laceration over his left eye and abrasions to the right shoulder and arm. He was kept at the hospital overnight, although the injuries were not too serious.

A car driven by Robert B. Martin, 20, of Middletown, O., blew a rear tire on highway 101 this morning, damaging the car and upsetting a trailer full of personal belongings which Martin was hauling.

Martin was headed north on 101 when his tire blew. The cause of the tire blowing was faulty brake drums, which overheated. Martin and his relatives, who were riding with him, were not injured, but there was approximately \$150 damage to the car and trailer. The accident occurred at 9:43 o'clock this morning, 3 miles east and 4 miles north of Decatur.

Also this morning at 10:15 a. m., on U. S. 27, 3 miles south of Decatur, a large semi-trailer truck driven by Kenneth M. White, 47, Terre Haute, got too far over the center line and struck a diesel engine full of powdered cement, which was driven by Glen L. Weldon, 30, of Howe, Ind. White's truck, which was southbound, struck Weldon's, who was headed north, in the left rear of the trailer. White's cab was a total loss and Weldon's truck had five of the eight tires blown. There was an estimated total of \$10,000 damage to the trucks.

## Restored Aluminum

It is possible to restore an aluminum skillet or pot, which is warped and does not set level on the stove. Heat the pan until a drop of cold water dances on it. Then take to the workshop, turn it upside down, place a board on it, and hit the board quite hard three or four times. The pan should then be as flat as when new.

The public is invited to open house and to our program.

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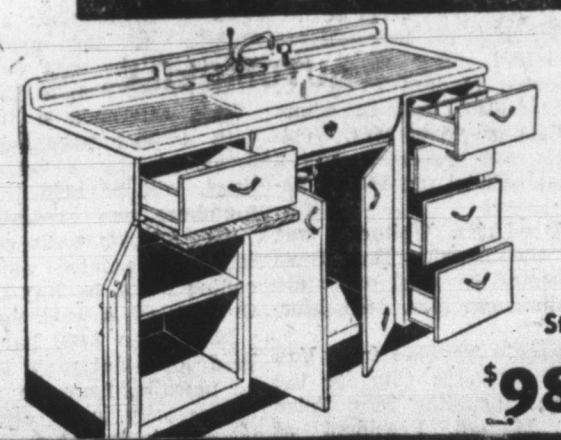

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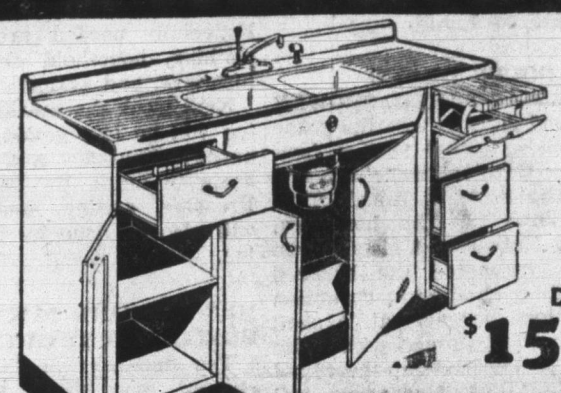
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
