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Buying Gasoline

As the number of gas-operated power mowers and other small motors increases, more than half of the families in Decatur are keeping gasoline setting around.

And probably half of these are unwittingly violating the law, endangering their own and their children's lives, and the validity of their fire insurance.

Indiana law requires that gasoline kept in smaller quantities than 50 gallons be kept in a red can. The can should be clearly marked gasoline, or naphtha, or benzine.

And kerosene, or other non-volatile petroleum products, may not be stored in red containers. This is to prevent gasoline from being mistaken for kerosene, and causing a terrible explosion or fire.

Yes, it is illegal to get gasoline in a glass jar. It is illegal for you to have it, and for the gas station attendant to sell it to you. Either may be fined from \$5 to \$75 and costs, and sentenced up to 90 days in jail.

The dangerous practice of keeping gasoline in glass jars rather than in plainly marked red cans may lead to a horrible fire that destroys you, your loved ones, or your home and property. And there is the possibility that your fire insurance may not be valid if you are violating the law by keeping gas in other than legal containers.

Indiana City To Get Taylor

June 11, 1940—German forces are within 12 miles of Paris as war rages on 4,000-mile front from Norway to Ethiopia.

The city has purchased new uniforms for the 16 members of the Decatur volunteer fire department. Yost Bros., Decatur, was awarded the general contract, at \$66,850, for the addition to the municipal power plant and building foundations.

COURT NEWS

Estate Cases

In the estate of Ellis C. Lehman, the renumeration of personal representative was filed. The bond was filed in the penal sum of \$10,000, with the Western Surety Co. by Glen H. Neuenchwander, Indiana resident agent and surety. The bond was approved. Letters of administration were issued to Larry H. Lehman, reported and confirmed.

In the Dan Kaehr estate, the schedule to determine inheritance tax was filed with reference to the county assessor.

In the estate of Purl E. Davies, the final account was filed, and the notice was ordered issued returnable July 1. The final account showed the total charges were \$38,147.37 and the total credits were \$31,461.80, leaving a sum of \$6,685.57.

In the Ottilla Yoder estate, the supplemental report showing distribution and the petition for discharge was filed, examined and approved. The executor, Theodore Yoder, was discharged and the sureties on the bond were discharged.

In the estate of William O. Biery, the personal representatives inventory was filed, examined and approved. The report showed the total appraised value of the estate to be \$14,941.78.

In the estate of Anna Long Bowen, the proof of mailing of notice to all persons interested in the estate was filed. The inheritance tax appraiser's report showed the net value of the estate to be \$34,240.51 and that there is tax due in the sum of \$195.57. The court further ordered that Adams county be allowed the sum of \$15.75 as appraisal fees to be certified to the county treasurer, being 8% of the total tax due. The penalty fee was waived.

Damages

In the case of Kenneth Busick vs. Rex N. Sheets, the complaint for damages was filed. A summons was issued to the sheriff of Adams county for the defendant returnable Sept. 6.

Divorce Cases

In the case of Wanda Belle Pottios vs Harry Pottios, the defendant was ordered to pay to the clerk the sum of \$200 for the plaintiff's attorney fees.

In the case of Carol Hoffman vs. Glen T. Hoffman, the affidavit showing failure to comply with the order was filed. A citation was ordered to the sheriff for the defendant, ordered returnable June 17, at 9 a.m.


