

Non-Partisan Judges

The Indiana State Bar Association has recently presented "The Indiana Plan" for revamping the courts of Indiana for so-called non-partisan selection of judges. It will take three bills in the state legislature to accomplish the purpose of the plan.

The basic features, as listed by the bar association, are:

1. The incumbent judge automatically is a candidate for reelection in the general (November) elections.
2. Any person wishing to seek judicial office can become a candidate by a very simple procedure.
3. Separate judicial ballot (or placement on voting machines) in both primary and fall elections.
4. The person securing the highest number of votes in the primary becomes opponent of incumbent in the fall. If incumbent judge does not run, the two persons receiving the largest number of votes become the candidates in the fall.
5. On the judicial ballot in the fall election the incumbent's name is listed first, with the words "present judge" following.
6. Judicial candidates are forbidden to take an active part in political campaigns in primary or general election; may not make contributions to political parties or to political party candidates, etc.; political parties prohibited from "slating" or otherwise recommending particular judicial candidate on a basis of party affiliation.

The advantages of the plan, according to the bar association, are:

1. The "Indiana Plan" can be placed in effect without the necessity of a constitutional amendment or amendments.
2. Judges will receive reasonable security in office or "tenure" but will remain directly answerable to the voters.
3. Voters will have an opportunity to pass on the performance in office of judges at reasonably frequent intervals.
4. With politics eliminated, in judicial campaigns, the issue will be initial qualification for office or performance in office, thereby making it possible for civic and professional groups to bring their views forcibly to the attention of the public.
5. The judicial office will attract, and keep, better qualified lawyers for the reason that judges no longer will have to stand the expense of political contributions, payment of filing fees, and the expense of conventional political campaigning.
6. By virtue of being freed of their responsibilities to the political party and of the need to keep political fences mended, judges will be able to give complete time and attention to the work of the courts with resulting improvement in dispatch of judicial business.

This presents the Indiana State Bar Association's side of the story. Tomorrow we will discuss the other side of the question.

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Petition Further Cancer Drug Test

A Decatur "citizens emergency committee for Krebiozen" has been formed in Decatur to circulate petitions calling for a "double-blind" test of Krebiozen, a controversial cancer drug.

The controversy developed in 1951, when the American Medical Association in a report in their journal, based on a six-weeks report on 100 case histories. This report indicated that Krebiozen had no clinical value in the treatment of cancer.

Doctor Fired

Dr. Andrew C. Ivy, then vice-president of Illinois University, was fired from that position for continuing to call for more investigation of the drug. He continues as distinguished professor of physiology and head of the department of clinical science.

Dr. Ivy has charged under oath that at least 23 of the 100 cases outlined in the AMA story were falsified, and ten of the cases testified in 1953 to a commission of the Illinois general assembly on Krebiozen, making a legal protest because they had been reported as dead or dying two years earlier.

Hill Heads Group

Robert Hill, Decatur policeman, is one of several local men circulating the petition, which does not discuss the merits of the drug, but only calls for a further test of the material.

According to literature put out by the committee, Krebiozen is not recommended until all orthodox treatments including surgery and radiation have failed. It is not available through normal distribution channels and this is one of the issues at stake. Krebiozen is in extremely limited supply and it is not sold. It is available for investigational use to doctors under the rules and regulations of federal law. Modern Etiquette

A. "My dear Ruth: It will give us all great pleasure if you will visit our home on any week-end that you and Bill decide upon. We shall be looking forward to seeing you. Very sincerely yours, Elizabeth Thompson."
