Johansson And Patterson To Fight Tonight

NEW YORK (UPI) — Floyd Patterson, bucking the odds and tradition, will try to recapture the world heavyweight championship tonight from unbeaten Ingemar Johansson, Sweden's dimpled dynamiter, in their international return fight at the Polo Grounds. An expected crowd of 40,000 in the former Giants ball park will watch as 25-year-old Patterson of Rockville Centre, N.Y., attempts to become the first man in ring history to win back the heavyweight crown. And the first to take Ingoo with a professional defeat.

None of the eight who previously tried to recover the title were able to do it. And the betting is 8-3 that Floyd doesn't turn the trick.

Brawny Johansson, who floored Floyd seven times for a third round technical knockout in their first fight last June 26, apparently wasn't fretting about the return. He appeared personally on a 10:30 p.m. e.d.t. television show Sunday night — the night before his first defense.

Sleeps Like A Baby
Surprised sports writers asked the brown-haired champion in the natty blue tropical suit if Sunday night's late outing might interfere with tonight's performance at 10:30 p.m. e.d.t. under the ring lights.

"No," he said. "I get to bed late. I sleep like a baby — late, till maybe 10:30 and get up feeling fine for the weigh-in."

It was reported without confirmation that he received \$2,000 for his appearance as mystery guest on the TV show "What's My Line?" His identity was quickly established.

Tonight Ingemar and Floyd are expected to pick up about \$50.00 each for their scheduled 15-rounds as their shares of the "live" gate of perhaps \$800.00 at the park and the receipts from theater-television, radio, movies, etc., expected to total about \$2,500.

Home TV
There will be no home television, but ABC will radio it to homes nationally. It will also be carried by radio in six languages to 26 foreign countries.

Champion and ex-champion motored into New York from their respective camps Sunday — Johansson from Grossinger, N.Y., and Patterson from Newton, Conn.

During their six weeks of training Patterson indicated in his sparring sessions that he would carry the fight to into this time

Kentucky Beats Indiana, North All-Stars Win

It was back to drills today for Indiana's high school basketball All-Stars, trounced solidly by Kentucky at Indianapolis Saturday night, while the North set its sights on a two-game sweep in its intrastate series with the South.

Kentucky's underdog stars, led by the brilliant Jeff Mullins of Lexington, Lafayette with 26 points, dumped the Hoosiers before more than 14,000 surprised Butler Fieldhouse fans, 95-86.

The North, acting like it owned Roberts Memorial Stadium at Evansville, tripped the down-staters with awesome ease, 90-56.

The two chaps meet again in Fort Wayne Tuesday, while Indiana hopes to salvage some prestige by taking the return scrap with Kentucky at Louisville Saturday.

It was only the third time in the colorful history of the 20-year series that Kentucky pulled off a triumph at Indianapolis Saturday.

Finest Triumph

And the boys from the Bluegrass, trailing by 10 points early in the game, virtually dominated the final 20 minutes to rack up their finest triumph since they licked the Hoosiers three years ago, 91-71, and swept the two-game show.

Mullins, 6-7 Bill Smothers, Gene Pendleton, Larry Holt and Tom Finnigan wrecked Indiana with a well-balanced scoring punch and well-honed pattern offense. Smothers, a giant on the boards, also dropped 17 points. Holt 15, and Pendleton chipped in with four timely baskets.

Against that tough offense, Indiana countered with Muncie Central's hot-shooting Ron Bonham whose 32 points garnered the "Star of Stars" award. But the next-best for the Hoosiers was 10 markers apiece by Mel Garland of Indianapolis Tech and John Dampier, Bonham's hometown teammate.

In April he won the Masters by birdying the last two holes. In the heat of a June day near the foothills of the snow-capped Rocky Mountains Saturday he came from seven strokes back to win the Open—the most prized title in golf. He did it with the greatest come-back the game ever has known. He won the U.S. Open championship with a par-busting round of 65, six-under par.
