

Bid For Draft Of Stevenson Still Simmers

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The effort to draft Adlai E. Stevenson for a third try at the White House is still simmering with no apparent cook in the political kitchen.

Nonetheless his supporters expect Stevenson's bid to burgeon if Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts fails to wrap up the Democratic presidential nomination on an early ballot.

Sen. A. S. Mike Monroney of Oklahoma, a Stevenson supporter, calls the draft campaign a movement "with all Indians and no chiefs." He and former Sen. Herbert H. Lehman of New York are

writing letters to national convention delegates with whom they are acquainted, urging a Stevenson nomination, and they have the backing of Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt.

Lehman Denied Seat
But neither Monroney nor Lehman can vote for Stevenson at the national convention. Monroney's entire state delegation is pledged to Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson. Lehman was denied a seat in the New York delegation.

A small cubby hole office is functioning here as a sort of clearing house for Stevenson clubs reported to be active in 46 states.

It tells the clubs where they can buy items like campaign buttons and bumper stickers and mails out information dealing with Stevenson as a possibility for the nomination. Stevenson himself has given the movement no encouragement beyond making it clear that he would accept a draft.

Official Nomination Doubtful

As the draft-Stevenson campaign now stands, it is doubted that the twice-defeated candidate's name ever will be officially placed in nomination. Even so, he is expected to poll the votes of a small bloc of delegates—running behind Kennedy, Johnson and Sen. Stuart Symington of Missouri.

If the combined vote of Kennedy's opponents and a holdout by the New England senator deny the New England senator the nomination, Johnson presumably then would make his run for the prize. However, there has been no evidence yet of a major Johnson breakthrough in the pivotal Northern states with the big blocs of national convention votes.

Unless Johnson can crack those states, Stevenson and Symington presumably would inherit most of the Kennedy delegates.

Reds Building Case To End Conference

GENEVA (UPI) — Communist members of the ten-nation disarmament conference accused the West today of "continuing to evade businesslike discussions on disarmament."

The five-nation communist statement issued after today's four minute meeting was taken by the West to mean that the Russians were building up a case for breaking off the conference when American delegate Fredrick Easton returned from Washington, D. C.

He and French delegate Jules Moch were still in their home capitals for consultations on the Soviet disarmament plan.

The Communists have accused the Western powers of stalling on presenting a counterproposal to their June 2 disarmament plan. "The delegations of the United

States and of the other Western powers do not, on their part submit any proposals, and do not reply to the lawful questions of the delegations of Socialist Communist states regarding the most important problems of general and complete disarmament," said the Communist statement.

"One is getting an impression that the United States of America and its allies are interested not in reaching progress in the disarmament negotiations, but in turning the negotiations into endless marking time or in bringing them in general to failure," it said.

State Traffic Toll 445 Through Sunday

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Indiana added 19 traffic fatalities to its 1960 toll last week, raising the total for the year to 445. The number compared with 15 in the corresponding week of 1959. The year's toll compares with 428 for the same time in 1959.

Three Cities Drop In Population Rank

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Census figures from Washington showed today that three of Indiana's five largest cities lost a little national ranking prestige despite population gains since 1950.

Indianapolis dropped from 23rd place to 26th among the nation's most populous cities despite a 10 per cent gain in population in the 10-year period.

Fort Wayne, in spite of a 20 per cent population increase, moved backward, from 70th to 77th in size, and South Bend, despite a 14 per cent gain, dropped from 88th to 91st position.

Most spectacular climb was Hammond, which moved from the "also ran" grouping along with 26 other American cities which passed the 100,000 population mark. They raised to 130 the number of U.S. cities with that much popula-

tion. Hammond became the nation's 110th largest city.

Gary and Evansville showed gains in the ranking. Evansville moved up to 80th place from 94th, and Gary up from 71st to 70th.

The Indianapolis loss from 23rd to 26th position was due to more dramatic population gains by San Antonio, Tex., San Diego, Calif., Atlanta, Ga., Denver, Colo., and Memphis, Tenn. The loss would have been even more pronounced except that Kansas City, Mo., had only a negligible increase and Newark, N.J., actually lost nearly 10 per cent population. Those two cities in the 1950 census were ahead of Indianapolis.

Princess Grace Is Home For Funeral

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Princess Grace and Prince Rainier of Monaco arrived here early today to attend the funeral of the princess' father.

Her father, John B. Kelly Sr., 70, died of cancer at his home Monday.

Gary Girl Is First Indiana Polio Case

EAST CHICAGO, Ind. (UPI) — Indiana's first polio case of 1960 was reported today, a three-year-old Gary girl.

Authorities said Cynthia White, daughter of the Edward Whites of Gary, was listed in "fairly good" condition at St. Catherine's hospital here. They said her case was diagnosed as "slightly paralytic" Tuesday.

The child was stricken while staying with her grandmother here. She had three anti-polio shots.

At Indianapolis, State Board of Health figures showed that two cases reported previously in the state this year as polio later were removed due to new diagnoses.

The weekly morbidity report showed no polio cases this year, compared with 11 this time last year and a five-year median of 16.
