Ask Indictment Of Saxophone Player

BALTIMORE (UPI)—The government will ask a federal grand jury today to indict a 31-year-old itinerant saxophone player accused of murdering five persons, including four members of the Carroll Jackson family in Virginia.

The musician is lanky, handsome Melvin Davis Rees Jr., being held on \$100,000 bond in Memphis, Tenn. His arrest Friday touched off police efforts to pin on him a series of unsolved murders dating back more than seven years.

Investigators were reported to have found at the home of Rees' parents in Hyattsville, Md., a .38 caliber pistol in an accordion case and a handwritten account of the January, 1959, kidnap-murder of Mr. and Mrs. Carroll V. Jackson and their two little daughters.

Leon H. A. Pierson, U.S. attorney for Maryland, will ask the grand jury to indict Rees for the kidnaping of Mrs. Jackson, 27, and her 5-year old daughter, Susan Ann, whose bodies were found in a shallow grave near Gambrille, Md., two months after they disappeared.

The federal kidnapping statute carries the death penalty. The federal government cannot prosecute for murder.

Virginia state police have charged Rees with murdering Jackson, 29, and the couple's other daughter, 18-month-old Janet, whose bodies were found near Fredericksburg, Va.

A rash of traffic accidents which claimed at least 13 lives last weekend continued today in Indiana.

At least seven highway deaths occurred since Sunday midnight. Two persons were killed Monday in a head-on collision on U. S. 41 near Schneider-Rosa Brown, 49, and James Russellburg, 28, both of Chicago.

John Spurgeon, 21, Salem, was burned to death in the cab of his truck in a two-truck crash on U. S. 31 northwest of Noblesville.

Boehning was killed Monday night when his motor scooter collided with a car.

Pippinger was killed this morning when his car hit a bridge abutment.

Train Educators In Airborne Television
BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (UPI)—The first of a two-month series of workshops to acquaint 1,500 educators in six Midwest states with a plan for airborne television instruction has begun at Indiana University and Miami University, Oxford, Ohio.

Similar school sessions will take place at other schools during July and August regarding a program being developed at Purdue University to beam video-taped courses from an airplane to schools in Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin beginning Jan. 30, 1961.

Miss Martha Gable, director of radio-television in the Philadelphia, Pa., public school system told the I. U. workshop Monday that television instruction is no cure-all for mass education.

Despite the fact that TV classroom instruction has been highly successful, she said, the key to success still lies with the classroom teacher.

Other workshops will be held: July 11: Indiana State Teachers College; University of Notre Dame and Northwestern University.

July 18: Butler University; DePaul University, Chicago; University of Louisville, and University of Kentucky.

July 25: Ball State Teachers College; Ohio State University; Northern Illinois University, and University of Illinois.

Aug. 1: Purdue University; Bowling Green State University; Michigan State University, and University of Wisconsin at Milwaukee.

Aug. 8: Western Michigan University and Wayne State University.

Col. Harold S. Zeis, superintendent of the Indiana state police, will arrive in Decatur Monday by helicopter to speak at the banquet, Monday evening at the rural mail carriers' convention. He will speak to the carriers about safety. In conjunction with his talk, a mobile safety exhibit, about the size of a bus, will be in Decatur. The mobile exhibit will have in it outstanding pictures of some fantastic traffic accidents and other exhibits on safety.

Zeis is a native of Fort Wayne, and has been in the law enforcement profession since 1935. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II and recently served two terms as sheriff of Allen county. He left the sheriff's job in January of 1957, when he became superintendent of the Indiana state police department.

Zeis is an advocate of police training and has completed many special police training courses, including the federal bureau of investigation, national academy. He has served as president of the Indiana sheriffs' association and in that capacity was responsible for getting the sheriffs of the 92 counties in uniform and the standard marking and color for sheriffs' cars. In 1955 he was selected as "Sheriff of the Year" and served on the board of governors of the national sheriffs' association.
