Five Army Officers Are Killed In Crash

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Five Army officers were killed and one is missing in the crash of an L-20 aircraft at the Gamboa docking area in the Panama Canal Zone Monday, the Defense Department announced today.

All of the officers were members of the 2nd Battle Group, 10th Infantry Regiment, stationed at Ft. William D. Davis, Canal Zone.

The cause of the crash was not known immediately and an investigation is under way, the department said.

FBI Smashes Plot To Blow Up Dormitory

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI) — The FBI smashed what it called a "sinister plot" to blow up a Negro college dormitory with 40 sticks of dynamite early today, two hours before a bomb blasted a hole in the side of a public school warehouse.

A spokesman for the FBI in Washington said quick action by FBI agents "may have saved some lives." But Dr. R. E. Arnold, dean of instruction at Philander Smith College, which owned the dormitory, said no students were in the building. The FBI arrested three men.

The bomb at the warehouse blew a hole in a wall.

The FBI arrested Emmett E. Miller, 44, and Robert Lloyd Parks, 39, whom Casper said, they caught touching a match to a candle that would have touched off a fuse leading to 40 sticks of dynamite in a black box.

FBI agents arrested Hugh Lynn Smith, 33, Bassett, Ark., at his home.

Miller, Parks and Smith were the first persons arrested under anti-bombing provisions of the new civil rights law.

Confirms Request For Use Of Troops

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States confirmed today that the new country of Congo had requested American troops to help restore order in its riot-torn land.

Secretary of State Christian A. Herter planned to discuss the matter later today with United Nations officials.

Defense Secretary Thomas S. Gates Jr. said "There has been a request for U.S. troops."

Gates said the United States was prepared to send troops anywhere in the world, if requested, on peace-restoring missions.

FBI agents would not make any immediate comment on whether the three men arrested were responsible for the warehouse explosion as well as for the plot to blow up the dormitory building on the college campus.

The warehouse is located about 10 blocks from Central High School. The college is also in the same general vicinity.

The State Department denied reports that the U.S. ambassador to the Congo, Clare Timberlake, had "agreed in principle" with the troop request.

"He did not agree in principle with it," State Department press officer Lincoln White said. "He only agreed to transmit the request to Washington."

White said it was not clear whether the Congo was asking this country to send troops independently of any United Nations action.

The department said Timberlake also reported a serious food shortage in Leopoldville. He said the Congo government had asked the United States to rush 100 tons of flour there. He said this was being considered on an "urgent basis."

White said no decision had been made in the State Department on how to handle the troop request.

"We are in touch with the United Nations on the troop request," he added.

The developments delayed Herter's departure for U.S.-Canadian defense talks in Canada. Gates said Herter had not cancelled the trip but may go to Canada Wednesday.

Four Persons Dead In Crash Of Car, Truck

WESTVILLE, Ind. (UPI) — Four persons, three of them brothers and sisters, were killed today when a car heading for Purdue University to enroll in fall classes ran in front of a big truck and was crushed beneath its huge wheels.

The dead were identified as Kay Ann Preston, 19, Gary; her sister, Carol Sue, 17; their brother, John, 5, and Lynn Konrad, 18, Gary.

Injured were the Preston children's mother Mrs. Carolyn Preston, 42, and the driver of the truck, Harold Irving, 27, Malinta, Ohio. Both were reported hurt seriously.

State police said the accident happened about 6:30 a.m. as the Preston family and Miss Konrad drove into U.S. 6 at its intersection with U.S. 421 in Westville.
