

Seeks Support For Castro At United Nations

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—Cuban Foreign Minister Raul Roa scheduled a series of meetings today with Communist, Latin-American and African delegates in an effort to whip up support for Premier Fidel Castro in his diplomatic battle with the United States.

The Castro regime called Monday on the U.N. Security Council to consider what it termed United States "aggressions" against Cuba. The U.S. promptly denounced the allegations but said it would not oppose the meeting because it wanted the world "to know the truth."

The Communist bloc is expected to back Castro to the hilt. Roa conferred Monday with Soviet Chief Delegate Arkady A. Sobolev and Fedos N. Grynayov of Byelorussia.

Diplomatic observers said the Castro move apparently was the first step by the bearded Cuban revolutionary leader to build himself up as the Latin American champion of the small nations of the world against American "imperialists." Last Thursday Castro pictured Cuba as the "leader" of newly-developing states in their struggle to shake off the bonds of "imperialism." On Friday he served notice he was organizing a worldwide propaganda campaign "to mobilize world public opinion in protest against (U.S.) aggressions."

Ambassador Jose A. Correa of Ecuador is currently president of the Security Council under the ro-

tation system. It was to him that Roa submitted the Cuban indictment of the United States, charging "repeated threats, harassment, maneuvers, reprisals and aggressions."

Correa said he could not set a date for a session until he has conferred with U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold.

Mercury Hits 80 All Over Indiana

A broad wave of temperatures in the 80s with high humidity enveloped Hoosierland today, but early prospects of a warm and humid week devoid of relief may not be fulfilled.

Readings in the mid and upper 80s were expected today and Wednesday over most of the state, but the outlook for Thursday was "mostly fair and pleasant," which would indicate a little cooler and less humid.

The mercury hit the 80s all around Hoosierland Monday, including 81 at Lafayette, 83 at Indianapolis, 84 at South Bend, 85 at Cincinnati and Louisville, 86 at Fort Wayne and 88 at Evansville.

Overnight lows were in the 60s, ranging from 60 at Goshen to 68 at Evansville.

Highs today will range from the mid 80s in the far north to near 90 in the south. Lows tonight will range from the mid 60s to the low 70s, and highs Wednesday will range from the upper 70s in the north to the upper 80s in the south.

Widely scattered afternoon and evening thundershowers were seen as possible in most areas of the state today or Wednesday and in the extreme south Thursday.

Latin Americans Hope To End Split

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A growing number of Latin American countries threw their support today behind an emergency meeting of hemisphere foreign ministers to try to mend the widening split between the United States and Cuba.

The Latin American nations hoped such a meeting would stave off a U.N. Security Council debate on the U.S.-Cuban controversy where Russia and other Communist countries could meddle in the troubled Caribbean waters.

Cuba Monday accused the United States of economic aggression and asked for an immediate U.N. Security Council session to consider the charge.

The countries reported to be pushing for a foreign ministers meeting of the 21-nation Organization of American States were Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, Venezuela and Uruguay.

These nations hoped an inter-American foreign ministers meeting also would head off a formal U.S. complaint to the OAS that Cuba was becoming a Communist satellite, thereby endangering

hemisphere security.

Officials reported that the United States would be willing to take part in an inter-American foreign ministers conference on the Cuban crisis. Cuba also was believed willing to attend if urged by Latin American neighbors rather than the United States.

Winamac Publisher Carl Riddick Dead

COLUMBIA CITY, Ind. (UPI)—Carl W. Riddick, 88, an Indiana weekly newspaper publisher at Winamac for years and former secretary of the Indiana Republican State Committee, died Saturday at his home in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

Riddick's death was announced by his brother, Foster W. Riddick, former Columbia City newspaperman. Services and burial will be held Thursday at Annapolis, Md., Riddick's former home. Riddick published the Winamac Republican from 1898 to 1910. He was GOP state secretary from 1908 to 1910. In 1910, he moved to Montana and engaged in farming. In 1918, he was elected to Congress from Montana and served a two-year term.

More Enforcement Personnel Needed

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—The National Safety Council has informed Indiana that it needs more enforcement personnel for policing rural highways.

That was one of the recommendations for improving the state's overall traffic safety activities contained in a comprehensive analysis of the 1959 safety and control program which was submitted to Governor Handley today.

The Indiana Traffic Safety Foundation said other recommendations for improvements were: —Provision of adequate budget for the major traffic safety agencies, including the Indiana Office of Traffic Safety, the driver improvement section of the Motor Vehicle Bureau and the division of school traffic safety education in the State Department of Public Instruction.

—Enactment of a periodic motor vehicle inspection program.

—Expansion of the driver education program for high school students.

—Further intensification of the statewide traffic safety educational program.

Find Man's Body In Capital Reservoir

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—An autopsy showed today that a man whose nude body was found in Geist reservoir Monday was strangled with a plastic clothesline.

The body has not been identified. It is that of a man believed to have been 25 to 35 years old, six feet tall and weighing 200 pounds.

Police said the body had been wrapped in a bed sheet, bound with clothesline and weighted down with four 33-pound cement blocks.

Fingerprints were obtained from one hand which sheriff's investigators Charles Haine and Harold Goodman said might help to identify the body.

Examiners said the body was believed to have been in the water a week.

Seven tattoos were found on various parts of the body, including a number 13 on the left hand between thumb and forefinger; a Maltese cross on the right thigh; a cupid figure on the left forearm, a flying eagle on the left thigh and a Mexican girl wearing a hat on the right shoulder.

Three Servicemen Hurt In Accident

PERU, Ind. (UPI)—Three servicemen stationed at Bunker Hill Air Force Base were injured today and three other persons were charged with traffic violations as the result of a chain reaction collision near the base entrance gate.

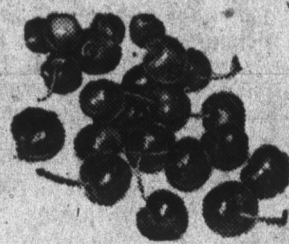
Authorities said the crashes occurred after a big truck, its load too high to get under a railroad overpass, stopped on U. S. 31.

The truck was not involved in the crashes. But the first car which stopped behind the vehicle was hit from the rear, and a third car hit the second. Then another car stopped behind the pile-up and was hit also.

Injured slightly were Lawrence Herbst, 22; Irving Young, and Calvin Hariston.

Another airman, Willie L. Hampton, 23, in whose car Young and Hariston were riding, was charged with having no operator's license. Trucker Harold P. Dunnell, 35, Fort Wayne, was charged with improper hauling. Airman Hollis J. Wilson Jr., 24, was charged by state police with driving too fast "under prevailing conditions."

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
