## G.O.P. Steps Up Activities For Convention

CHICAGO (UPI)—Republican activity spurted from all corners today in preparation for next week's national convention.

Key point of the day was expected to be a late-afternoon news conference scheduled by New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller. It was heralded as a possible start to a showdown between Rockefeller and Vice President Nixon.

Separate news conferences also were planned by GOP National Chairman Thruston B. Morton and by Charles Percy, chairman of the Republican Platform Committee.

Rockefeller was to appear Tuesday before the platform committee. Morton said he, too, would attend that committee meeting.

**Renew "Liberation" Pledge**  
Earlier, Morton said his endorsement of a Nixon-Rockefeller ticket was not meant to "badger" Rockefeller into accepting the second spot. Morton said he knew

nothing of Rockefeller's claim to have refused an "unofficial" offer to second Nixon's nomination for the presidency.

Morton told a rally marking "Captive Nations Week" that the Republican Party would "renew its pledge" to "press" for the liberation of satellite states.

"Steadily through the years as the Red wave of Communism swept over Eastern Europe and other once-free nations my party has made, and kept, a pledge to press forward for liberation," Morton said. "At next week's convention, I can assure you, my party will renew its pledge."

### Other Action

In other action Sunday: Percy named chairmen for eight platform subcommittees.

Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona said his name would be submitted as a favorite son candidate for the presidency but he would not actively campaign unless it appeared Rockefeller was about to gain the nomination.

Construction crews hurried last-minute arrangements to prepare the International Amphitheater for the expected 1,331 Republican delegates, another 1,331 alternates and newsmen and spectators. Banners already were hoisted to their ceiling positions but chairs were not yet in place.

## 4-H Committees To Meet Tuesday Night

The building and executive committees of the county 4-H fair grounds in Monroe will meet Tuesday evening at the kitchen to discuss the possibility of additional building this year.

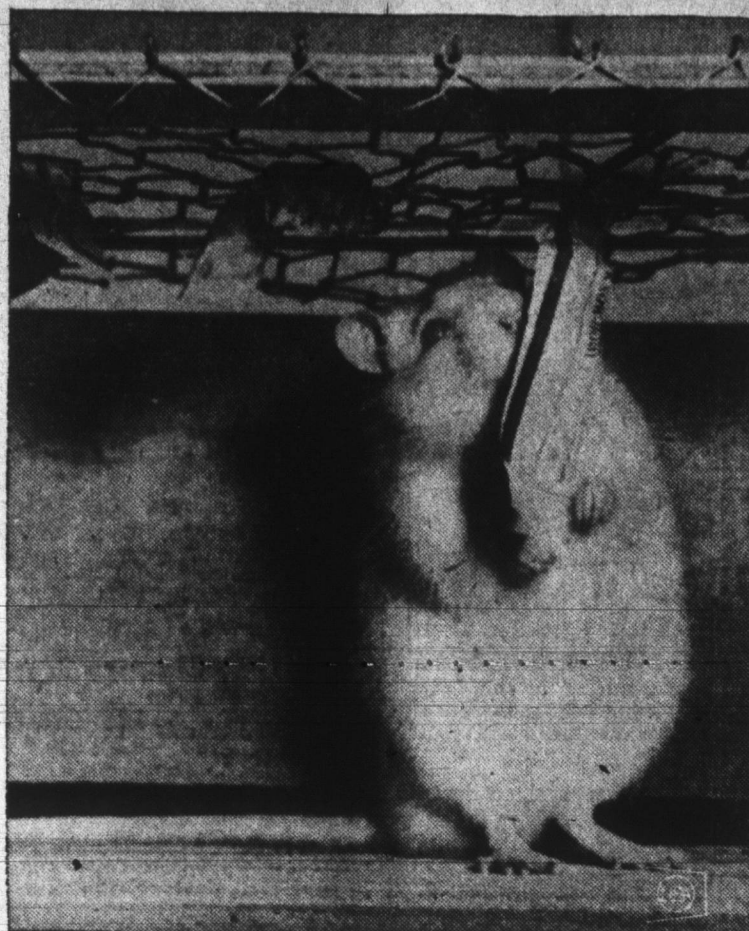

## Two Men Killed By Indiana Man's Car

CHICAGO (UPI)—A policeman and a pedestrian were killed Sunday night when an Indiana motorist allegedly tried to avoid arrest and smashed into a police motor-cycle.

Melvin Goffmeyer, 33, driver of the three-wheel police cycle, and Albert Eiserman, 47, were killed. Eiserman was standing on a corner and was struck when the car careened to the sidewalk after hitting the cycle.

The driver of the car was identified as Larry Benford, 22, Gary, Ind. Benford and a passenger in his car were taken to South Chicago Hospital for treatment.

## Republicans Study Party's Platform

CHICAGO (UPI)—Republican leaders said today their party will adopt a "realistic" platform on civil rights instead of trying to "outpromise the Democrats" in a bid for northern Negro votes.

Chairman Charles H. Percy of the GOP platform-drafting committee charged that the platform adopted by Democrats at Los Angeles last week makes "unrealistic" promises on civil rights which can't be kept.

Republican National Chairman Thruston Morton and Percy held a joint news conference to discuss the GOP platform. The drafting committee opens public hearings Tuesday.

Percy predicted that Republican platform would be written "along somewhat moderate lines as in the past" despite the ultra-liberal tone of the Democratic platform. "We'll not try to outpromise the Democrats," he said.

The Democratic plank made so many promises on civil rights that it threatened to weaken the support of the traditional solid South for the Democratic ticket despite the nomination of Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.) as the Democratic vice presidential candidate.

In contrast, Percy said, "the Republican platform will point toward strengthening of the two-party system in the South."

Percy indicated that the Republican strategy for wooing Negro votes in the North will be to attempt to persuade them that the "unrealistic" Democratic promises are meaningless because the Democrats don't intend to fulfill them.

He noted wryly that Democrats promised to eliminate the poll tax and asked "if this is true why hasn't Johnson done this in his own state." Texas is one of the few states where a poll tax is still levied.

On other platform issues the news conference developed these points:

**Medical Aid for the Elderly:** There seemed to be general agreement this would be the hardest plank on which to hammer out agreement. Percy acknowledged sharp conflict between Gov. Nelson Rockefeller and Vice President Richard Nixon on whether such a program should be set up within the framework of the social security system. Democrats already have adopted a plank similar to Rockefeller's views.

**Defense Policy:** Percy said he believed his committee would draft a plank that would be acceptable to the Eisenhower administration, to Nixon and to Rockefeller and still be specific. Rockefeller has insisted that the government should be spending three billion dollars a year more for defense.

**Farm:** Rep. Melvin R. Laird (R-Wis.), vice chairman of the platform committee, said the Republicans weren't going to join the Democrats in calling for a return to fixed price supports of 90 percent of parity. He said he didn't think Nixon would want to try to get farm belt votes that way.

## Fort Wayne Boy Is Drowned In Ohio

COLDWATER, Ohio (UPI)—John Osterholt, 10, Fort Wayne, one of nine children of the Anthony Osterholts, drowned in a municipal swimming pool here Sunday.

Authorities said the boy apparently slipped to the bottom of the pool unnoticed while using a slide. His body was found by lifeguard John Slater in 11 1/2 feet of water at the deep end of the pool.

The Osterholts were visiting relatives here, police said.

## Phil Willkie May Be Thorn To State GOP

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—Phil H. Willkie may be as big a thorn in the side of the Indiana delegation to the Republican national convention as was his father, Wendell Willkie, 20 years ago.

Willkie, 40, has an issue, a rather popular one that led to his nomination for state superintendent of public instruction. It is the elimination of frills and soft courses in public grade and high schools and universities.

That issue, which has aroused a degree of attention from fond parents, has fascinated Willkie to such an extent that he will try to cash in on it at the GOP national gathering, probably over the opposition of the Hoosier GOP pros.

He has planned to parlay that issue before the convention resolutions committee, but with a financial twist. His program seeks adoption of a resolution for federal income tax exemption to parents and self-supporting students for college expenses, including board and room, books and tuition.

### Cost A Billion

Willkie admits that U. S. Treasury officials have estimated that the proposal will cost a billion dollars a year, or 1.21 per cent of the federal budget, but he adds:

"This means that the politicians and bureaucrats in Washington will have a billion dollars less to spend on some federal program."

Also, Willkie has developed some feelings of grandeur because a newspaper on the West Coast suggested him as a possible nominee for the vice-presidential nomination. This proposal came after Willkie, who is national chairman of the Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges and an alternate delegate to the national convention, made a number of speeches in California just before the Democratic national convention in Los Angeles.

**Ideas Are Needed**  
"We Republicans must have many ideas if we are going to beat the Kennedys," Willkie has said. "They are a powerful, a purposeful, and a determined family. They have wanted the presidency for many years. Joe Kennedy wanted it in my father's time. Jack wants it now. Allowing parents to write off college expenses on their federal income tax is one idea that might be helpful to obtain a Republican victory in 1960."

The conservative stalwarts who rule the Indiana Republican party are not likely to encourage Willkie's maneuver on the theory that he has achieved enough mileage already from the Willkie name.

They include Governor Handley, the delegation chairman; Lt. Gov. Crawford F. Parker, the gubernatorial nominee; Sen. Homer E. Capehart, former Sen. William E. Jenner; former Gov. Ralph F. Gates, national committeeman; state chairman Edwin W. Beaman, and the Hoosier members of the resolutions committee, Douglas McDonald, Princeton, and Mrs. Martha Whitehead, state vice-chairman.

Wendell Willkie, however, beat the Indiana pros and captured the presidential nomination 20 years ago. It remains to be seen what his boy can do.

## Powers Trial Set To Open August 17

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Tass news agency announced today that the trial of American U-2 pilot Francis Gary Powers will begin Aug. 17.

Tass said the case would be "an open court session" of the military college of the nation's supreme court.

Powers, 31, Albany, Ga., was shot down by a Soviet rocket on May 1 near Sverdlovsk while making what the Russians called a spy flight from Pakistan to Norway.

Powers was charged officially with espionage a week ago. The decision to try him was made by the military college of the supreme court, Tass said.

The charge carries a maximum sentence of death and a minimum of seven years imprisonment.

The court which will try Powers is the same body of the Soviet legal system that heard Stalin's famous purge trials of the 1930s.

Under Soviet law Powers is entitled to a defense attorney appointed by the court.

Powers presumably is still being held in the Moscow area. Repeated attempts by the U. S. embassy to talk to him have been ignored by Russian officials.

Under Soviet law there is no appeal from a decision by the court.

## Baby Boy Is Born To Audrey Hepburn

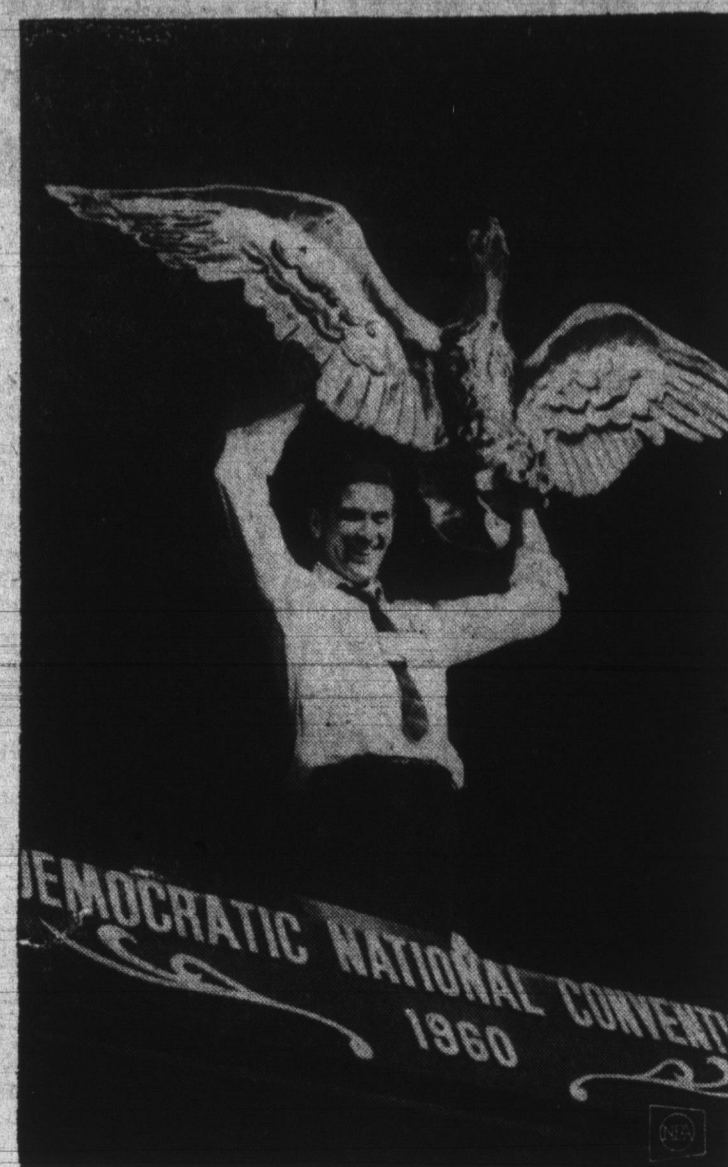
LUCERNE, Switzerland (UPI)—Screen actress Audrey Hepburn, 34, gave birth to a boy Sunday, her first child.

## Anti-Castro Pilot Flees To Jamaica

KINGSTON, Jamaica (UPI)—The anti-Castro pilot of a Miami-bound Cuban airliner forced the co-pilot at gunpoint to land here Sunday with 52 passengers. He immediately asked for political asylum.

The pilot, Capt. Jose Perez Menendez, 41, said he was a member of an organization called the "Movement for Revolutionary Recovery" dedicated to overthrowing Premier Fidel Castro and ridding Cuba of communism.

The plane had just left Havana airport when Menendez drew a gun on co-pilot Guedo Colli, 35, and forced him to fly to Painesville airport. He slammed the door between the pilot's section and the passengers who did not know what was happening until they reached Jamaica.

In seeking asylum Menendez said "Castro wants to rule all of the Caribbean and Latin America and all of these countries should wake up to the grim Communist threat."
