31 German Miners Killed in Explosion

SALZGITTER, Germany (UPI)—The death toll rose to 31 today in Germany's second largest mine explosion this year.

Rescue workers fought desperately to save two or three miners still trapped behind a wall of flames more than 1,200 feet underground.

Preliminary investigations indicated the explosion Tuesday was caused by a transformer which blew up and ignited the oil used for cooling it. The fire spread to wooden supports and insulation.

Paul T. Beverforden Quits State Police

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—Maj. Paul T. Beverforden, executive officer of Indiana State Police, submitted his resignation late Tuesday in order to take a position Sept. 1 as a district director of the National Safety Council.

Beverforden, 53, second-in-command of the organization, would have drawn his full retirement pay for 26 years of service.

Beverforden, a Democrat, became executive officer in 1957 at the request of Governor Handley, a Republican, when Handley put Supt. Harold S. Zeis in charge of the force.

A native of Fort Wayne, Beverforden joined the force in 1933 as a motorcycle officer. He resigned

in 1949 to become safety director for Security Cartage Co., Fort Wayne, but returned to the force in 1953 to head the safety education program.

He was re-hired as a trooper and six weeks later was elevated to captain.

Newspapers Favor Gov. Rockefeller

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Post, which supported Democrat Adlai Stevenson in two presidential campaigns, today called for the nomination of Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller to carry the Republican presidential standard.

"The plain truth now is that large legions of liberal voters feel no affirmative passion for the Democratic ticket but retain an active hostility for the Nixon team that the GOP seems destined to offer . . . Rockefeller's nomination would drastically alter the outlook. His candidacy would receive a full, sympathetic hearing from millions of uncommitted voters in crucial areas," the Post said.

Rockefeller's nomination would mean the GOP had challenged the

Democratic party "as the major instrument of liberalism," the liberal evening newspaper, which had backed Stevenson for a third nomination last week, said in a signed editorial.

St. Louis
ST. LOUIS (UPI)—The St. Louis Post-Dispatch says Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller is the best man the Republican party has for the presidential nomination and he should be drafted—but probably won't be.

The newspaper said in an editorial Tuesday that Rockefeller had displayed a masterly grasp of foreign and domestic problems and "an enlightened and liberal approach toward them."

The Post-Dispatch said Rockefeller has "a spirit of independence and a sense of confidence that would make him both a first-rate candidate and president."

The Post-Dispatch said that by all signs, like Adlai Stevenson, Rockefeller is not going to be drafted.
