

Blue Creek Township Tax Rate Increased

Blue Creek township's rate will increase six cents, according to the budget proposed this week by Frank Myers, township trustee. The proposed rate is \$1.35, compared with \$1.29 this year. It will include 20 cents on the township, 93 cents for tuition, and 22 cents for special school.

The total amount of money to be raised is \$21,201, compared with \$20,081 this year, and \$20,851 last year. The net taxable property for next year in Blue Creek township is \$1,578,370.






