## Buchholz, Holmberg Surviving Americans

NEWPORT, R.I. (UPI)—Earl Buchholz of St. Louis and Ron Holmberg of Brooklyn, N.Y., last surviving Americans in singles play at the 79th Newport Invitation tennis tournament, took on two Australians in quarterfinal matches today.

Buchholz sought a semi-final spot against Bob Hewitt who started the tournament at Newport Casino unseeded but promptly knocked eighth-seeded Donald Dell of Bethesda, Md., out of the running. Holmberg, second seeded, met fifth-ranked Bob Mark.

The winners of the two matches will meet each other Saturday while top-ranked Rod Laver, bidding for a fourth consecutive grass court title, takes on England's Bobby Wilson in the other semi-final round.

Laver, who has made it clear he won't be easy to stop, eliminated Whitney Reed of Alameda, Calif., Thursday, 6-3, 6-4, 6-3. Wilson, Britain's top player, was down two sets to one in his match with U.S. Davis Cupper Chuck McKinley of St. Louis but rallied from behind to win, 6-4, 4-6, 10-12, 6-3, 6-3.

WICHITA, Kan. (UPI)—Former Kansas City Athletics pitcher Dave Newkirk will be the starting pitcher for the Wichita, Kan., Cessna Bobcats tonight in the opening round of the 26th annual National Baseball Congress tournament.

Newkirk, a righthander who was a member of the Athletics staff in 1959, will face the Quincy, Mo., Cyclones. Dave Benedict, who formerly pitched for the Omaha Cardinals in the Class AAA American Association, will be the starting pitcher for the Omaha, Neb., Thomas, who plays the Anniston, Ala., Linnen Threshers in the other game on the first-night card.

The tournament is conducted on a double-elimination system and has a starting field of 32 teams which qualified by winning state or bi-state playoffs. Among the better-known baseball personalities who will be appearing in the tourney will be veteran Leroy (Satchel) Paige, who has been signed on as a pitcher for the Wichita, Kan., Weller Indians.

## No-Hitter Leaves Low Speechless

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—Low Burdette, the guy with the ever-present quip and wise crack, knows today what it takes to leave him stunned and speechless—his first no-hitter.

The 33-year-old righthander from Nitro, W. Va., circled aimlessly and bumped into people in the Milwaukee Braves dressing room after stopping the Philadelphia Phillies, 1-0, Thursday night. "I never thought I'd ever do it," he repeated again and again. But soon he was the old irrepressible Burdette again.

When did he first think about pitching a no-hitter? "Right with the first pitch." And then with a jab at Braves' treasurer Fran Leary, "be sure to make those checks bigger from now on."

**Near Perfect Game**  
Burdette came within just one batter of hurling a perfect game. He faced only the minimum of 27 men, but he hit center fielder Tony Gonzalez with a 1-1 pitch in the fifth inning.

Gonzalez became the only Philadelphia baserunner of the game, but he was erased immediately in an unusual doubleplay. The next

batter, Lee Walls, grounded out third to first, and Gonzalez was out trying to go all the way to third on a relay back to Johnny Logan covering the bag.

Serious for just a moment again, Burdette compared the thrill of his no-hitter with winning three games against the New York Yankees in the 1957 World Series.

"I rank this right up there with those," he said.

**Nice Hitting, Too**  
Standing right next to him, Warren Spahn—a veteran who has had 10 20-victory seasons without a no-hitter—said: "The hell with your pitching. It was the hitting that did it."

Spahn referred to Burdette's second hit of the night, a double down the left field line to open the eighth inning. Billy Bruton followed with another double over the first base bag off losing pitcher Gene Conley to score Burdette with the winning run.

It was the second no-hitter of this season. Don Cardwell pitched one for the Cubs against the Cardinals on May 15. It was also the first nine-inning no-hitter by a Brave pitcher since Jim Wilson pitched one against the Phillies on June 12, 1954.

The spectacular performance recalled the night of May 26, 1959, when Pittsburgh's Harvey Haddix pitched 12 perfect innings at County Stadium, only to lose, 1-0, in the 13th and ironically to Burdette.

Burdette said he was worried about every one of the Phil's batters. "I told myself at the start of the ninth inning, 'You dumb guy—this could never happen to you.'"

But Burdette was wrong, it did.

## Burdette Hurls No-Hitter; Law Wins Game No. 18

The Milwaukee Braves hope that Low Burdette's near-perfect no-hitter can fan a flickering spark into a blazing pennant drive.

Burdette, who "never thought I'd ever do it," missed the National League's first modern perfect game Thursday night when he hit Tony Gonzalez in the fifth inning as the Braves scored a 1-0 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies.

The 33-year-old righthander from Nitro, W. Va., faced the minimum number of 27 batters, however, when Gonzalez was erased in a double play.

Whether Burdette's brilliant performance can mobilize Milwaukee into overhauling Pittsburgh's 7 1/2 game lead depends on how the Braves react to the team's first no-hitter since Jim Wilson turned the trick in 1954.

**Could Rival '51 Giants**  
If they do come back, it would rival the greatest recovery since the 1951 Giants trailed by 1 1/2 games in early August and went on to beat the Dodgers in a playoff series for the National League pennant.

Burdette, the hero of the 1957 World Series when he won three games against the New York Yankees, took matters into his own hands to prevent a recurrence of Harvey Haddix' extraordinary no-hitter against the Braves last season that was lost on Joe Accio's hit in the 13th. He doubled in the eighth inning and came home with his winning run on Billy Bruton's two-base hit.

The victory was Burdette's 14th of the season against seven losses. Gene Conley suffered his 10th defeat for the Phils.

Dick Stuart's pinch homer gave Pittsburgh a 3-2 victory over Cincinnati and Wally Moon's 13th-inning homer enabled Los Angeles to edge Chicago, 4-3, in the other National League games.

The Yankees retained their 2 1/2 game lead in the American League by beating the Boston Red Sox, 11-7. Baltimore had an eight-run third inning to defeat Washington, 10-8, and go into a

second place tie with Chicago as Cleveland topped the White Sox, 8-6, and Detroit downed Kansas City, 11-6.

**Best After Benching**  
Stuart, who appears at his best after a benching session, belted his 14th homer for Pittsburgh in the eighth inning to give Vernon Law his 18th win.

Moon's 12th homer of the season offset two homers by rookie Ron Santo and one by Frank Thomas. Tommy Davis' single stretched his hitting streak to 18 consecutive games, longest Dodgers' skein since 1956.

The Yankees, who have won four of their last six games by one run, rallied for six runs in the last two innings. Yogi Berra drove in three runs with a pair of doubles and a single and Clete Boyer hammered a two-run homer for New York.

Baltimore clustered six of its nine hits in the third inning outburst. Jackie Brandt and Ron Hansen each drove in two runs with singles in the eighth rally.

Harvey Kuenn went 4-for-4 as Cleveland overcame a 6-1 Chicago lead by scoring five runs in the sixth inning and two more in the seventh. Ken Aspromonte highlighted the Indian sixth with a homer.

Rocky Colavito, Al Kaline and Norm Cash each homered to lead Detroit's 15-hit assault on three Kansas City pitchers. Kaline slammed four hits and Chico Fernandez three as Bud Daley took his 11th loss and the Tigers won their sixth in the last eight games.

## McCartan, Ranger Goalie, Signs

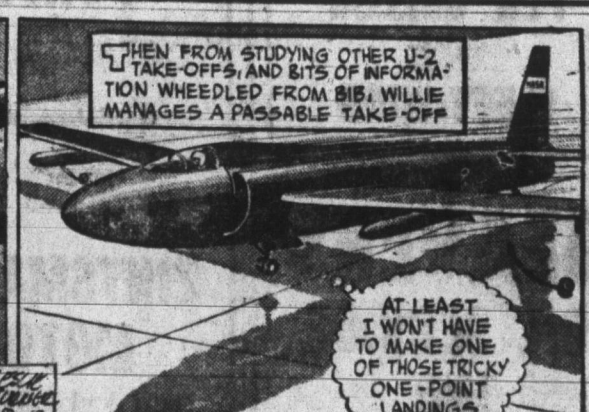
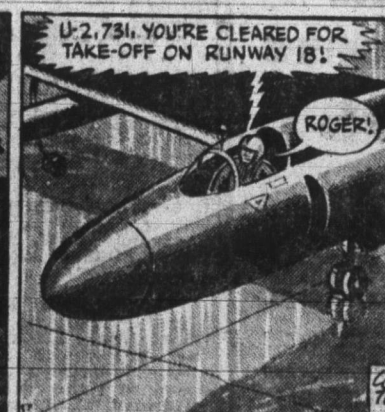
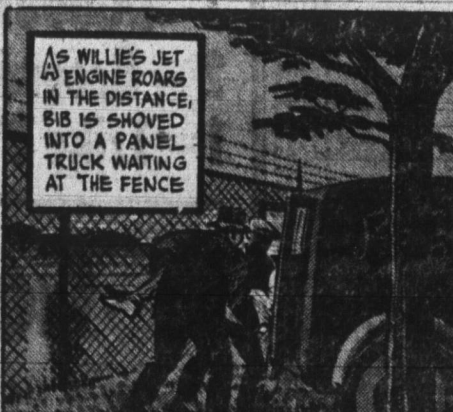
