It's Your Privilege

It would appear that the Adams County Council has done a good job on the county budgets. What seems to be necessary has been left in, and what is superfluous has been lopped off. The addition of a third car to the Sheriff's department is a forward-looking step.

The biggest fly in the gooey ointment of taxes is a tidy chunk of about \$58,000 that the council can do little about. This money has to be levied, to provide funds for the personal property reassessment next year. It is mandated by state law.

Those people who disagree with the county budgets, have a right to appear and complain. The county tax adjustment board will meet to consider the budgets Monday morning, and any ten taxpayers in a governmental unit can object to proposed levies by filing notice of appeal to the state board of tax commissioners with the Adams county Auditor.

If you have a legitimate complaint, use your rights and do something about it. If your complaints are nothing but sour grapes, then you might as well forget about it.

One thing for all to remember is that you get more return for your city and county tax dollar than any others. Local taxes return about 93 cents on the dollar. State taxes return around 80 cents. But you are lucky to get more than fifty cents of each federal dollar back.

If you want to work for reduced taxes, work toward reduction of federal taxes, and returning some of the functions to the state and county.

Yellow Jackets Wallop
Auburn Red Devils By
27 To 7 Score Friday

Decatur's Yellow Jackets toyed with the Auburn Red Devils for a half night before deciding to play football, but when they made up their minds to play in the second half there was no toying, just slam-bang football. When the smoke had cleared at the end of the ball game, Decatur had a 27-7 win and a 2-0 season record, also a 2-0 NEIC mark.

Decatur kicked off but took over the ball on the first play of the game when strong Steve Gause recovered a Red Devils' fumble on the Auburn 37. The Jackets, however, could get to only the 30 and had to kick. Auburn took over on its own 30 but couldn't move against Decatur's forward wall and was forced to kick. Grubbs returned the ball to the Decatur 40 but Auburn took over again on the 47 on an intercepted pass. Again the Decatur defense, led by two crackling tacklers by Dan Poling, held and forced Auburn to punt. The Auburn punter was rushed and fumbled with Tom Johnson, playing another fine defensive game, recovering on the Red Devil 22. With third down and nine to go on the 21, Ed Nelson raced around left end, shook off three of four tacklers, struggling down to the 10-yard line, as the first quarter ended.

Ahr Scores

After an illegal motion penalty set the Jackets back to the 15, Denny Ahr rambled around left end, knocking down three or four tacklers on the way, crossed the goal line and gave Decatur a 6-0 lead, which Tom Grubbs made 7-0 when he plunged for the point after.

Auburn came right back to cover 63 yards in eight plays and tie the game. On this series the Devils pushed that Jacket defensive line all over the field, with quarterback Warren Sunday sneaking from the two to make the score 7-6. The PAT was added from placement. For all but the last 58 seconds of the quarter Decatur couldn't do any better than junior high team against the Baltimore Colts, losing the ball twice on fumbles. With 58 seconds remaining though, Sunday was mobbed behind the line and fumbled with Johnson recovering again on the Decatur 46.

Cowan To Johnson

On the first play Cowan threw a strike to Johnson on the Auburn 35. Then on third down and 4, and 33 seconds left, Cowan hit Johnson again on the 18. Johnson twisted and shook loose an Auburn tackler and shot into the end zone. Grubbs added the point again and Decatur took a 14-7 lead into the dressing room.

After receiving the kick-off, the Jackets moved all the way to the Auburn 9 before losing the ball on downs. On the third play, King was shaken loose from the ball and Gause recovered on the 17 of Auburn. The Jackets still couldn't cross the goal line and Auburn took the ball on their own 30 after recovering another fumble. They looked like they were going to move, but the defense held and Auburn was forced to kick from their own 42. Decatur, with Nelson and Ahr running beautifully, moved the ball to the Red Devil 25 when the third quarter ended.

Nelson Alone

On the third play of the final quarter, on a second and 14 situation, Nelson, playing a terrific ball game, raced down the right sideline and took a beautiful pass from John Cowan, all alone in the end zone. The point after was stopped and the Jackets led 20-7.

Great Blocking

Auburn had the ball for only three plays again, fumbling on the 38 of Decatur, with Gause recovering again. On fourth down and 16 Nelson made a beautiful falling catch of a Cowan pass on the 18, for the first down. Nelson flanked out again and with the whole Devil team keeping their eye on him, Cowan, led by Mike Drake, Ron August and Tom Sharpe, carried right over the middle to the three yard line. On the next play Cowan shot over the middle into the end zone untouched to make the score read 26-7. Cowan hit Johnson alone in the end zone for the point after and with four minutes left the Jackets had the game on ice.

Subs played out the rest of the game for the two teams and even the second-stringers pushed Auburn around.

Nelson, Cowan
Are Named As
Most Valuable

Ed Nelson and John Cowan were named most valuable players after last night's rousing 27-7 victory over Auburn in another tough decision. The five-man Booster club committee worked until about 1 o'clock this morning trying to determine who the MVP was and finally decided on Nelson and Cowan for spearheading one of the best offensive shows a Decatur team has put on in many a year.

Dan Poling and Herb Magley won the tackling award, barely nosing out four other boys.

Nelson, although hampered by injuries, played a magnificent game from his halfback post last night. Ed was great in the clutch, picking up those yards when they were needed most. He scored on a beautiful pass play to put the game on ice and it took three or four tacklers to bring him down whenever he broke loose, which was quite often.

Ran Like Vet

Cowan ran the team like a veteran quarterback, calling the plays perfectly, passing when pass was needed and running for yardage when his receivers were covered. John and coach Bob Worthman thought up one of the smartest series of plays high school football will ever see in the fourth quarter. After Cowan had hit Nelson on a touchdown play straight down the field, the next time the Jackets had the ball he hit Nelson over the middle. On the next play, with the whole Auburn team eyeing Nelson, Cowan overcame the middle of the line all the way to the three-yard line. John will be the first to admit though, that the play would never have worked without the fine blocking of the "Terrible Three," in front of him: Tom Sharpe and Mike Drake.

Magley and Poling made the most tackles of a tackle minded defensive eleven. Both boys were making tackles all over the field, most of them of the bone-crunching type. Magley has been giving the team some of the greatest tackling ever seen from a Decatur high school football player and Poling, who also played a stand-out game on defense Tuesday night, is getting better with each game.

Others Close

Close behind these two were Stu Knodel, Dave Magley, Steve Gause and Mike Drake. Drake is a senior who can really fill up the middle of that line and after last night's game the Auburn center appeared to have "shell shock" from the two to make the score 7-6. Knodel and Tom Johnson were outstanding at end again last night, refusing to let the Devils run their ends. Gause and Dave Magley are a pair of sophomores who won't let anyone scare them. Steve recovered three fumbles and was right in the middle of things all night. Magley played an outstanding game on defense and the few times that an Auburn back got through the line, he was right there to make the tackle.

Pirates Reduce
Magic Number
To 15 Friday

The Pittsburgh Pirates, closing in on their first National League pennant since 1927, now are rooting for a New York Yankee surge in the AL that would bring about a revenge meeting that has smoldered for 33 years. The Yankees swept four straight from the Bucs that season.

Pittsburgh reduced its magic number to 15 by edging the Chicago Cubs, 4-3, Friday night, while the Yankees closed to within a half game of first-place Baltimore by defeating Detroit, 4-1.

The Chicago White Sox, third in the standings, are only 3½ games back by virtue of a 5-2 victory over the Orioles.

In other American League games, Washington tightened its grip on forth place by clipping Cleveland, 8-2, and Kansas City beat Boston, 3-2.

Cardinals Beat Phils

St. Louis remained six games back of Pittsburgh with a 4-1 abbreviated five-inning win over Philadelphia that was called by rain. Los Angeles downed Milwaukee, 5-3, while San Francisco defeated Cincinnati, 4-2, in the opener of a twin-night doubleheader and lost the second, 3-2, to the Reds in other NL action.

Dick Schofield showed he was an ample replacement for the injured Dick Groat when he blasted a two-run triple in the sixth inning to give Pittsburgh its eighth victory in the last 11 games. Vinegar Bend Mizell, with ninth-inning aid from Elroy Face, won his 11th game. Mizell has now won 11 times in his last 13 decisions with the Cubs.

Pittsburgh scored its other two runs with the help of two Chicago errors in the second. Ernie Banks and Frank Thomas being responsible for the Cub miscues.

Stafford Wins Third

Rocky Bill Stafford, who makes Casey Stengel look 10 years younger because of his winning resemblance to Whitey Ford in 1950, scattered six Detroit hits in gaining his third victory since joining the Yankees on Aug. 15. Roger Maris' 37th homer and Hector Lopez' seventh were effective weapons for New York in the third inning. It marked the 13th time this year the Yankees have slammed back-to-back homers. Norm Cash connected for Detroit as Bob Bruce lost his sixth decision.

Minnie Minoso and Luis Aparicio each drove in two runs as the White Sox made forward motions again. Bob Shaw picked up his 13th win, although he needed eighth-inning help from Frank Baumham. The White Sox reliever retired the side with two on and one out after Baltimore had scored twice. Jack Brandt batted in both Baltimore runs as Chuck Estrada lost his ninth game.

Lemon Blasts Two

Washington, helped by Jim Lemon's 36th and 37th homers and Harmon Killebrew's 26th, beat Jim Grant for the second time in 18 decisions with the Cleveland right-hander. Vic Power belted a homer for the Indians. Pedro Ramos, who had a no-hitter with two out in the sixth inning, won his 11th game.

Bud Daley picked up his 14th victory, and only his second since the All-Star break, as he three-hitted the Red Sox. Russ Snyder's homer in the sixth inning provided the margin for the Kansas City triumph. Lou Clinton scored
