Yellow Jackets Whipped Decisively Friday Night By New Haven Bulldogs

Decatur's high flying Yellow Jackets came to earth with a thud Friday night—a thud that was heard all over Worthman field as New Haven's small and speedy Bulldogs trounced the Jackets, 39-0, in an NEIC conference game.

After the Jackets got a small taste of two-time all conference halfback Jerry Doty, who would rather run over a tackler than run around him, and a rough and tumble New Haven line, they decided they had had enough and the ball game was over in the first few minutes of the first period, with only the final score in doubt.

The Jackets took the opening kickoff at their own 28, could gain only two yards in three plays and were forced to punt. Cowan got off a good boot which Doty hauled in on his own 45, shot through the whole Decatur team and ran 55 yards for a score. The extra point failed and the Bulldogs led, 6-0.

Doty Again
Exactly five minutes and 50 seconds later, New Haven quarterback Mike Dennis faced a couple of handoffs and before the Decatur defense knew what time of day it was, Doty was rocketing around left end for 70 yards and, with the point, a 13-0 lead.

With seconds left in the first period Kinnison got 15, Doty 5 and 4 yards and New Haven had the ball on the Decatur 10 yard line starting the second period. On the second play of that period, Doty shot around his left end, untouched, for a TD and a 20-0 lead.

After Dave Magley took the kickoff back to his own 44 on a hard run, the Jackets picked up their first first down of the night with Cowan getting it on a quarterback sneak. That is as far as they went and were forced to punt. After another exchange of the ball, New Haven found themselves on the Decatur 33 yard marker after intercepting a pass. With 41 seconds left in the half, Dennis trotted around his left end on a quarterback keeper for a TD, giving the Jackets something to think about at halftime as they were down, 27-0, with only half the game over.

Come To Life?
The Jackets showed signs of coming to life when they stopped New Haven cold after the kickoff and forced them to punt. However, after the Jackets failed in two series of plays to get a first down they were forced to punt. The pass from center was bad and New Haven recovered.

After Doty got to the 15 yard line, Terry Kummer waltzed through a mile-wide hole for a 33-0 lead, with 1:10 left in the third stanza. In less than a minute of the final period, second string quarterback Lippett hit Grotian all alone in the end zone. The point failed and the New Haven scoring parade was finished.

Subs played the rest of the game for both teams and some of the fans wondered if the second stringers couldn't have given New Haven a better ball game.

Sophomore Jim Martin really got his foot into a punt, booting the ball from his own 16 to the New Haven 40 yard line for a 44-yard boot. About 20 seconds later the gun sounded and the massacre

Dave Magley Named
Outstanding Player

Sophomore Dave Magley was named the outstanding Decatur player last night after a 39-0 loss to the New Haven Bulldogs.

The five-man Booster Club committee named Magley the MVP as it appeared that he was the only member of the 14 or 15 who do most of the playing that wanted to play football last night. "Horse" as he is known by his teammates, made a beautiful runback of a kickoff last night and for the second straight week, chased an opposing back practically the length of the field to save a touchdown, even though the back had a 5-yard headstart. Magley gets his nickname "Horse" from the way he runs, with his knees in his chin and as widespread as he can get them. If he keeps up the "Crazy-legs" running and the desire that he showed last night, he'll become an outstanding halfback. Stu Knodel was named to receive the most tackles award.

Unofficially Decatur gained a total of 27 yards, excluding the last four minutes while the second string was in. They got 11 yards the first period, a minus two the second, a minus four the third and 22 yards the fourth quarter. A total of 15 of those yards gained in the final quarter was a Cowan to Nelson pass which was their long, even though the night. The Jackets got two first downs, one in the second period and one on that pass play in the last stanza. That pass play also took Decatur as deep in New Haven territory as they got all night—the New Haven 40 yard line.

There isn't much else to say. The final score in a very important conference game was 39-0. The field was packed to the light towers again. Next Friday, the Jackets, with a 2 win, 1 loss and 1 tie season and conference record, will take on Portland at Worthman Field in a non-conference game.

The Bulldogs gave a very fine lesson in the fact that football is blocking and tackling, and not much else. Doty is a fine runner, but so is anyone when nobody gets a hand on him. He didn't have to be tricky. And time after time, six or seven New Haven players were tackling the ball carrier, while six or seven Jackets stood and watched.

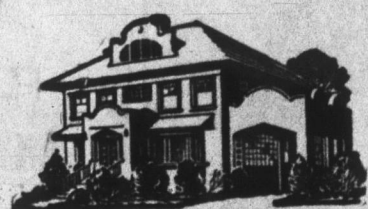
