
MISSIONARIES TO SPEAK TO WWS

Auto Workers Union Launches Convention

CINCINNATI (UPI) — About 2,000 members of the United Auto Workers Union opened the annual UMW convention today.

Both president Thomas Kennedy and retired mine chieftain John L. Lewis were scheduled to address the opening session.

The convention delegates usually stick to business and little fireworks were expected this year. There is a possibility the union will endorse a presidential nominee, although it rarely does.

An annual autonomy fight probably will be waged by delegates from the 24 provisional UMW dis-

tricts for the right to elect their own president and secretary-treasurer. Presently, the two posts are filled by the international union.

Although Lewis stepped down as president, he remains chairman of the UMW welfare fund, which paid out \$18 millions more last year than taken in.

The fund may have laid itself open for criticism because it eliminated some card-holders who have been out of the coal industry a year or more.

The convention opened in a year of declining employment in the coal industry. Currently, about 200,000 members are actually working in the coal fields, compared to about 250,000 four years ago.

Automation, a sharply lower export market and the recent steel industry strike reduced coal sales.

State Workman Dies In Fall From Truck

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — A 74-year-old state highway department worker was injured fatally late Monday when he fell from a truck on Indiana 100 near Castleton.

The victim was Arthur Gimble of Indianapolis. He fell when he lost his balance. Gimble was on a line-painting project at the time of the accident.
