INDIANAPOLIS — Radio station WOWO in Fort Wayne, will present a documentary on mental illness in Indiana Wednesday, Oct. 19 at 9:30 p.m.

The thirty minute program will consist of interviews with gubernatorial candidates, M. A. F. Welsh and Crawford Parker. Questions pertaining to the facilities in mental hospitals and the care of mentally ill and retarded in Indiana will be directed to the candidates. An interview recorded during the annual conference of the Indiana association for mental health will also be included in the program.
