Colts, Bears Battle Sunday In Pro Feature

And now it's the Chicago Bears who reach the crisis stage in the National Football League race. Two weeks ago it was the Philadelphia Eagles; last week it was the Baltimore Colts and New York Giants. All survived the early season make-or-break game and that's the big reason why seven clubs remain in contention for the title.

The Bears, who have a 3-2-1 record and cannot afford another defeat, are 7-point underdogs against the Western Division-leading Colts in the NFL's top game at Chicago.

Here is how the five other Sunday games shape up (all favorites are the home teams): Philadelphia Eagles 14 points over Washington Redskins; New York Giants 7½ over Pittsburgh Steelers; Cleveland Browns 10½ over St. Louis Cardinals; Green Bay Packers 22 over Dallas Cowboys; Detroit Lions 4 over Los Angeles Rams. The San Francisco Forty Niners are idle.

Division Leaders Meet
The American Football League pits its two division leaders against each other in the battle between the Houston Oilers (6-2) and the Los Angeles Chargers (5-3) on the West Coast. The game is rated a tossup. The Dallas Texans (4-4) are at home against the Denver Broncos (4-4) and the Oakland Raiders (4-5) entertain the Buffalo Bills (3-5). Dallas and Oakland are favored.

The first meeting between the Colts and Bears this season was no contest, Baltimore winning 42-7. However, the Bears, who did not play last weekend, are in their best physical shape of the season and are "up" for this survival game.

Philadelphia is the hottest team in the NFL having won five in a row since dropping the season-opener to Cleveland. The game against the Redskins (1-5-2) shapes up as a "breaker"—unless the Eagles have a letdown while looking too intensely toward the following Sunday's Eastern Division showdown against the Giants in New York.

The Giants (4-1-1) have "good old Charlie" Conerly back in form, but one of his pet targets, Kyle Rote, is out with a broken bone in his hand. Rookie Bob Simms of Rutgers will replace Rote.

Steelers Hard on Giants
Pittsburgh traditionally has given the Giants as much trouble as any NFL rival. Quarterback Bobby Layne's sore thumb is "practically normal" and he should do better than last week's 24-16 passing performance.

Despite a big edge in the odds, Cleveland could have tough going against St. Louis. The Cards are second to the Colts in offensive yardage and are tied for second in defense against rushing.

Green Bay (4-2) has several players on the ailing list, including fullback Jim Taylor, the NFL's No. 1 ground-gainer, and Paul Hornung. However, the Packers should beat the Cowboys, who have lost 11 of their 12 NFL starts and do not appear ready for an upset.

In the AFL, the Houston-Los Angeles game pits the league's most formidable attack against an exceptionally strong defense. In winning their last three games, the Chargers held their opponents to a total of only 42 points.

Detroit Studying Over New Manager

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The Detroit Tigers took stock today of a plentiful supply of candidates for a new manager, and insisted they haven't made up their minds on who will pilot the American League baseball club in 1961.

About all that was certain was that it wouldn't be Casey Stengel, the former Yankee manager who dropped out of the race Thursday.

Club President John Fetzer said the absence of a final selection didn't mean the Tigers weren't hopeful of making a decision as soon as possible.

Vice President Rick Ferrell, former big league catching star, had the job of screening managerial prospects. One was Bill Rigney, former San Francisco Giant manager with whom Ferrell talked by telephone. The San Francisco News-Call Bulletin said Friday Rigney would be hired for two years at an annual salary of \$35,000.

Both Ferrell and Fetzer, however, insisted no decision had been made.

The list of possible Detroit managers in a "buyer's market" for major league clubs also included:

—Eddie Lopat, Yank pitching coach under Stengel.

—Bob Scheffing, Milwaukee coach and former Chicago Cub manager.

—Harry Craft, now a Cub coach, rated highly because of his familiarity with the American League.

Berne Bears Take Opener From Portland

The Berne Bears, defending sectional champs, opened their 1960-61 net season with a 67-48 walloping of the Portland Panthers in the Berne gym Friday night.

The Bears Jerry Nussbaum hit three buckets in a row and Dick Smith hit from underneath to give their team an 8-0 lead and they were never headed, with only the final score in doubt. Berne led at the end of the initial stanza, 16-5, and at the main intermission by 32-17. Portland, led by McAbee, tallied 17 points in the third period, only to see the Bears pour in 23 and open up a 55-34 lead. Reserves played most of the final quarter for both teams, with the final margin being 67-48.

Stan Augsburger led the Bear's scoring with 15 points, followed by Rod Schwartz, who controlled both backboards, with 13, and Nussbaum, also with 13. Gary Habegger added 12 to give coach Bruce Smith's boys four men in double figures.
