"I Am Afraid..."

The following ideas are taken from an editorial by Armin S. Carpenter, president of Texas Eastern Transmission Corp., in The Inch, for November, 1961; he in turn, borrowed the ideas from Raymond C. Ellis, a New York insurance executive. The editorial was brought to my attention by a Decatur man, who read it recently.

"I am much more afraid of Americans than I am of Russians.

"I am afraid of Americans who have become victims of apathy, indifference and complacency...

"I am afraid of Americans who have become so hardened to all types of crime, including murder, that the chief offense is no longer the criminal act itself, but in having been found out..."

"I am afraid of Americans who put first things last and last things first — who underpay their ministers and teachers.

"Who, if we were to have a recession, would first economize by cutting their contributions to churches, hospitals and schools, and later economize by reducing their liquor and luxury bills."

He then sums up: "No nation in history has survived if it has turned its back on the moral and spiritual values... We will do well to remember this basic historical fact, as well as that the price of liberty is eternal vigilance, and that we will be the 'land of the free' only as long as we are the 'home of the brave.'"
