The Decatur Public Library

We had a request this past week to tell something about the Decatur public library board, the seven-member group which administers the local library.

Lowell J. Smith, Decatur high school teacher, is president of the board; he has been a member of the board since 1951. He is one of three appointees by the circuit court judge, Myles F. Parrish.

In time of service Raymond B. Kohne, well-known Decatur druggist, and vice-president of the board, outranks the others. He has served continuously since 1938. He is one of two appointees named by the Decatur city council.

Mrs. Lloyd Cowens, appointed by the city council, in October, 1959, is the newest member of the board; she replaced Mrs. Alma Brayton, who moved away from Decatur.

Representing the school board on the library board is Dr. John B. Spaulding, appointed in 1959 to fill the vacancy created by the death of the long-time board president, Dr. N. A. Bixler, and Miss Frances Dugan, appointed to the board in 1956, succeeding Mrs. Sylvester Everhart.

Mrs. Laura Bosse, Decatur clerk-treasurer, has served on the board since 1955 as an appointee of Judge Parrish.

Mrs. Hugh J. Andrews has served since 1947 as one of the judge's appointees, having succeeded her mother, who resigned after 43 years on the board.

The Decatur library board meets monthly, and receives no salary or remuneration. It is just one of many boards and commissions serving local government without cost, so that government for the people, by the people, and of the people is more than a hollow slogan. They make it a real, living thing. Decatur's public library is known throughout the state for its fine, new addition, its progressive spirit, and its devoted board members.

Miss Bertha Heller, librarian, reported that during the month of April, 29 groups with an audience of 1,682 viewed the films.

Following are the May films:
AMERICAN REVOLUTION - 14 min - color - A clear explanation of the strategy, the struggle, the movement of forces and the important military engagements of the war for independence. (Encyclopedia Britannica)

BETWEEN THE TIDES - 22 min - color - Reveals some of the interesting plant and animal life that is not always visible to the naked eye, and shows creatures of the rockpools and shallow waters of Britain's coastal area. (Contemporary Films)

BROTHERHOOD OF MAN - 11 min - color - Animated cartoon based on the pamphlet, "Race of Mankind." Foretelling and refreshingly points out that differences between races are superficial, accidental and environmental. (United Productions of America)

FOOD AND PEOPLE - 25 min - b&w - Draws a contrast between the people who have plenty to eat and those who have but very little, suggesting that a world of plenty provides a greater chance for individual security and world peace. (Encyclopedia Britannica)

Sealed bids will be received in the office of the Clerk-Treasurer of the City of Decatur, Indiana, at the Board of Public Works and Safety, for said City, until the hour of 7:15 P.M. on the 11th day of May, 1962, at which time the bids will be publicly opened and read aloud for the following described work:

Furnish labor and equipment to install a new 12" Water Main along Jackson Street from the present 12" main on First Street to the present 12" main on Third Street, being approximately 700 feet in length.

Furnish labor and equipment to install a new 6" diameter Water Main along Line Street and Bellman Street between Vine Street and Vine Street, being approximately 100 feet in length.

Proposals or bids shall be properly and completely executed on State Board of Accounts form No. 94, with Non-collusion Affidavit required by the Statutes of the State of Indiana, and must be accompanied by questionnaire Form No. 94A, State Board of Accounts, for all bids of Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) or more, as required by law.
