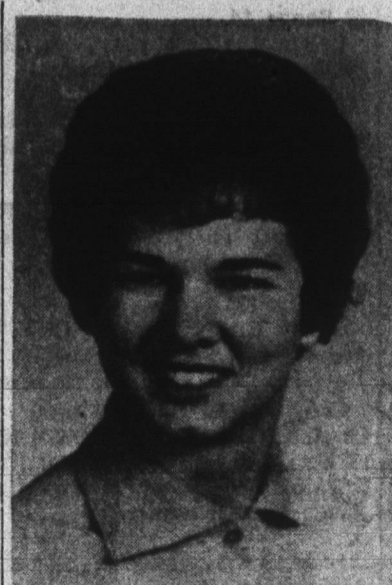

Showers Forecast For Election Day

Widely scattered showers fell in Indiana during the weekend, but most areas remained dry with moderate temperatures prevailing. Fair weather was on the menu for today, but a new round of showers was developing. They were expected to begin late tonight and extend into Tuesday.

The outlook for Wednesday was clearing and cooler.

Highs Sunday ranged from 68 at South Bend to 82 at Evansville. Overnight lows this morning ranged from 40 at South Bend to 59 at Evansville.

Highs today will range from the 60s to 76, lows tonight from 48 to 54, and highs Tuesday from 65 to 80.

The five-day outlook called for temperatures averaging near normal north to 2 to 5 degrees above normal central and south. Only minor day-to-day changes were expected except in the north where it will be cooler Wednesday, warmer Thursday and Friday and turning cooler again about Saturday.

Precipitation will come in two waves, the first Tuesday and the second near the end of the week. It will total one-half to three-fourths of an inch north, one-half inch central and one-fourth inch south.
