Boston Notifies Itself

(No. 26 in a Series)  
Several years ago the city of Boston gave itself notice through its building commissioner that it

had applied for permission to install and maintain at a certain address a 6-cylinder engine and generator. This notice, as provided by law, ran three times in a daily newspaper.

The public was put on notice as to the city's intentions. At the same time any interested persons was informed that he could object to the proposal as prescribed by law.

In essence this was a routine notice and as far as is known no special problem was involved. But the action is a good illustration of how public notice works and how it operates to safeguard the rights of the public.

Whether it is a public improvement or a private action, the principle underlying public notice is the same. It is to give notice in time so that those whose rights may be affected have a reasonable opportunity to take steps to protect those rights. Strict adherence to this principle through the publication of public notices, usually in a newspaper, is basic to the American way of life.
