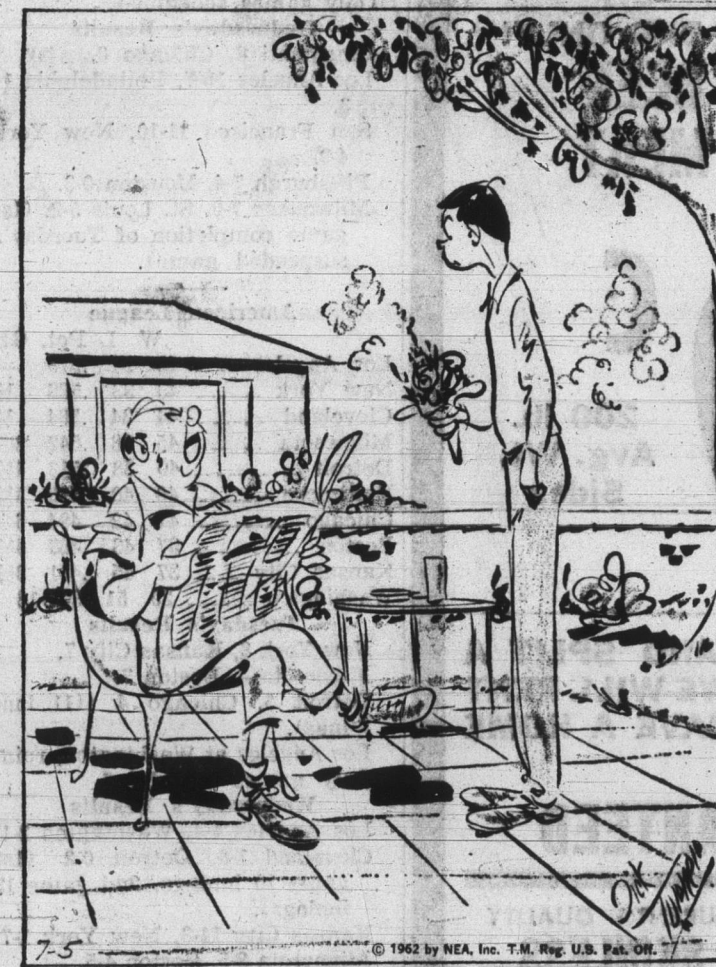

Welsh Meets With
Kennedy On Port

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Presi-
dent Kennedy today directed aides
to "look into" the proposed deep
water port at Burns Ditch, Ind.
Gov. Matthew Welsh said.
The Hoosier governor met with
newsmen after a 20-minute confer-
ence with Kennedy.
Welsh said he handed the chief
executive a letter on the project,
which included maps and exhibits
to illustrate "the great importance
we in Indiana attach to the pro-
ject." The governor was accom-
panied by his administrative as-
sistant, Clinton Green, secretary-
treasurer of the Indiana Port
Commission.

"He listened to our presentation
of the matter and said he would
give it serious consideration,"
Welsh said. "We didn't ask him
for anything."

Welsh said no specific invitation
was made to Kennedy to cam-
paign in Indiana this fall. "He
knows he is always welcome," the
governor said with a grin.

Welsh denied Republican claims
that Kennedy's popularity is wan-
ing in Indiana. The President is
tremendously more popular now
than in November, 1960, Welsh
said, and any other view is "po-
litically unrealistic."

Says G.O.P.
In Dire Need
Of Transfusion

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Former
President Dwight D. Eisenhower's
announcement that the Republi-
can party is the businessman's
party needs both further definition
and practical application. Espe-
cially, it needs practical applica-
tion.

What the Republican party
needs more than a promise to be
anybody's party is a commitment
to a set of courageous political
principles that clearly distinguish
it from the Democratic party.

The Republican party also
needs a blood transfusion to fire
it up to the degree required to
enable a Republican national con-
vention to function with the cour-
age of the party's conservative
convictions.

In addition to political prin-
ciples that clearly distinguish the
Republican party from the Demo-
cratic party, the GOP needs presi-
dential nominees who are clearly
distinguishable from Democratic
presidential nominees. Above all,
when a first class, all-out Republi-
can statesman is available for the
party's presidential nomination,
the GOP needs enough self-con-
fidence to name that man.

That self-confidence was lack-
ing, for example, in 1952 when
the Republicans nominated Gen-
eral Eisenhower in preference to
the late Sen. Robert A. Taft. As
it turned out, God was good to the
party and to the United States
when Ike was chosen. Had Taft
been named there probably would
have been some kind of compro-
mise deal that would have put on
the ticket with him the wooliest
minded political maverick of sta-
ture in the Republican party. Taft
soon died and had been presi-
dent, that woolly mind would have
succeeded him in office.

Ike's claim that the Republican
party was the businessman's party
caught a lot of headlines. It
would have been more newswor-
thy if Ike had said that the Re-
publican party was a conservative
party and hereafter would bid for
the Republican vote, ignoring all
others. That was Taft's political
creed. He told me long ago that
he did not give a hoot for inde-
pendents, liberals, political drift-
ers and such.

Eisenhower was drafted for the
1952 Republican nomination by a
combination of eastern Republi-
can leaders who generally are
responsible for moving the GOP
steadily left toward the position
most recently occupied by the
Democratic party. With these so-
called me-too Republicans in
command, the Republican party
since 1940 has lost 13 of 17 national
elections.
