

Kerner Decision On Crump Is Precedent

CHICAGO (UPI) — Slayer Paul Crump, who said he "began to die" nine years ago when sentenced to be executed, "began to live" today.

Crump, a slender, deep-voiced 32-year-old Negro, Wednesday won his 15th bid to avoid the electric chair, where he had been scheduled to die Friday morning.

Gov. Otto Kerner, a crusader against capital punishment, granted Crump's plea for a chance to "justify my life" and commuted the robbery-slayer's death sentence to 199 years in prison "without parole."

Crump and his attorney, Donald P. Moore, burst into tears when the governor's decision was announced.

"The real test for Paul Crump lies ahead," Kerner warned. "The years he must face in prison will be a true test of his willingness and ability to be of service to his fellow man."

"I thank God and Governor Kerner," Crump said, "and all the many, many people who worked so hard to bring my case to the attention of the governor. I thank all the hundreds and hundreds of people throughout the country," said the convict-author, whose first novel is to be published this fall.

Warden Jack Johnson of the Cook County jail, whom Crump has described variously as "my best friend" and "my white father," said Kerner's decision proved "there is such a thing as rehabilitation, spiritually and materially, behind prison walls."

Johnson, who had been scheduled to throw the switch at Crump's execution, had appealed for clemency.

The Kerner decision set a precedent, since Crump's appeal for clemency was based solely upon his claim of rehabilitation while behind bars.

"The most significant goal of a system of penology in a civilized society is the rehabilitation of one of its members.... If that premise were to be denied solely because this is a capital case, a great disservice would be done," the governor said.

Kerner's specification "without parole" in commuting the sentence raised still another precedent — one which the governor, himself, could not answer.

Illinois law provides that no person may remain in prison for

more than 20 years without becoming eligible for parole. Kerner said he did not know whether his condition would stand "because there is no case like it anywhere in the country."

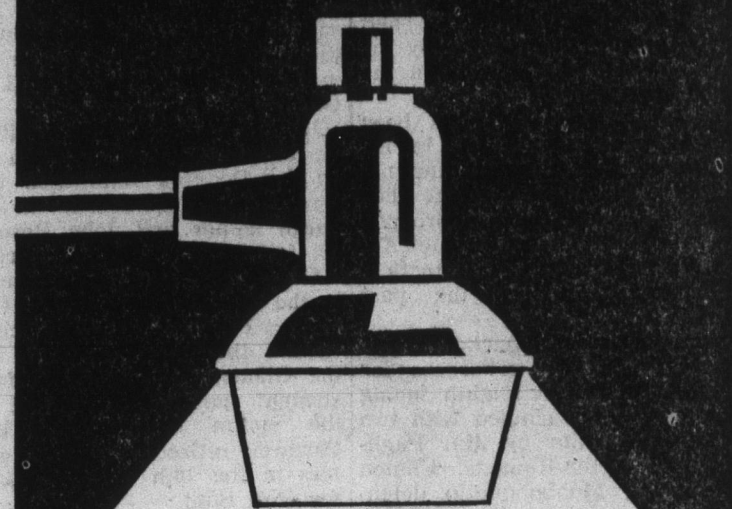
