

## Support Growing All Over Europe

LONDON (UPI)—Support grew throughout Western Europe today for President Kennedy's action to stop the Soviet missile buildup in Cuba.

First European reaction had

been cool, and demonstrators in several cities marched outside American embassies Tuesday shouting "Hands off Cuba."

But late Tuesday and Tuesday night, following circulation of the

pictures of the Soviet missile bases in Cuba, the mood changed.

"The proof!" proclaimed the London Daily Sketch in black headlines two inches high.

The British government, which had been slow in reacting, issued a statement charging that Russia had been "guilty of deception." Foreign Secretary Lord Home accused the Soviet Union of using an "opportunistic and two-faced technique" in arming Cuba.

The Foreign Office issued a

statement after a Cabinet meeting instructing the British delegation at the United Nations "to support the American request to the Security Council that they should make recommendation to end this danger."

In Bonn, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer met with Dean Acheson, Kennedy's special adviser on NATO affairs, and pledged full support for the U.S. position in Cuba.

Acheson had met earlier in Paris with French President

Charles de Gaulle, who also instructed his delegation to back the United States.

In Brussels, a spokesman for the Common Market ministers said there was "full understanding" for the U.S. action.

In Madrid, where there had been sharp criticism of U.S. policies, the Spanish government hailed America's "alertness" and "spirit of defense" against aggression in Latin America.

The switch in European editorial reaction was little short of

dramatic. Only one London newspaper opposed the Kennedy move today, Tuesday. Only one had supported it outright. Most of the papers, while expressing concern about the consequences, agreed it was justified.

### Jobless Pay Claims

#### Increase in State

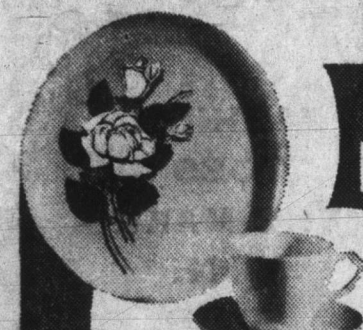
INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Unemployment compensation claims in Indiana last week showed an increase of 1,258 over the previous week but there was a decrease in the number of new claims filed.

Director Lewis F. Nicolini of the Indiana Division of Employment Security said Tuesday that no large-scale layoffs were reported during the week but there was some production cutback in the communication equipment industry and some reduction in force in steel mills.

Nicolini also reported that more than two-thirds of the Indiana employers liable for the state's unemployment insurance tax received rate reductions for 1962. He said more than two-fifths of all employees qualified for the lowest possible rate, 0.1 per cent.

AMERICA'S FIRST JET—Twentieth anniversary of the flight of America's first jet airplane was observed recently. The Bell XP-59A was literally shrouded in security wraps, top photo, when it was towed along desert roads in October 1942 to the take-off point at Muroc, Calif., now site of Edwards AFB, world-renowned experimental flight center. A dummy propeller was attached to its nose and air intakes and fuselage were covered. Test pilot Robert Stanley made the first flights at modest speeds only 100 feet off the ground. Later, the plane was pushed to 400 m.p.h. and an altitude of 30,000 feet. Bottom photo shows it during a subsequent test flight. No U.S. jet saw action in World War II, however. Engines of today's twice-the-speed-of-sound planes are 15 times the power of those used in the XP-59A.
