It had the first state-owned university. It is the 21st largest state and comprises an area of 28,876 square miles, including 358 square miles of water surface. Georgia has the largest undrained swamp in the United States, luring tourists and scientists to explore its interior. It was Warm Springs with the flow of 1800 gallons per minute where there is the principal clinic in the world for poliomyelitis. The mountains of Georgia have inexhaustible strata of marble and granite. Georgia has seven of the nine possible climatic zones in the United States. Sunstrokes are unknown, but vegetables grow in outdoor gardens and live stock graze in green pastures year around. The cotton gin was invented in Georgia. Its forests, with 163 species of trees, furnish material for the naval stores and pulpwood and paper

industry. The capital is Atlanta, the live oak tree is the state tree, the beautiful Cherokee rose is the state flower and the brown thrasher, one of the finest songsters native to America, is the state bird.


