

## Decatur K. C. Takes State K. C. Tourney

The Decatur Knights of Columbus basketball won the state K. of C. tourney championship Sunday, defeating Terre Haute, 72-70 in the final game of the meet held at Crown Point.

The championship tilt was a close battle all the way. Terre Haute led at the first quarter, 21-20, but Decatur was out in front by two points, 41-39, at the half. Terre Haute pulled into a 54-54 tie at the end of the third period, but the Decatur team edged out the two-point victory.

George Wanen, D.C.H.S. coach, topped the Decatur scoring with 21 points, trailed closely by Barker with 18. Lew led Terre Haute with 26 markers, and the losers had three other players in double figures.

Wanen was awarded the individual sportsmanship trophy.

Cooler temperatures prevailed today in Indiana after the temperature hit the 70s over most of the state Monday afternoon.

Forecasts of a chance of light rain in certain sections of the state late today were revised and the precipitation prospect was cancelled out.

Nevertheless, the fair skies of the past few days were gradually diminishing to cloudiness. Forecasts called for partly cloudy north today and mostly cloudy elsewhere, and mostly cloudy everywhere Wednesday and Thursday with little change in temperature.

Temperatures touched 75 at Evansville, 74 at Louisville, 72 at Lafayette and 71 at Indianapolis Monday afternoon but peaked no higher than 58 at South Bend and 59 at Fort Wayne.

## Orioles, Reds Win In Major League Openers

You won't be able to tell the players without a scorecard today when baseball's other 18 major league teams—featuring a multitude of new faces—attempt to catch up with the Baltimore Orioles and the Cincinnati Reds.

The Orioles and the Reds were first out of the gate Monday. President Kennedy was among 43,022 fans who watched Baltimore turn back the Washington Senators, 3-1, in the nation's capital while the Reds bounced the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-2, at Cincinnati.

Nine additional openers are on today's schedule, including a pair of night games. The Reds will won both relays to post a come-from-behind win over Decatur and Monmouth in a triangular meet on the Eagle track Monday afternoon.

Coach Carl Honaker's thinlives won both relays for ten points and nosed out Decatur, 60.3 to 58.1, while Monmouth finished a distant third with 18.6.

Mike Ripley of the Greyhounds

was the meet's only double winner, taking blue ribbons in the 100 and 220-yard dashes. He also ran the first leg of the winning 880 relay team.

Dave Ansbaugh of Decatur posted a personal high when he vaulted 10 feet, six inches to win the pole vault. Sophomore Tom Whitaker won the mile for Decatur.

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
