

## Cuban Refugees To Continue Battling

MIAMI (UPI) — The Cuban (Revolutionary) Council early today rejected the resignation of its president, Jose Miro Cardona, and vowed it will continue to fight Fidel Castro's Communist-dominated regime whether the U.S.

government likes it or not. In a resolution adopted at the end of an all-night session, the CRC announced its whole-hearted support for Miro's criticism of U.S. Cuban policies which it said had created a "state of crisis."

Administration sources in Washington said Miro Cardona was miffed when the government rejected his ultimatum regarding an invasion of Cuba. They said he had demanded either \$50 million to build a Cuban invasion

army of exiles or sympathizers, or a major role in planning a U.S. invasion force.

Miro Cardona had visited Washington last weekend and conferred frequently with officials, including Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy and Arthur Schlesinger, adviser to President Kennedy.

The council said it will seek "moral and material support from all new-world nations, including the United States, in its fight to rescue (Cuba's) sover-

eignty and independence."

Miro submitted his resignation Tuesday, saying he had broken with the U.S. government because of its efforts to halt refugee raids on Castro's Cuba and Soviet shipping in territorial waters.

The council endorsed Miro's break with official Washington.

"The council can solve the problem of Miro's resignation by repudiating it," CRC sources said, "but it cannot re-establish the

links which up to now have existed between this organization and the Washington government."

The council also declared its support for a manifesto assailing U.S. policies which Miro presented to U.S. officials last week.

Miro's declaration was not made public because of its "delicate nature," but it was known to be sharply critical of the recent U.S. order restricting potential refugee raiders to Miami's Dade County.

## Jobless Pay Claims Decrease In State

## John Anderson Is Mentioned By Democrats

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Indiana Adj. Gen. John S. Anderson, former mayor of Shelbyville, was mentioned as a possible 1964 Democratic gubernatorial nominee at party gatherings Saturday.

They were meetings of the Indiana Democratic Editorial Association and the Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner.

The 43-year-old Anderson was appointed adjutant general by Governor Welsh in 1961 after Anderson had participated extensively in Democratic politics. He had been elected and reelected mayor and had served as Shelby County Democratic chairman.

Anderson, a partner in a transfer and warehouse concern, also served as Shelbyville city judge and was a delegate to three party state conventions.

**Made Chute Jumps**  
During World War II, Anderson served in the famed 82nd Airborne Division as an officer in Europe and Africa and made numerous parachute jumps. He has been active in Indiana National Guard activities since then.

He attended the school of business of Indiana University, is married and has one daughter and is a member of the Christian Church.

Anderson was active in the state convention and election campaigns of Welsh. His national guard work has also promoted his state-wide acquaintance.

Another possible new candidate for the gubernatorial bid is Richard B. Stoner, Columbus industrial executive and 9th District Democratic chairman.

Stoner was chairman of the highly successful Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner attended by more than 2,500 persons who enjoyed the best food, entertainment and oratory in many years.

**Kizer Popular Now?**  
One of the guests of honor was another possibility for chief executive, Sen. Marshall Kizer of Plymouth, Democratic floor leader in the Senate.

The widespread unpopularity of both Democratic and Republican legislators because of their prolonged, do-nothing session, however, has not helped the Kizer candidacy.

Others who have been mentioned for the party's nomination for governor include Clinton Green, Welsh's administrative assistant and secretary of the Indiana Port Commission; Tom Lemon, former mayor of Bloomington and now a regional postal official at Cincinnati; Donald Foltz of Clinton, director of the State Conservation Department; Evansville Mayor Frank McDonald, and former Indiana Appellate Court Judge John Ax of Linton.

Aides of Welsh said he has not given the slightest indication he will run against Sen. Vance Hartke for the U.S. senatorial nomination next year.

## Unemployment Drop Reported In Area

Unemployment has taken a drastic Easter dip to only 58 in all of Adams county. Richard P. App, manager of the Fort Wayne office of the Indiana employment security division, reported this week. There were seven new claims and 51 continued claims, for a total of 58.

This compares with 14 new claims, 71 continued claims, and 10 extended claims a year ago; there were 237 unemployed two years ago, compared with 95 a year ago, and 58 this week, according to unemployment compensation figures from the IESD.

## Ask For Ouster Of Assessor And Deputy

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — The Indiana State Board of Tax Commissioners had under consideration today a request by Randolph County commissioners that County Assessor Lester McNees and his deputy, Mrs. Donnabelle Gaylor, be removed from office.

The commissioners took the action after a grand jury 10 days ago recommended that McNees and Mrs. Gaylor resign their positions because of "misfeasance and malfeasance" in office in connection with alterations in tax assessment valuations for certain properties.

Richard Worley, secretary of the state tax board, said the board would not determine at present what action it will take. Worley said if a public hearing is held as required by law in the consideration of removal from office it could not be held before May due to preoccupation of the board with other matters connected with the opening of the tax assessment period.

The law permits the state board to remove a county assessor from office on grounds of "incompetency, neglect of duty or misconduct in office."

Worley said when changes on the assessment records were found some time ago in Randolph County, the board sent three men to Winchendon to "see if there were any criminal violations."

"We couldn't find any basis for action at that time," Worley said, adding that the grand jury which recommended McNees and Mrs. Gaylor resign also had found no basis for criminal indictments.

McNees and Mrs. Gaylor both declined to follow the grand jury's recommendation.

County commissioners based their request to the tax board on their belief that the "public confidence in said officers has been greatly impaired and that it will be to the best interest of the taxpaying public that said county assessor and said first deputy county assessor be removed from office."
