Unexpected Cool
Weather Overnight

Hoosiers got an unexpected break from the weather early today. Instead of a warm night as predicted, it was cool.

Temperatures dipped into the 50s over most of the state and barely climbed above 60 in other areas. It was 52 at Fort Wayne, 57 at Indianapolis and Cincinnati, 58 at Lafayette, 61 at South Bend, Evansville and Louisville.

Forecasts had called for overnight lows generally in the 60s.

A further cooling trend was expected Saturday afternoon and evening in the northern third of the state.

Meanwhile, daytime highs will range into the 80s and low 90s throughout the state, with lows tonight ranging from 65 to 71.

Highs Thursday ranged from 78 at South Bend to 92 at Evansville.

The five-day outlook called for temperatures to average near normal except a little below normal north. The upstate cooler trend will last only during the weekend. Downstate, no important changes were expected through the period ending next Wednesday.

No rain was recorded Thursday. But scattered thunderstorms and thundershowers were likely this afternoon and tonight north and Saturday elsewhere. Sunday will be mostly fair and mild.

Rain the next five days will total more than an inch north and one-half inch central and south, mostly Saturday and again near the middle of next week.

McClaren said that he felt the taxpayers of Indiana were paying for a public library for Marion County and that so long as this practice continued, the Marion County commissioners would make no effort to provide public library service.

He said that he and the American

Women had consulted with the county commissioners and had been told that the property tax burden would not permit the addition of public library service in the county.

"They suggested that the state

legislature should be asked to provide some other source of revenue than property taxes for library service," McClaren said.

Public Relations Problem

He conceded that whenever direct lending service to the general public ceases, "we are going to have a public relations reaction."

But he said that by giving ample notice, he hoped current users of

the library would not be inconvenienced.

"They still can borrow by mail, just as do taxpayers throughout the state, whether they live in Marion County or Steuben County," he said.

McClaren said that 11 fulltime staff members of the library work solely in providing direct public service, and that they could be transferred to work serving the entire state and not Marion County alone.

"The selection of material also is affected," he said. "You tend to pick what the public wants, which other libraries all have, instead of using your funds to strengthen and supplement what other libraries have."

McClaren said he has made a study of the state library from its founding in 1825 when it was created solely for use of members of the legislature and elected state officials. He said by "law and tradition" the state library has three responsibilities:

—A responsibility for professional leadership.

—A responsibility to provide special service to state government.

—To serve as a librarians' library.

"It is our responsibility to help other libraries, to supply libraries of the state with material they don't have, not to duplicate what they do have. We are to provide service not otherwise provided, such as our genealogy library, our Indiana collection and our service for the blind," McClaren said.

"We have a responsibility also to do legislative work to help libraries, and to provide governmental agencies with service they ask for, and to serve as the archives of official records," he added.

McClaren said that whenever direct lending ceases at the state library, Marion County will have "over 200,000 citizens without library service. One out of every 100 American citizens without library service will live in Marion County."
