

Adams County Death Rate

The monthly bulletin of Indiana Department of Health points out this month that the most objective measure of the health status of a community or an area is its death rate. This makes sense!

The most commonly used and best-known form of the death rate is the crude death rate: the number of persons dying for each 100,000 people in the area.

The average in Indiana is 960.2 per 100,000 per year. For white males it is 1100.9; for white females, 820.0.

By age, the average in Indiana is:

By county, Adams county really shines. In the unadjusted annual crude death rate, Adams county ranks 9th out of 92 counties, with an average of 841.3. This average, which includes both males and females, is very, very good — it means you are likely to live longer if you live in Adams county! (In spite of the fact that our water contains three times the recommended maximum of fluorides!)

When the death rate is adjusted to rule out sex, age, and race advantages and disadvantages, Adams county shows up even better: it ranks third out of 92 counties as the healthiest! Only Jefferson and Carroll county rank better. Adams has an adjust rate of 834.0, compared with an average of 938.6 for other counties this size, and 1,050.6 for other counties our size, unadjusted! In the northeast part of the state, the average is 941.6 adjusted, 981.5 unadjusted.

In this immediate area, Allen county has a better unadjusted rate, ranking 6th, but moved down to 23rd in the adjusted rates; Wells is way down the list, with 1120 unadjusted, 942 adjusted. Jay is 74th and 78th.
