

Army And Navy Clash Saturday In Top Feature

Army and Navy will meet next Saturday in the annual interservice classic which they regard as the beginning and the end of their seasons, but for the third time in seven years the game will be "bigger than both of 'em" as far as the rest of the country is concerned.

Because behind the pageantry and the traditional pomp will be the possibility that this year's Army-Navy game will create a head-on meeting in the Cotton Bowl between the nation's first and second-ranked college football teams.

Texas, rated No. 1 by the UPI board of coaches, has already earned a Cotton Bowl berth on the strength of its perfect season and Southwest Conference championship. And now it's up to Jolly Roger Staubach and his Navy cohorts to beat Army and win the second-ranked Middles an invitation to oppose the Longhorns on New Year's Day.

Bowl Lineups
The other big New Year's Day berths were resolved Saturday as follows:
—Washington defeated Washington State, 16-0, and was selected by the Big Six to face Big Ten champion Illinois in the Rose Bowl.
—Mississippi and Alabama were matched in the Sugar Bowl despite disappointing windups of their campaigns.
—Auburn beat Alabama, 10-8, and won the right to oppose Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

Fullback Junior Coffey scored two touchdowns on short plunges to lead Washington to its victory while Auburn tallied its points on a 32-yard field goal by Woody Woodall and Manton Kent's eight-yard scoring pass.
Mississippi State scored a moral victory when it battled Mississippi to a 10-10 tie but Ole Miss' disappointment was eased immediately after the game when it was invited to New Orleans, La., to play Alabama.

Another Bowl Settled
Still another bowl berth was resolved when Baylor defeated Rice, 21-12, and accepted a bid to the Dec. 21 Bluebonnet Bowl game in Houston, Tex. Don Trull scored three touchdowns and completed 18 of 33 passes to set new season records of 166 completions and 2,047 yards gained.
Randy Egloff scored on runs of five and two yards to lead Yale to a 20-6 victory over Harvard in the big eastern traditional battle. In other games, Lehigh downed Lafayette, 15-8, Memphis State beat Houston, 29-6, Texas Christian topped Southern Methodist, 22-15, Oklahoma routed Oklahoma State, 34-10, Tennessee downed Vanderbilt, 14-0, Stanford topped California, 28-17, Southern California topped UCLA, 26-16, Oregon beat Oregon State, 31-14, Ohio State edged out Michigan, 14-10, Georgia Tech scored a 14-3 victory over Georgia, Holy Cross upset Boston College, 9-0 and Pitt defeated Miami, 31-20.

Jimmy Brown Sets New NFL Season Record

Jimmy Brown rode to glory by land and Y.A. Tittle through the air, but rookie Ron Vanderkelen scrambled his way to fame, just like he did in the last Rose Bowl game.

All in all, it was a hectic National Football League Sunday that produced two records, two tie games and the further tightening of both conference races.

Brown gained 179 rushing yards in the Cleveland Browns' 24-10 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals and set a new NFL single-season record of 1,677. He broke his own mark of 1,527 gained in 1958.

Tittle's winning 17-yard touchdown pass to Del Shofner in the New York Giants' 34-27 triumph over the Dallas Cowboys gave him a career record of 197 TD tosses, one more than the old mark set by Bobby Layne.

The Cleveland and New York wins kept them tied atop the Eastern standings with 9-3 records while St. Louis dropped back to third with 8-4.

Vanderkelen Shines
Of less permanent significance, but just as heroic among the day's achievements, was the emergency performance of Vanderkelen in the Minnesota Vikings' 17-17 tie with the favored Chicago Bears.

In Sunday's other games, the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Philadelphia Eagles battled to a 20-20 tie; the Baltimore Colts trounced the Washington Redskins, 36-20; and the Los Angeles Rams defeated the San Francisco Forty Niners, 21-17.

The Bears, with a record of nine victories, one defeat and two ties, compared to the Green Bay Packers' nine victories, two losses and one tie, now cannot afford another defeat.

Vanderkelen got his chance to play against the Bears when Fran Tarkenton was injured early in the game. The former Wisconsin star set up Minnesota's first touchdown with a 30-yard pass to Gordon Smith. Vanderkelen then completed a 53-yard pass to Smith for the first touchdown pass of his pro career.

Bears Battle Back
The Bears battled back in the second half, however, to wipe out that 17-3 halftime deficit. Billy Wade went over on a one-yard back after a Viking punt gave the Bears possession on Minnesota's 49-yard line and his eight-yard scoring pass to Joe Marconi tied the game with 7:49 remaining.

Jimmy Brown broke his rushing record with a 61-yard bolt in the first period. He scored two touchdowns on short carries to give the Browns a 21-3 halftime lead and they coasted home from there. Frank Ryan passed 23 yards to Rich Kreitling for Cleveland's first touchdown.

New York, harrassed during the first half by a fierce Dallas defense and the rushing of Don Perkins and Amos Marsh, battled back from a 27-14 halftime deficit to win. Three of Tittle's passes were intercepted during the first half before he rallied the Giants.

Steelers Rally
A 24-yard field goal by Lou Michaels with 40 seconds remaining enabled Pittsburgh to tie Philadelphia and remain in the running. It was the Steelers' third deadlock this season, and second against the Eagles. The Steelers trailed 17-3 entering the final quarter but battled back on a pair of touchdowns passed from Ed Brown to Gary Ballman.

Johnny Unitas, in one of his old-time performances, completed 24 of 37 passes for 355 yards in Baltimore's win over Washington. He threw for three TD's and set up another touchdown and two field goals with his passes.

The Rams made it five wins in their last seven games when Dick Bass scored two second-period touchdowns and Art Perkins added another in the win over San Francisco. The win assured Los Angeles of its best record in five seasons.

Wrestlers To Meet New Haven Thursday
The unbeaten Decatur high school wrestling team will face its stiffest opposition of the young season Thursday night in a match with New Haven.

The meet will be held in the Decatur gymnasium, beginning at 7 o'clock Thursday evening. Admission is only 25 cents.
The Decatur team, with a 47-5 victory over the North Manchester and a 38-17 win over Noblesville, is looking for its initial win over New Haven. Starting their third season of competition, Decatur's grapplers have never beaten a New Haven squad.

Booster Club Plans Basketball Awards

Fred Isch, president of the Decatur high school Booster club, announced this morning the club's awards program for basketball.

Following a conference with coach Bill McColly, the awards committee has decided on an addition to the club's basketball awards.

In addition to a most valuable player award, and an award for the most rebounds gained during the season, the club will also award a plaque to the player with the best free throw shooting percentage during the year.

The club makes its basketball awards at the annual D-Club banquet in the spring.
When the Booster club began making its basketball awards several seasons ago, a trophy for rebounding was decided to be given along with the MVP award. It was felt that the rebounding award would encourage players to excel in this important phase of the game.

Free Throw Plaque
For this same reason, encouraging extra work and practice, it has been decided to award a plaque for the best free throw shooting percentage for this season.

The awards committee will meet with McColly in the very near future to set up regulations for the free throw award, such as a minimum number of attempts to be eligible, etc.
The awards will be made at the spring D-Club banquet, following the close of the basketball season. Wrestling awards will also be made at that time.
